After 10 days of training in a Chicago gymnasium, Ross will go to Ferndale, N. Y., to complete the third stage of his conditioning program which he hopes will bring him his third title. He now holds the junior welterweight crown in addition to the 135-pound title.

Golfers Keyed for Competition on St. Andrews

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, May 3. (AP)—The younger members of the American Walker Cup team, who have yet to suffer from the almost fabulous terrors of the old St. Andrews golf club, appear at least to have found a course which can keep them keyed to a keen pitch day after day.

After a long and rather tiring tour of the ruins of St. Andrews cathedral, during which they visited the graves of Scotland's golfing great, a couple of them discovered late yesterday that the local tournament which had been scheduled for the usual two practice rounds was over, and Johnny Goodman, Lawson Little and Jack Westland seized their clubs and hurried out to play around again.

Their eagerness drew an approving comment from Captain Francis Outram, who has had more experience with the St. Andrews traps. "I never saw boys go so crazy over a course as these youngsters have over St. Andrews," he said. And he indicated that he considered this a good sign for the coming matches with Great Britain May 11 and 12.

Operations of Coos Bay Lumber Company Assured

MARSHFIELD, May 3. (UP)—Howard W. Banker of San Francisco, president of the Coos Bay Lumber Co., Wednesday said continuous operations of the company with a \$90,000 monthly payroll in Coos county alone, is assured to July 1 if NRA provisions permit.

He said 550 men are now employed. The firm is controlled only by volume instead of plant-operating hours and if no change in code features is made it was indicated work may continue indefinitely.

Employees work 40 hours a week, with minimum basic wage scale of 60 cents an hour.

Emergency Loan on Trees Is Boosted

SPOKANE, Wash., May 3. (UP)—Maximum amount of a federal emergency crop loan which is to be used for tree production only has been raised from \$250 to \$400 in Washington and Oregon, according to John A. Schoonover, president of the Production Credit Corporation here.

The time limit for acceptance of these applications has been extended until May 15 for the eligible borrowers.

By the increase in the emergency crop loan limit, it is intended to provide more adequate means of meeting the special relief needs caused by recent conditions affecting the fruit industry throughout these two states.

Pirates Drop Chicago Cubs From Top Rung

As the eastern clubs of the National League move on the west for the opening of the first international strife of the 1934 season a timely warning might be to look out for the Pittsburgh Pirates. It appears very much to the point as the Buccaneers clash with the league leading New York Giants in the first series.

Cubs Behind Giants.
So far the Cubs have held the spotlight more than any other western club but it was Pittsburgh, in third place with only a fair showing against Cincinnati and St. Louis, which knocked Chicago out of the lead. Following Tuesday's 4-1 triumph behind Ralph Birkofer, the Pirates won 4-2 Wednesday with Heinie Meine, veteran right-hander, on the hill.

Chicago's defeat dropped the Cubs a half game behind the Giants, who wobbled through to their third straight victory over Brooklyn, 6 to 5, when Frank O'Doul smashed a pinch homer with two aboard in the eighth and Hal Schumacher, manager, to pitch a complete game after being knocked out three times running.

Indians Move Forward.
The Cardinals won the other National League struggle 4 to 1 from Cincinnati, which had to get along without Jim Bottomley. Philadelphia and Boston were unscheduled.

The Cleveland Indians advanced to within half a game of first place in the American League without playing a game, as both New York and Detroit suffered reverses.

The Yanks bowed 6-2 to Washington when the Senators landed on Russell Van Atta in the first inning, collecting six hits and four runs before he retired with only one out, and finishing the job against Johnny Murphy in the same inning.

The St. Louis Browns handed the Tigers a 5-2 setback on a combination of home runs by Irving Burna and Ray Penner that produced all the tallies and George Blasholder's seven-hit hurling.

Philadelphia's Athletics outslugged Boston 12-11 after spotting the Red Sox six runs in the first two innings. Bob Johnson's pinch homer in the seventh finally put the A's ahead.

Chicago was bracketed with Cleveland for an off day.

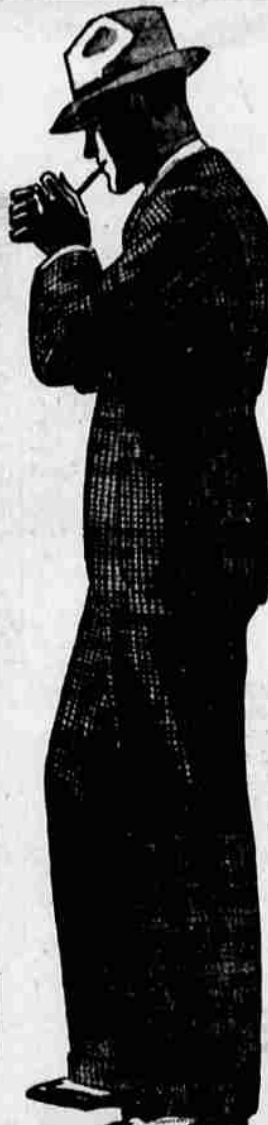
