

LUMBER TRADE CHEERED OVER ORDER BOOST

WASHINGTON, May 11 (AP)—Despite a decrease from the previous week, lumber orders as reported from 1,462 mills by the National Lumber Manufacturers association today, were greater than production during the week ending May 5 for the first time in four weeks.

Production of the mills was shown to be lower than for any of the previous seven weeks and dropped from 214,472,000 feet or the preceding week to 198,745,000. Orders totaled 207,062,000 feet as compared with 214,573,000 while shipments dropped to 191,022,000 feet compared with 205,733,000 feet the preceding week.

PORTLAND, May 11 (AP)—New business amounting to 48,339,000 feet, about 3 per cent greater than for the previous week, and 3 per cent over the three-year weekly average for May, was reported today by the Western Pine Association for the week ending May 5.

Shipments totaled 48,533,000 feet, and production was 51,643,000 feet. Orders were 43,709,000 feet compared with 43,019,000 feet for the corresponding week a year ago.

Orders have increased 32 per cent for the year to date over the 1933 total for the corresponding period.

TRUCKING CODE TO BE MEETING TOPIC

The local meeting of truck owners affected by long delayed code for the Trucking Industry in Oregon are awaiting with interest the meeting to be held in Klamath Falls, May 19, when members of the Oregon Trucking Code Authority will spend the entire evening in explaining how the Trucking Code will be applied locally.

It is expected that troublesome phases of filing minimum schedules of rates which every truck operator must file will be clearly explained at this meeting to all classes of operators.

He stated further that Oregon was fortunate in that the code provisions tied in very closely with the new Oregon Motor Transportation Act and that compliance with the Code and the state law would involve no particular difficulties for Oregon operators.

The meeting will also make definite arrangements for registration of all truck owners in Oregon actually affected by the provisions of the Code. Farmers hauling their own produce exclusively are not affected by the code. Private carriers who do not make a charge for hauling are not affected by it. Practically anyone who uses Oregon highways for transportation of goods and makes a charge for transportation is under the code.

The dean makes personal contact with every boy in school, and his friendly interest, as well as tangible aid rendered in some cases, serves to make the school routine more pleasant for your son. It is his aim to make every freshman feel at home as he enters a new field of education. During the school year 1933-34

the present dean, Russell Andrews, has found paying positions for 18 students, not one of whom has failed to make the most of the opportunity. Andrews has distributed 75 text books to students who were unable to pay for them, from a \$180 fund donated by the faculty for that purpose. The pupils have shown their appreciation of this service by the excellent care they have taken of the books. The dean's records show that

he has held 113 conferences with parents and 165 discussions with the students themselves, concerning absence from school, illness, employment, school equipment and college preparation.
