

Chiloquin Athlete to Exhibit

Norman Knauss to Make Special Javelin Throws at Saturday's Meet. Leslie Must Break Record at State Finals to Win Official Recognition. Oregon and O. S. C. Contribute to Success of Klamath Event.

A youth of Klamath county—a champion in his own event—will vie with the stars of the Oregon State College varsity track team at the special exhibition on Modoc field Saturday afternoon.

This is Norman Knauss of Modoc Point, a former Chiloquin high school athlete. Knauss won the javelin championship of the state last year at the Oregon high school meet on Hayward field, Eugene.

The young man, although he will not graduate until late this month, is out of inter-scholastic competition. He completed his high school athletic career last year.

Knauss, along with Bob Leslie and Homer Maxwell of the Pelican team, lists as outstanding college material.

Bill Hayward, head coach at the University of Oregon and a veteran trainer and coach with the American Olympic team, has been keeping a careful check on Knauss' development. He watched him at the Southern Oregon-Northern California meet here last year and then again at the state championships.

Hayward, always alert to assist high school athletes, sent down a javelin for the Modoc Point boy to use on Saturday. He has been practicing diligently and may even better his last year's throw of about 187 feet.

Despite the fact that Bob Leslie, Pelican sprinter, was clocked at :09.8 in the Grants Pass meet last Saturday, his time will not be established as a state record.

The association has a definite ruling that only marks set at the state championships will be recognized officially. Leslie, then, must better the present time of :09.9 at the Corvallis meet Saturday, May 19.

This situation by no means detracts from young Leslie's ability. So many track meets in the state are run off without proper regard for accurate timing, weather and track conditions, state officials long ago determined to disregard outstanding performances as official.

While this throws the emphasis of excellence completely on the final rule, in general, is a fair one. Some athletes, of course, may lose the opportunity of becoming a champion for no man can set a record each time he competes.

But it does protect the record sheet from erroneous manipulation, however unintentional those errors might be.

The eager and enthusiastic co-operation of both Oregon State College and the University of Oregon deserves considerable mention. These institutions have done much to add to the attractiveness of the Southern Oregon-Northern California track meets.

First Bill Hayward of Oregon and then Grant Swan of Oregon State gave their own time and energy in supervising the running of events. Each of these coaches readily accepted the invitation to send their star athletes to Klamath Falls.

Such incidents as these tend to stimulate the life of the track and field sports.

Grant Swan, Head Coach At O. S. C., Will Act As Referee.

Sam Ritchie, chairman of the third annual Southern Oregon-Northern California Track and Field meet, Thursday morning announced the roster of officials for the huge interscholastic event on Modoc field Saturday.

Volunteers from the ranks of interested Klamath Falls citizens, special guests and noted track athletes will be on hand Saturday to contribute to the success of the meet.

Swan, Guest Referee. Many well-known men in northwest and Pacific coast sports activities have been listed as officials. Grant A. Swan, head track coach at Oregon State college, will serve as starter and referee.

Four other men from the Beaver institution will lend their services. These will be Jim Dixon, assistant coach, Forest O'Connell, Charley Fyock and Charles Prah. Besides officiating, O'Connell will give an exhibition in the broad jump, Fyock in the dashes, and Prah in the field.

Hill Head Timer. Ralph Hill, former captain of the University of Oregon team and a sensational performer in the last Olympic Games, will be head timer. Hill, to whom the meet was dedicated last year, will be remembered as the American champion in the 5,000 meters and a former world champion in the mile run. He also holds numerous other northwest and Pacific coast records.

Details for the meet were practically complete on Thursday. There still were a few teams to send in their entry blanks.

Roland Warren Will Meet Caldwell in Half-Hour Preliminary.

A third match announced Thursday morning by Mack Lillard, promoter for the Klamath Falls commission, completed Friday night's wrestling program at the Legion hall.

Roland Warren, the wrestling engineer of Klamath Falls, will meet "Roughhouse" Caldwell in the half-hour curtain raiser. Caldwell is a Dorris, Calif., major star.
