

RUM CONTROL LAW VOTED BY CITY COUNCIL

Klamath Falls' new liquor ordinance was passed by the city council Monday evening.

An amendment to the ordinance, drawn up by City Attorney A. L. Leavitt, regulating the sale of beer to minors, occasioned lengthy argument, but was finally passed by the city fathers. This amendment makes it unlawful for any minor to be employed in establishments selling beer in excess of 3.2 per cent.

The sale of any alcoholic beverage of more than 3.2 content to a person under 21 years of age is also unlawful, under the new code.

Penalties Imposed
The liquor ordinance defines the term "alcoholic beverage," and provides a fine of not less than \$5, or more than \$100, or jail sentence not to exceed 60 days, or both, for violators convicted in municipal court.

A. P. Lyle, electrical inspector, was authorized to obtain copies of ordinances governing adequate inspection, etc., from the state board of underwriters. This ordinance will be presented to the council at the next regular meeting.

The present ordinance was declared inadequate, governing only requirements for wiring buildings, and leaving loopholes for outside firms and small establishments in construction of signs, winding motors, etc. These concerns pay no license to the city for such service, and Lyle declared that such laxity works a hardship upon licensed shops doing business in the city.

Protection Sought
Representatives from Garcelon's and Van Fleet's electric shops were present, and petitioned the council for adequate protection from unlicensed operators.

Councilmen Charles Thomas, J. D. Van Camp and Elmer Hosking were appointed by Acting Mayor Marion Hanks to investigate the price of gasoline in Klamath Falls, and to protest to proper authorities the alleged excessive price charged in this city. This matter was brought to the attention of the council by Van Camp, who asked that immediate action be taken.

The matter of improving a tract between Esplanade and Alameda streets bordering on the government canal for park purposes, was brought up by Councilman Van Camp. This land is owned by the U. S. government and the city of Klamath Falls, and the possibility of obtaining FEPA funds for its improvement was discussed. Councilmen J. J. Keller, Elmer Hosking and Van Camp were appointed to meet with B. E. Hayden, superintendent of the Klamath reclamation project, to discuss the matter and see what arrangements could be made.

Two Reports Heard
Monthly reports from the police department, the fire department and the city sanitary department were read and accepted by the council.

Dr. W. J. Watters, city milk and food inspector, thanked the council for its cooperation in regulating the milk ordinance, enforcing the garbage tax and changing the fee for cold meat inspection. Through these changes the city doubled its revenue in food taxes for the past month, and Watters was complimented by the council for his efficient enforcement of the ordinance.

At the suggestion of City Engineer E. A. Thomas, the council changed the heavy trucking street from High street between Tenth and Eleventh streets, to Pine street between the same intersections.

Liquor Law Studied
Pine street is wider, and paved with more durable pavement than High street, which requires frequent repairs because of heavy traffic.

The city street inspector was authorized to repair certain wooden sidewalks and to charge these repairs to property owners who have already been instructed to make the improvements.

A request from D. O. Williams for a license to sell beer and light wines at the Pelican grill was referred to the council as a whole to report at the next meeting.

A motion was passed revoking beer licenses for two establishments upon the grounds that these licenses were not passed at a regular meeting. This action will be referred to William Berry, deputy district supervisor for the Oregon liquor commission, and asking him to request the commission to sustain the council in its action.
