Cattle, 5,000; steer trade active and firm; bulk steers, \$5.50 to \$7.00; long yearlings, \$8.35; heifers firm; better grades shade higher; heavy heifers to \$7.10; cows slow, steady with week's decline; bulls fairly active at \$3.10 to \$3.25; yearlings tending lower, \$5.00 to \$5.50.

National and Local Markets

HUGE BUTTER MAKE IS ON AT PORTLAND

PORTLAND, May 10, (P)—Further increase in butterfat of Oregon was suggested today with centralizing churning every pound of their capacity. The greatest make in butter known in Portland is now being churned in local plants, and the supply has not yet reached the maximum supply of butterfat.

In the meantime there was no change in the price of cube butter overnight, but the tone is not any too good on account of the speculative feeling that purchases could be made for less.

Trade in the egg market continued fully steady locally and without price change. Receipts were showing little further change except that quality was again better from the hot weather sections.

With a serious decrease in cold storage holdings of chickens, demand here continued favorable despite recent shading of open quotations in some spots here.

Active demand was showing for dressed turkey hens, and prices were steady to strong at least. Much more stock than average was being sought for shipment.

Veal market continued easy, with a general top of 75c per lb. Dressed hogs were steady at 8c to 8 1/2c for best light blockers.

Demand for spring lambs, yearlings and ewes continued good.
