National and Local Markets

LOWER BUTTER GRADES SHOW EASIER TONE

PORTLAND, April 28, (AP)—There was no change in the price list on butter for the week end, but second and third grade offerings were inclined to show a trifle easier as a rule.

First grade butter remained in active call, and with supply not at all liberal. However, the quality of butterfat was again improving generally, and this was expected to give the trade more of the A grade offerings of butter.

Egg Tone Steady
Fixed price that is somewhat above the desire of consumers of ice cream keeps the demand for that product at low ebb, and results in the country shipping more sweet cream to the centralizers.

A lift of 1c per lb. in the buying price on colored hens and a loss of an equal sum for broilers, suggested seasonable activities in the market. The trade has been expecting the latter for the entire week.

Price Movers Decline
With the price held low, demand for turkeys continued rather liberal at the week end, although the call was chiefly for hens, which showed the best quality.

That the country should hold back its offerings of dressed calves was suggested by leaders of the trade here. There was an over-supply available during the week, and a slight decline in the price was forced.

There was acute shortage of fresh salmon here, with failure of the commercial sportmen of the Pugetette to get even a moderate catch. The north was also short, and prices were firm at the recent advance.

Deal in local and The Dalles lettuce was widening, with increasing supplies chiefly from the Upper Columbia sector. Prices were a trifle lower for the day, but held well with a firm California market.
