

# INSTRUCTIONS FOR ELECTION OFFICIALS OUT

Final preparations are under way for receiving and tabulating the ballots of Klamath county's republican and democratic voters at the primary election, May 18.

County Clerk Mae K. Short will deliver the election supplies to Sheriff Lloyd Low, Saturday night, and he will distribute them to the out-of-town precincts.

Mrs. Short has sent copies of the election laws to the chairmen of the boards in the 58 precincts of the county. Another copy will be included in the supplies now being sent out to each precinct.

"We urge that the election officials read these instructions with the greatest care," said Mrs. Short Friday. "They particularly should read that section starting on page 50 and running to 60, inclusive, which details the duties and work of the election officials." The clerk called special attention to page 57, section 36-1517.

In 40 of the county's precincts there will be night boards—that is, double boards who can begin

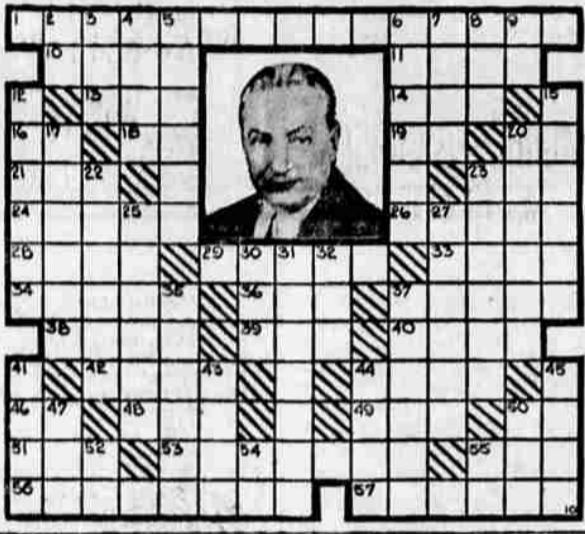

counting the ballots before the polls are closed.

"Our instructions are that these boards should go to work at 1 o'clock," announced Mrs. Short. "They will begin counting the ballots immediately at that time, provided, of course, 20 ballots have been cast."

Mrs. Short said that after the ballots are counted, chairmen within distance will bring the result to the clerk's office. Those farther away should telephone the returns to the clerk's office, using telephone numbers 26 or 152.

The county clerk said that night boards should pay particular attention to the law which prohibits their giving out any results of the election until after the polls close at 8 o'clock.

"There is a heavy penalty in such cases," she said.

Because of the work of the night boards, early returns on Klamath county's voting are expected this year. When the polls close at 8 o'clock, it is expected a large part of the votes will already have been counted.

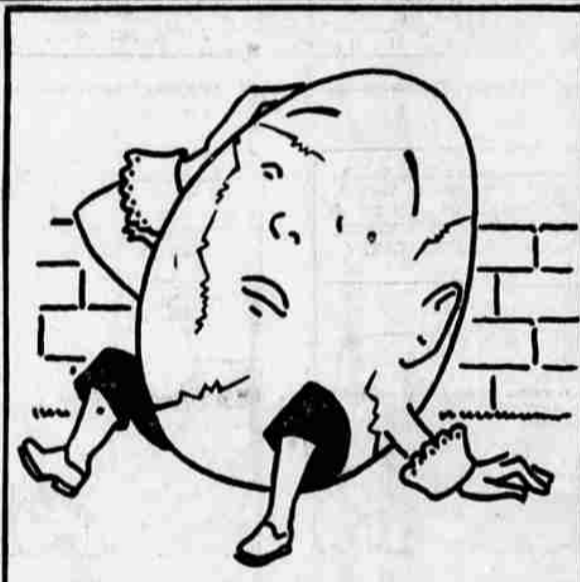
