

S. P. ANNOUNCES PASSENGER TRAIN

SAN FRANCISCO, May 10 (UP)—The Southern Pacific company today announced plans for adding a fast passenger train to the San Francisco-Portland run on May 27.

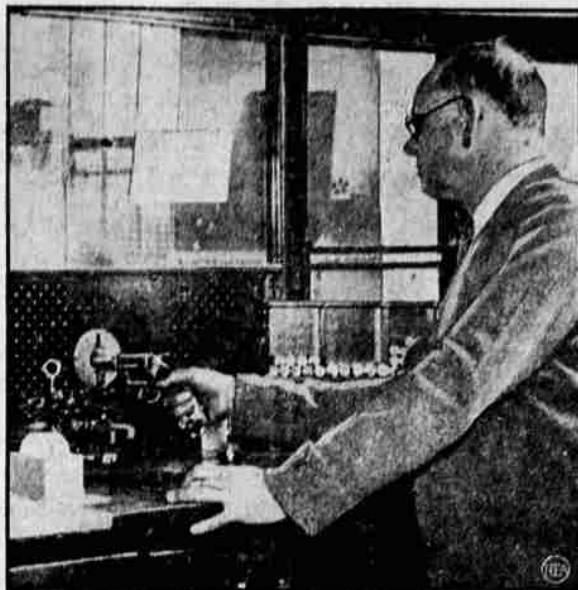
"The train will operate on the fastest schedule ever arranged for rail travel between the two cities," said Felix S. McGinnis, vice president in charge of system passenger traffic for the company. "It will make the run in both directions in slightly less than 20 hours. The best time now made is 21 hours and 30 minutes."

The new train will be known as the Cascade, taking the name of a train now in service which in turn will become No. 17 southbound and No. 18 northbound, McGinnis said. The new Cascade

will leave San Francisco at 4 p. m., arrive in Portland at 11:55 a. m., leave Portland at 4 p. m., and arrive here at 11:55 a. m. Train 17-18 will keep the present schedule of the Cascade on the southbound run, leaving Portland at 10 p. m. and arriving in San Francisco at 7:30 p. m. Northbound it will continue to leave at 6:20 p. m. but will reach Portland at 3:40 p. m. instead of 3:55 p. m.

The new service was announced because of an "upturn" in the transportation business, along with general improvement of trade and industry on the Pacific coast," the line asserted. Southbound departure of the new train from Klamath Falls will be about 12:30 a. m., with arrival in San Francisco at 11:55 a. m. Northbound, the train will leave San Francisco at 4 p. m., arriving here about 4 a. m. These times were announced through the office of L. L. Graham, district freight and passenger agent McGinnis said. The new Cascade
