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ated their responsibilities and "extraordinary and arbitrary powers." These, his letter inferred, did not include rejection of the sense of the legislature in reducing salaries nor the board of control in opposing any salary increases for staff members.

Commission Gets Letters.

"In accordance with my recommendation," the letter stated, "the Oregon legislature in special session last November enacted a law governing the manufacture, sale and distribution of alcoholic beverages, and a supplementary act appropriating the net revenue derived therefrom for unemployment relief."

The letter was expected to be ready at the meeting of the liquor commission set for this afternoon in Portland.

The governor's letter to all three members—George McMoran, Eugene; Alex Barry, Portland, and James D. Burns of Condon—continued:

"To carry out the purposes of these acts (legislative measures cited above), the legislature authorized the creation of the liquor control commission, and as governor, I was vested with the appointive and removal power over its personnel.

"In the so-called liquor control act, the legislature specifically provided that the initial objective was 'the protection of the safety, welfare, health, peace and morale of the people of the state,' the prevention of 'the recurrence of abuses associated with saloons or resorts for the consumption of alcoholic beverages,' and the elimination of 'the evils of unlawful manufacture, sale and distribution of such beverages.' In order that its provisions might be fully and effectively carried out, the legislature conferred upon the commission extraordinary and arbitrary powers.

"A supplementary act appropriating three million dollars, or as much as might be necessary, from the net revenue derived from the manufacture, sale, distribution, licensing and taxing alcoholic beverages was enacted in accordance with my pledge to the federal unemployment relief administration that the state of Oregon would contribute its part in relieving unemployment. On the strength of this pledge, the federal unemployment relief administration has, since last fall, continued to advance federal funds for unemployment relief.

"It is with extreme regret that I am now forced to admit that the liquor control commission has failed to fully and effectively carry out the objectives of the above legislative enactments.

"Although patience and tolerance in connection with the administration of the commission have ceased to be virtues, I am, nevertheless, granting the commission an additional thirty days from the date hereof, in which to place its affairs on an economical, efficient and business-like basis.

"Among the salaries which were to be increased was that of George Sammis, administrator, from \$400 to \$500 a month. Sammis remitted his check for the extra hundred to the secretary of state following the board of control action, stating he 'had not asked for it.' Vouchers for the other raises were held up by the commission.

RAILWAY CASE MAY BE SETTLED SOON

Settlement out of court Monday appeared a possibility in case of S. O. Johnson versus the Great Northern Railway and Guthrie and company, involving property along the eastern shore of Lake Ewauna.

The disputed land lies between the meander line of 1872 and the present water line of the lake.

Johnson sued the railroad, claiming that it attempted unlawfully to enter the land and build a spur track there. He asked a permanent injunction restraining the defendants from constructing the spur track or otherwise trespassing on the area over which he claims ownership.

When Johnson first brought suit some time ago he obtained a temporary injunction halting the track construction. Guthrie and company, named defendant, has served as the construction contractor for the Great Northern in this area.

Judge T. E. J. Duffy of Bend was here to try the case Monday. Representing the plaintiff in the case was J. H. Carnahan, attorney for Guthrie and company, and defendant Hart and Spenser of Portland, Claude McCulloch and D. V. Kuykendall of Klamath Falls.

On board the Hudson, Insull issued his first statement, discussing the charges against him in Chicago.

Admits Errors

"I have erred, but my greatest error was in underestimating the effects of the financial panic on American securities, and particularly on the companies I was trying to build," his statement said.

"I worked with all my energy to make these companies. I made mistakes—but they were honest mistakes. They were errors in judgment, but not dishonest manipulations."

His opening remark in the statement was:

"I am here in America to make the most important fight of my life—not only for freedom, but for complete vindication."

"This is the first statement I've made on either side of the Atlantic in relation to my case. Anything else has been faked."

Insull was met at Ambrose lightship by his son, Samuel Insull, Jr., and affectionately greeted by him on the Exilona. The two breakfasted together.

Plans Not Announced

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est since 1928. New armaments and fortifications are included in the army, navy and air budgets. Belgium also is active, building forts along the entire German border.

Poland and Czechoslovakia are roaring defenses on the German frontier and Poland on the Russian side as well.

NOGALES, Ariz., May 7. (AP)—Sheriff H. J. Brown of Santa Cruz county said today he believes Oliver White, his chief criminal deputy, is "on a hot trail" in Mexico in connection with the kidnapping of six-year-old June Robles.

White returned from below the border earlier to say he believed the little girl to be alive, and that she might be returned to her parents within 24 hours.

Sheriff Brown said White had asked permission to return to Mexico and take a special deputy with him.

The chief criminal deputy could not be found in Nogales, and the sheriff believed he had carried out his plan to return across the international line. It was reported he intended to go to Santa Cruz, a small town not far from the border.

"We expect developments momentarily, if White is right," said Brown.

A report grew in this border city that White, when he returned, expects to bring with him some prisoners and possibly the girl. Officials declined, however, to confirm anything.

It was understood Mexican officers were cooperating with the United States deputy sheriff.

White's movements were shrouded in secrecy.

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of Oregon," he continued, "as a result of rapidly mounting tax delinquencies, which have accompanied depressed economic conditions of the past four years.

"I also recognize that the proposed sales tax was designed as a remedy for this condition, but I am convinced that the money required for the operation of our schools can be secured through other sources, and that through drastic retrenchment in other governmental expenses, the required funds for school operation can be secured without imposing upon the people additional forms of taxation."

But, General Martin continued, "if the people under our system of direct legislation approve the sales tax on May 18, I shall feel it my duty to include such a levy in the tax program of my administration, if I am elected."

"Likewise," the statement continued, "if the people reject the sales tax, I shall feel morally bound to eliminate any such levy from my tax and revenue program."

Remarking that "the burden of property taxes upon the people

of Oregon is oppressive and must be lightened," Martin stated his belief that "the remedy exists in the elimination of useless and wasteful expenditures and in the application of strict economy by all state boards, commissions, offices and departments."

"We must," he said, "cut the garment of expenditures to fit the pattern of our revenues."
