

Layden Revives Irish

New Spirit Catches Notre Dame Football Warriors Under Young Coach. Former Star Gains Respect of Candidates. Bob Leslie Shows Remarkable Improvement in Two Seasons.

Spring practice has ended at old Notre Dame where there is more football enthusiasm than at any time since Knute K. Rockne fell to his untimely death. The principal reason for a spirit reborn is the slim-bodied Elmer Layden, who has returned to lead his alma mater back to its former gridiron glory.

Layden confides that his only worry is his quarterback and guards. Poor fellow, he only has 225 athletes to pick from. And only eight complete sets of backs from which to select a signal caller.

He no doubt will struggle along somehow, for the Davenport Irishman comes back to the campus from which he rode as one of the immortal Four Horsemen with a splendid record as a coach and organizer at Columbia College, of Duquesne, and Duquesne.

R-O-C-K-N-E was stamped all over the master's carriers of 1924. Three of them, Layden, Jim Crowley, of Fordham, and Hurry Up Harry Stuhldreher, of Villa Nova, are outstanding successes following in the footsteps of the man they so greatly admired.

The other, Don Miller, easily might have been had he devoted all of his time to teaching the game he played so well.

As it was, Miller was an invaluable assistant to Bill Alexander at Georgia Tech and Sam Williamson at Ohio State, spending four seasons at each institution before his legal business demanded all of his attention in Cleveland, where he is the partner of his brother, Ray T., who was defeated there last fall when he sought to be selected mayor.

Don Miller is very close to Layden. They completed law courses together and lived in the same hall at school. "I never met a finer chap than Elmer Layden," says his running mate of college days. "He and Harry Stuhldreher were the most intelligent and thorough football men I ever knew. They were the best of the game. If any coach can regain the prestige that was Notre Dame's under Knute Rockne, that coach is Layden. He was a fine student and one of the most conscientious chaps with whom I ever came in contact."

"Already he is respected and liked, which I knew he would be. That's the most important thing in coaching. If kids don't respect and like a coach, he might as well give up."

"As serious as he is, Layden has a keen sense of humor. I always get a chuckle out of a remark he makes when a small army of Nebraska forwards lashed through our line in '24. Layden weighed only 160 pounds, and the big Cornhuskers were piled on top of him like cordwood."

"Mr. Birch, will you please tell the crowd to go back in the stands," cracked Layden, as Frank Birch, referee, strove to get his hands on the ball.

One has to look at Layden's legs for the source of the power that was his when he was making Kykoff-like starts and bucking lines for first downs.

The upper part of his body appears to be anything but that of a once vicious charger. That and their gaunt faces gives one the idea that Gil Dobie must have looked something like Layden in his younger days, although the new South Bend strategist is not as tall as the Scot.

Don Elser, the 225-pound sprinter from Gary who was injured in the Southern California scrap last fall, attracted more notice than any other player in the spring drills. Members of the old guard went back to Red Sanders and Ray Eichenlaub in their ecstasy over the young fullback.

George Melinkovich, who alternated at fullback with Steve Hannas in 1932, and Abe Zoss, huge center, are back in the thick of things after being out a year. Melinkovich nearly died as the result of an infection.

Hunk Anderson had a tough time following Rockne, as any tutor would have had, and a preliminary close-up of the 1934 varsity leads to believe that the opponent henceforth will have a tough time following Notre Dame.

Bob Leslie, outstanding sprinter on the Klamath high school track team, has had a pretty rapid rise in the last three seasons. For two years he was rather overshadowed by Rex Hamaker, former Pelican dashman, but this year he has come into his own and bettered the swiftest time established by his predecessor.

Two years ago Leslie, who set an unofficial state record at Grants Pass last week, failed to qualify for the dashes in the first Southern Oregon-Northern California meet. His only contribution to the Pelican victory was in the relay event.

Last year he sped to second place in the 220-yard dash to

Paul Dean Hurls Red Birds to Victory Over Giants.

NEW YORK, May 12 (UP)—The Cardinals wrested sole command of third place in the National league from the Giants with their third straight victory over the world champions, 3 to 2, after a 10-inning struggle. This dropped the Giants to fourth position. It was the Cards' fifth straight victory, and their 12th win in 13 starts.

Paul Dean Wins
It was the second straight major league victory for Rookie Paul Dean, brother of the famous Dixie. Roth Rock's single drove in Durocher with the winning run in 10th inning with a malleable arm.

Brooklyn crushed the Cubs, 13 to 1. Sam Leslie's homer featured a three-run Dodger rally in the second. Ray Benghe held the Cubs to nine scattered safeties. Chicago made two errors.

The Braves downed Cincinnati, 8 to 5, aided by a four-run rally in the eighth. Chick Hafey hit a homer in the eighth with a mate on.

Yanks Boost Lead
Joe McCarthy's Yankees strengthened their American league lead by shattering the White Sox, 7 to 6. Ben Chapman's homer with two aboard featured the Yanks' four-run spurt in the first. Jones and Wyatt allowed New York 11 hits while the Sox made 10 off McFarland and Murphy.

Cleveland passed Washington and Philadelphia and took second place by shattering the Red Sox, 6 to 5, in the 11th when Elyak and Kamm resulted in two runs.

Washington and the Athletics, still deadlocked, dropped to a third place tie when both were beaten. The Browns edged Washington, 4 to 3, when Campbell's pinch single drove in the winning run in the 10th. Manager Joe Cronin made a Senator homer in the first and his mate, Phillips, did likewise in the seventh.

Detroit replaced Boston at fifth position by walloping the Athletics, 10 to 5. Each club made two homers, Cochran and Gehring for the Tigers and Higgins and Fox for the A's.

McMorran Asks Liquor Hearing for Next Monday

SALEM, May 12. (UP)—In a puzzling letter to the board of control, Chairman George H. McMorran of the liquor commission today held the commission has the power to grant salary increases, then ordered the control board to reverse its previous stand and order the raises granted.

Power to establish salaries and handle other matters pertaining to operation of the control act "is vested in the liquor commission by the legislative act creating the commission," McMorran maintained.

He requested the board to give the commission a hearing next Monday to discuss the matter of salary increases, recently voted nine of its employees and said he was hopeful the board would concur.

Gotham Police Send Out Call for Ex-minister

NEW YORK, May 12. (UP)—New York police tonight broadcast a request for the arrest of Alberto Herrera, war minister under Gerardo Machado, deposed president of Cuba, who also is a fugitive.

Herrera, like his chief, is charged with murder in connection with a massacre of citizens a few days before the Machado regime fell last August.

The police broadcast asked authorities of New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Connecticut and Rhode Island to watch for the former war minister. Similar broadcast was sent out on Machado recently.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 12. (AP)—A sudden assault produced a knock-down and the margin of victory for Indian Jack Crim of Klamath Falls in his four-round fight here last night with Tommy Ross of The Dalles.

By swift defensive maneuvers Crim got by the first three rounds. When with a surprising burst of viciousness he doubled Ross with a left hook to the stomach and sprawled him to the canvas with a terrific right.

Ross, dumfounded, regained his feet at the count of nine. He pressed the battle from then on, but could not land a knock-down blow. Crim weighed 157 and Ross 154.

One of boxing's funniest freaks, a double knockout, almost occurred in the curtain raiser. As it was Treston Howe, 160, Portland, regained his feet and saw Tony Laveria, 143, Portland, counted out after both went down on a simultaneous exchange of rights to the jaw.
