

Three Stars From O.S.C. Coming

O'Connell, Fyock, Prah! to Perform on Modoc Field. Head Coach and Assistant Will Aid in Klamath Track Event. Athletes Have Outstanding Records.

Carl Lodell, graduate manager at Oregon State college, and Art Traff, who successfully won the Oregon share of the coast newspapers, have pledged enthusiastic support to the Klamath Falls 20-30 club for the third annual Southern Oregon-Northern California track and field meet.

It will look something like an Oregon State day in Klamath Falls on May 12 for at least five Beavers will be here to either perform or officiate at the big track meet.

Lodell has promised the following men for Klamath Falls: 1—Charles Fyock, sprinter, who formerly held the Oregon intercollegiate 100-yard dash record.

2—Skeet O'Connell, captain of last year's varsity basketball team, and holder of the high school broad jump mark.

3—Chuck Prah!, vice-president of the Beaver student body, and a hurdler of rare ability.

4—Grant Swan, head coach of the Oregon State varsity.

5—Jim Dixon, assistant varsity coach.

O'Connell came to Oregon State from Commerce High school of Portland where he won distinction in track, basketball and football.

While in high school he was considered one of the greatest athletes in the state. At Commerce he won the broad jump event in the state high school meet in both 1929 and 1930.

At present he holds the record with a leap of 22 feet 6 inches. This was established in 1930.

After going to Oregon State he dropped his football activities and gave his time to track and basketball. In track he has specialized in the broad jump and last year won the crowning honor of the northwest—first place in the broad jump in the Pacific coast northern division meet.

He is now a two-year letterman in track and this will be his closing year of competition at Oregon State. O'Connell closed his collegiate basketball career here last season. He was captain and forward. The season before he appeared with George Hilbard at forwards when the Beavers won the coast title.

Charles Fyock probably is best sprinter at Oregon State this year. He is a former Franklin high of Portland athlete. While at Franklin he specialized in track, but starred also as a halfback on the Quaker football team.

He was entered in the state high school track meets of 1929 and 1930 and won both the 100-yard dash and the 200.

His record of 10 flat for the 100 made in 1929 stood as the best for the meet until 1932 when Bobby Grayson of Jefferson ran the event in 9.9.

Fyock's mark of 12.4 for the 200 made in 1930 was a state record until last year when Brady of Washington sprinted the event in 12.6.

Fyock did not compete in college competition last season so of course he has no collegiate record. However, he has been clocked in time trials this season and Grant Swan, coach, is expecting him to surpass his previous records.

He pulled a muscle this season but so far the injury has not affected his running.

Chuck Prah! came to Oregon State from Ontario. He has devoted his track efforts to the high hurdles and Swan expects him to run the event in less than 18 seconds for the first time in his career.

Grant Swan, head coach, was one of the greatest miler on the coast while competing for the Beavers in 1919 to 1922. He was a real iron man in track and in many meets ran the mile, half mile, two mile and a lap in the relay.

He ran these events in one day against the University of Washington in 1919.

Swan had an unfortunate experience when he went to the Olympic finals at Boston. He was fouled on the first turn in the mile and was so badly injured he was unable to continue the race.

He was an Oregon State varsity captain in 1921.

Incidentally, Swan was never defeated in the mile throughout his intercollegiate competition.

Jim Dixon, assistant coach, was a star at Oregon State in both football and track. He was mentioned on the majority of coast all-star teams at tackle. The shot and the discus were his outstanding track events.

He is also assistant football coach and instructor in wrestling and boxing.

DISTRICT MEET ATTRACTS MANY

Klamath Faces Severe Competition Saturday at G. P.

GRANTS PASS, Ore., May 2.—The fourth annual southern Oregon invitational track and field meet, to be held here for high school teams of southern Oregon and northern California, will also be the qualifying meet for the third district's representatives to the state meet. Teams in the third district come from high schools in Klamath, Lake, Jackson, Josephine, Coos and Curry counties.

When the meet started four years ago 11 teams participated. Last year 21 schools entered teams and this year nearly 30 teams are expected to compete.

All schools in southern Oregon and northern California are extended written invitations and all other schools wishing to enter teams are free to do so, though they have not received entry blanks.

Medals will be awarded to winners at the finish of each event. Ten cups will be awarded to schools for different events. They are for the school scoring the most points, the B class school scoring the most points, the school winning the half-mile relay, the school having the high-point man, the school whose entry wins the 100-yard dash, the school whose entry wins the 440-yard run, the school whose entry wins the 220-yard low hurdles, the school whose entry wins the high hurdles, the school whose entry wins the 880-yard run and the school which has the high-point field man.

