

WAR IN ORIENT IS INEVITABLE SAYS KERENSKY

(World Copyright 1934 by United Press)

PARIS, April 27. (UP)—Alexander Kerensky broke the silence of years today to declare communism a dead issue as practiced in Soviet Russia because its leaders had failed to recognize the tremendous power of the "white collar" class.

In an exclusive interview with the United Press, this man who overthrew the Czarist system in Russia denounced the Moscow communist regime as the severest dictatorship in existence in Europe today.

Orient War Predicted
Kerensky declared that war in the Orient eventually is inevitable, but added that the Soviet union was too weak to fight Japan in the Far East now because its strength was menaced at home by rumblings among the middle classes whom it sought to destroy in setting up a Marxian Socialist state of the workers.

The major points in this interview with one of the most picturesque figures in the original Russian revolution of 1917 included:

1. Marxian socialism is a dead issue.
2. Communism is the severest dictatorship in Europe today.
3. In the struggle between capitalism and labor, the middle class has emerged more powerful than either.

4. War in the Pacific is inevitable.

Kerensky Flees

Kerensky overthrew the late Czar Nicholas II in March 1917, only to be ousted himself by the bolsheviks led by Lenin and Trotsky—the one now dead, the other a harassed fugitive in exile. Kerensky ruled from March until November 1917, but fled when the bolsheviks seized Russia and set up their proletarian dictatorship. He has lived in exile since, aloof and pondering on the changes in Russia which gave birth to his opinions today. He never has been a communist but was opposed to the injustices of the czar.

"Among all the dictatorships existing in Europe today," he said, "Communism is the most severe. No other has sought to exterminate all creative forces of a people, to kill national sentiment or to crush native qualities of race."
"All dictatorships, however, repeat the methods and manners of Bolshevism."

NOTABLE GAIN REPORTED IN WEST'S TRADE

Notable gains in Far Western retail trade, building activity and employment are recorded in the April issue of the Bank of America Business Review. Further evidence of business recovery is found in the Bank's index of Far Western business for March which stands at the highest level for the year and 19 per cent above March, 1933. For the first time since 1929, the index, based on card-loadings, bank debits and power production, shows an increase for the month of March over February.

The Pacific coast branch banking institution reports record gains in retail sales for March, the aggregate dollar volume of 34 cities in the Twelfth Federal Reserve District last month showing a 41.2 per cent increase over the sales of March, 1933. All individual stores reported gains over March last year.

Bank debit figures received from 27 reporting cities for March totaled \$2,199,452,000, a gain of 45.7 per cent over the same month of 1933. Total debits for the first quarter of 1934 showed an increase of 21.1 per cent over the first quarter last year.

Building permits issued in 54 cities in 8 far western states during March totaled \$5,224,646, representing a gain of 10.8 per cent over February, and 18.3 per cent over the permits issued by the same cities in March, 1933.

In California, leading agricultural state of the Far West, the index of prices paid to farmers for 24 products during March was 34.6 per cent above the corresponding month last year. This is the highest point reached for
