

# Basketball Costs Released

**Pelicans Show Loss for Successful Season. Report Indicates Need of Greater Spectator Support. Champion Will Compete Saturday. Lillard Announces New Legion Hall Policy.**

The cost of presenting the community with a successful basketball team is described thoroughly in a financial statement from Klamath Union High school.

Roy Frymlre, high school correspondent, has obtained figures revealing that the Pelicans, completing the most successful season in their basketball records, finished the long schedule just \$226.33 on the wrong side of the financial statement.

The correspondent writes: "Out of the 18 games played by the Pelicans, six resulted in a profit of \$160.15. The other 12 contests left a deficit of \$226.33. This leaves a total loss on the games played of \$166.18. The figures contained the expenses of the Redmond district finals and the state tournament at Salem.

"Besides the loss on games played, the expenses have to be figured in on the total loss of the basketball finances. Pelicans' athletic equipment came to a total of \$33.32. The laundry and basketball shoes were next, costing \$35.55 and \$23.48 respectively.

"The games played by the Wildcats figured a loss of \$24.05.

"Of the games played by the Pelicans and the Wildcats the total loss was \$193.58. The miscellaneous expense was \$132.45, making an entire loss of \$326.03 for both basketball teams for the season.

"The student body tickets are not figured as money taken in. Had they been figured, they would almost cover the entire loss."

This, apparently, is a situation in which such an organization as the Businessmen's Athletic Committee will be able to make its energies felt.

The net loss in receipts can be made up by student body tickets. Yet when the community expects so much from its high school athletics, the community responsibility should be recognized.

Certainly the publicity value alone coming to Klamath Falls by having a runner-up team in the state championship is worth something in dollars and cents.

Greater spectator support should become one of the chief functions of the committee in fostering the future success of high school sports.

Citizens of Klamath Falls will have an opportunity Saturday to see a champion in action when Bob Leslie, Pelican sprinter, runs in the 100-yard dash and the relay.

Chances are strongly against this champion for another record smashing sprint. Records most certainly aren't broken each time a runner takes the field.

Leslie's dash performance at Grants Pass Saturday—09.8 in the 100-yard dash—probably will stand for some time.

Mack Lillard, Klamath promoter, has returned to a low-price policy in his Legion hall wrestling matches. The mat game was at a pretty low ebb here when Lillard succeeded Herb Owen. Within a few months it reached a peak that was maintained for more than a year.

Recently attendance has slipped. But now Lillard is determined to get the sport back on its previous successful level, will offer the best possible matches at the lowest possible prices.

## KLAMATH MEETS STRONG TEAMS

**Pelicans Face Trouble In Defense of Title Here Saturday.**

Klamath high school, the defender of two successive track championships, will be pressed to the limit Saturday at the running of the Southern Oregon-Northern California meet on Modoc field.

The rapid piling up of team and individual entry blanks this week forecast stirring competition when the Pelicans, coached this year by Leslie Avrit, take the field to withstand the countless threats from rival high schools of the two states.

**Scores to Compete**

Sam Ritchey, chairman of this major 20-30 club event, said Tuesday morning he expected Saturday's entry list to surpass those of both 1932 and 1933. More than twenty schools will have their application blanks in by the end of the week and the individual roster of intercollegiate stars probably will go beyond 150.

Teams will start coming into Klamath Falls on Friday afternoon and by the time the preliminaries open at 10:00 o'clock Saturday morning the entire assemblage will be on hand. The finals open at 2:00 o'clock.

**Big Luncheon Planned**

The meet will be preceded by a civic luncheon Saturday noon at which coaches and officials will be the honored guests.

Preliminary heats will be run-off Saturday morning in the two spring events and the field events. Grant Swan, head coach at Oregon State college, and Jim Dixon, his chief assistant, probably will be in Klamath Falls Friday night. They will be accompanied by Forrest O'Connell, Charles Fyock and Charles Prahl, Beaver varsity athletes.

**Records May Fall**

Records are expected to fall in many events. Particular interest will be centered on Bob Leslie, Klamath Falls, who bettered the state record at Grants Pass Saturday. Homer Maxwell, Pelican half-miler, too, will be in the record-breaking class if he is pushed sufficiently by opposition.

Grants Pass and Bend are the two schools given leading chances to unseat the Klamath athletes from the championship. Other county schools—particularly Chiloquin, Fort Klamath and Malin—are looked to as strong contenders in individual performances.

Officials of the 20-30 club have made preparations to handle an exceptionally large crowd. Providing the weather is favorable, several thousand people will be in the stands.

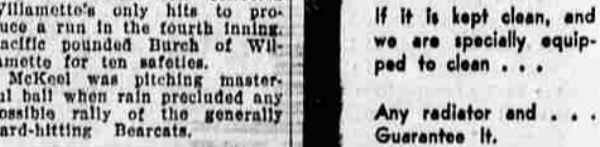
