MORE MONEY
HELD NEEDED
FOR BRIDGES

SALEM, May 7. (AP)—Increased materials and labor cost combined with a deeper foundation for the span at Newport, will necessitate more funds from the federal government for construction of the five Oregon coast bridges, Senator M. Scott, chairman of the state highway commission, said here today.

Scott was here en route to Grants Pass on the start of his tour of the state, combining highway work with his inspection as grand master of the Masonic lodge. He will be traveling for more than a month, and announced he would not be present at the highway meeting in Portland next Thursday at which time bids for the Newport bridge will be opened.

Instead of the original request of \$5,102,000, which was approved by the public works administration, Scott stated they would have to increase their requests to \$5,700,000. Labor and materials have gone up about 30 per cent, which alone would necessitate more money. When estimates were made the work could have been done for the original figure, but the year's delay, which was no fault of the state highway commission, has put the construction over until prices have increased.