The meet will be held under the rules of the Oregon High School Athletic association and California contestants must conform to the rules of their state.

The meet will be held in the Josephine county fairgrounds. All preliminary heats will be run off at 10 o'clock in the morning and the finals start at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

Ducks, Indians Exchange Players

PORTLAND, May 2. (AP)—Earl Sheeley, first baseman for the Portland Beavers, and Henry Ulrich, Seattle pitcher, changed uniforms here today as the result of a baseball trade announced last night by Tom Turner, president of the Portland club.

There had been considerable gossip in sports circles here that Sheeley might go to Seattle and that he might be signed as playing manager for the Indians.

There have been similar unconfirmed reports that George Burns, released by Seattle several days ago as manager, and signed by Portland, might take over the managerial reins of the Beaver-Ducks. This gossip has been linked with the known fact that Manager McGredie of Portland is not in the best physical condition.

President Turner declared, however, at the time of the Burns deal that Burns had been signed as a player only.

Peter Jackson Wins in South

LOS ANGELES, May 2. (AP)—Young Peter Jackson, Wilmington, Calif., negro whose punching ability made him champion of the light and welterweight divisions of the state, had added Tony Herrera of Texas to his string of victims today.

The spindly-legged negro boxer bounced the El Paso Mexican youth to the canvas four times last night at the Olympic auditorium, but was unable to keep him down. The bout was so one-sided that the 6,400 persons on hand were flustered out when Referee Abe Roth awarded Jackson the decision. Jackson weighed 133½, Herrera 140.

James Evans, last year's sensation, will again represent Butte Valley. He has already jumped 21 feet 3 inches in competition in the broad jump and will probably beat that record before the year is out.

GIANT HURLING STAFF FALTERS

Parmelee III, Schumacher Fails to Hit Stride of Last Season.

Even though they are pounding the new National league ball in better style, it looks as if the world champion New York Giants might have to travel over a long and rocky route created by pitching weakness to reach their goal of another National league pennant.

Ex-Bero Gets Trial
The Giants have run into two severe setbacks already this season. Roy Parmelee was rendered temporarily inactive by appendicitis and Hal Schumacher hasn't been able to touch his 1933 form. The trial of the Portland, Ore., rookie, Joe Bowman, as a starting pitcher Tuesday, resulted in a victory which put the Giants close to the league lead but it still emphasized the fact that the durable Carl Hubbell can't carry all the burden.

Bowman got through six innings in fair style as the Giants slammed young Emil Leonard of Brooklyn around to the tune of eight runs in three innings, but he weakened badly and was yanked after six innings. Dolf Luque, who relieved him, was belted out before he retired a man and finally Hubbell had to take the hill for the fifth time in 12 games to save a 10-9 decision.

Yanks Beat Solons
The triumph left the Giants only a half game behind the Cubs as Pittsburgh's Pirates stepped out behind Ralph Dierker's five hits scolding pitching and defeated the league leaders 4-1. Pittsburgh in turn advanced to third ahead of the Boston Braves, who took an 11-6 shellacking from the Phillies.

Burlingame won his second victory for St. Louis in as many days when two homers by Jim Collins led the Cardinals to a 3-2 decision over the Cincinnati Red in 11 innings.

The league leading New York Yankees provided the biggest thrill of the American league program. Going into the ninth inning against Washington with the score tied, they belted three crucial triples and finished the inning with five runs and a 10-5 triumph.

Detroit's Tigers came from behind, scoring two runs in the eighth, and held second place by beating St. Louis, 5-4. A revised lineup, minus Goose Goslin, produced 10 hits, the biggest Tiger total in a week.

On top of this, word was received that another eastern hopeful, Mrs. Payne Whitney's Spy Hill, had worked the full derby route of a mile and a quarter in 2:04 1-5, faster than most derbies are run.

Young Corbett Seeking Match Against Dundee

SAN FRANCISCO, May 2. (UP)—Young Corbett III, who knocked out Young Terry, the Trenton, N. J., "Buzsaw," in the third round, pointed toward a middleweight title fight with Vince Dundee.

While Promoter Johnny Sylvester is attempting to arrange the Dundee-Corbett fight, however, Corbett was expected to be signed to meet Ed Leonard of Chicago, who recently defeated Frankie Battaglia.

Corbett wants to fight Dundee, but he wants the fight to be held on the coast this summer. Sylvester said he will start negotiations immediately with Max Warner, Dundee's manager, to bring the champion here for an outdoor fight.

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
