LESLIE BREAKS STATE RECORD

Klamath Runner Wins Dash Event At Grants Pass.

GRANTS PASS, Ore., May 7. (AP)—One state record was broken and nine new meet records were made here Saturday when Roseburg took honors in the invitational Southern Oregon track and field meet, against representatives of 22 schools from Oregon and California.

Pelicans Score 23
Roseburg scored 37 points; Klamath Falls, 33; Grants Pass, 23; University High of Eugene, 18; Mt. Shasta, Cal. 16; Marshfield, 12; Chiloquin, 12; Rogue River, 8; Myrtle Point, 8; Coquille, 8; McCloud, Cal. 7; Butte Valley and Dorris, Cal. 6; Fort Klamath, 5; Bandon, 2; Eugene, 2; Gold Hill, 1. Entrants to represent the third district in the state meet were selected.

Bob Leslie of Klamath Falls, ran the 100-yard dash in 9.8 to better the state record by a tenth of a second.

Chiloquin Man Places
Harold Draper, Myrtle Point, took first in the mile run with a time of 4:39.1. Galen Morey, Roseburg, was second; C. Sheehy, Chiloquin, third; Lane Warren, Klamath Falls, fourth. Draper and Sheehy qualified for the state meet.

GRANTS PASS, May 7. (Special)—Bob Leslie of Klamath Falls high school blazed down the track under clouded skies here Saturday to establish what may become a state interscholastic record in the 100-yard dash.

Leslie, outstanding star of the Southern Oregon Invitational Track and Field meet, dashed away to a first place in the 230-yard sprint. His time broke the existing meet record.

Police Place Second
Despite the efforts of the sprinting Pelican, Klamath high school placed second in the meet. Roseburg captured first honors with Grants Pass third.

Chiloquin, another Klamath county school, listed eighth in the rankings of nearly 30 teams.

Leslie's time in the 100-yard dash was .098. This was a tenth of a second faster than the mark held by Bobby Grayson, formerly of Jefferson high school at Portland and now an intercollegiate star at Stanford university.

The Klamath sprinter ran the 220 in :22.2.

The Pelicans took first place in the mile relay.

Kirk of Chiloquin won first place in the javelin.

Wilbur Ferguson, the only athlete entered from Fort Klamath, won the pole vault.

Cavalcade Races to Victory in Colorful Kentucky Derby

NEW YORK, May 7. (AP)—The wise old fellow with the satchel full of horse shoes—meaning the blacksmith who nailed the plates to the Kentucky derby winner—knew what he was talking about, after all. Cavalcade, as he insisted two days before the race, was just a "big bully" and demonstrated it Saturday to the complete satisfaction of an amazing crowd of over-powering rivals in an exciting stretch drive at historic Churchill Downs.

Wins Three Straight
He's the king of the three-year-old American turf today and until further notice—this English-bred offspring of a long line of thoroughbred champions. It has been a literal procession of triumphs so far this spring for Cavalcade, victor in three straight races. In rapid succession the star of the Brookmeade stable, owned by Mrs. Isabel Dodge Sloane of New York and Florida, has equalled one track record, broken another, and romped off with the \$37,000 classic of the bluegrass.

So far the Brookmeade colt has not been hard-pressed at the finish of any race. He looks to have the stamina, as well as speed for a great campaign, though his derby time of 2:04 was short of the record and expectations.

Crowd Jams Gates
Cavalcade will not start in the preakness of Pimlico this Saturday. His stablemate, High Quest, will carry Mrs. Sloane's hopes in that Three-year-old classic while the derby winner rests until the American derby at Chicago.

The climax of the sixtieth Kentucky derby, with Cavalcade pulling away to win by three lengths from Alfred G. Vanderbilt's Discovery and the two fillies, Mata Hari and Bazaar, will be seen off, presented one of the most spectacular scenes the American turf has had in post-war years. Reminiscent of boom days, the crowd that jammed Churchill Downs, overflowed onto the track and "crashed" the fences, numbered fully 55,000 and gave a surging background to the most colorful of this country's horse races.

Paul Murdock, sensational young wrestler from Oklahoma, will meet Chief Little Wolf of Denver in this week's main event at the Legion hall.

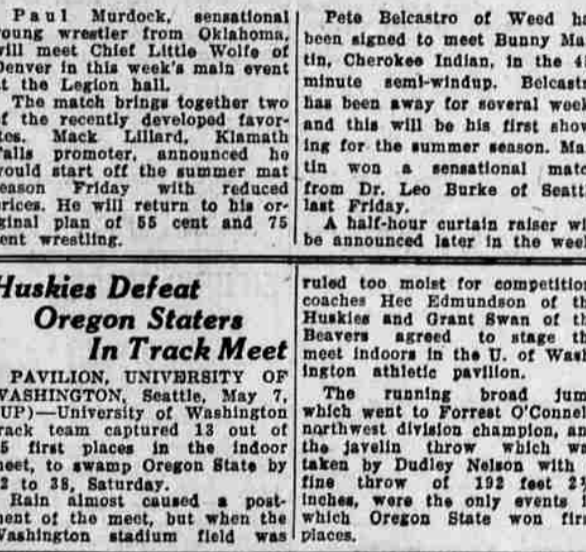

ANGELS SEVEN GAMES IN LEAD

Mission Reds Defeated Five Times in Seven Contests.

Sustaining the pace it set as the season opened, Los Angeles retained its lead in the Pacific Coast league race, seven full games ahead of the second place San Francisco Missions.
