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# National and Local Markets

**FIRM PRICES RULE BUTTER AT PORTLAND**

PORTLAND, May 11, (AP)—Despite any price changes that may be made by the produce exchange, a very firm price tone was showing for butter with the make inadequate to take care of the demand to move into stores. There was a special advance of 1c or more in the buying price on butter by some centralizers in face of California competition, with reports from Willamette valley points indicating a similar condition. Reports in the trade suggest that contrary to law, various prices are being offered at country points with different competition conditions.

Egg market price continued much the same as during the last few weeks. Receipts were about holding their own and quality was quite fair. Storage demand remained favorable.

Some trading of triplet cheese prices continued for makes aside from Tillamook, which was held unchanged at the source and by local handlers generally.

Trifle slower trade in country killed calves was suggested with arrivals of volume and supplies not moving out well at the recent top of 47 1/2 lb. Other meats are unchanged.

Old potatoes continued dull. New potato market was easier all around again.

Fewer turkeys arriving but demand was a trifle easier.

**PROFIT-TAKERS HIT WHEAT PRICE**

CHICAGO, May 11, (AP)—A swift late tumble of the wheat market today took prices down 4 1/2 cents below early top figures which had shown an overnight jump of around 3 cents.

The late setback was attributed largely to profit taking because of the fact there had been an advance of 17 cents a bushel in wheat during the past fortnight. Predictions of showers were also an unsettling factor.

Wheat closed nervous at 147-1/2 to 150-1/2, corn 14-1/2 to 15-1/2, soybeans 14-1/2 to 15-1/2, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 10 cents.

**Alturas Raises Funds to Aid Insub Defense**

ALTURAS, Calif., May 10, (UP)—The Modoc land battle town of Alturas raised \$77 by popular subscription tonight and led the way in an attempt to "get a square deal" for Samuel Insub, whom Alturas residents have never seen.

The \$77 will be turned over to attorneys for Insub, to be used in making his bail.

Business men signed a statement when they contributed. It said: "Any country which allows an arch criminal of the type of John Dillinger to remain free with the blood of a dozen peace officers on his hands and prosecutes a philanthropist of the type of Samuel Insub is haywire in its humanity.

"The country is indebted to Insub more than it can ever repay. We believe him innocent of any intent to injure and call upon all communities in the United States to contribute to a fund to set bail bonds for Insub and to contribute to a fund for his defense."

**'Hopper Control' Plans Discussed**

Problems of weed and grasshopper control in the Tule lake district was discussed Thursday night by all ranchers and lessees in that district at a meeting in the Legion hall at the town of Tulelake.

The meeting was called by the Tulelake grange, and will be attended by County Agent C. A. Henderson, and Ralph E. Brooks, assistant, who will address the meeting upon control methods.
