PELICAN TEAM MEET VICTOR

Klamath Noses Out Bend by Half-Point for Track Title.

Four pairs of pounding feet speeding over the gravel of Modoc field brought to Klamath Falls high school Saturday afternoon the third successive championship in the Southern Oregon-Northern California Track and Field meet.

So close was the running of this interscholastic event between the athletes of Klamath Falls and Bend, the half-mile relay, final race of a day of record breaking performances, turned the score in favor of the Pelicans. The Bears, taking second place in the relay behind the running of Bob Leslie, George Stephenson, Atkins and Bromwell of Klamath Falls, lost their half-point advantage and dropped the meet, 43 to 42 1/2.

Ten Records Fall
A hot southern Oregon sun warmed the muscles of scores of young performers and brought out an amazing number of new records. The displacement of marks began in the first event when Bob Leslie, remarkable Pelican sprinter, burst away in the 100-yard dash. Klamath ended the meet as it was started by setting a new time in the relay.

Ten records out of fourteen events were broken:

- 1-100-yard dash by Bob Leslie of Klamath Falls in 10.1.
- 2-880-yard run by Homer Maxwell of Klamath Falls in 2:02.8.
- 3-200-yard dash by Bob Leslie of Klamath Falls in 12.4.
- 4-High hurdles by Marsden of Bend in 16.6.
- 5-440-yard dash by O. Taylor of Yreka in 1:54.2.
- 6-High jump by Evans of Butte Valley, with a leap of 5 feet, 8 1/2 inches.
- 7-Low hurdles by Marsden of Bend in 27.5.
- 8-Broad jump by Evans of Butte Valley with a leap of 31 feet, 10 inches.
- 9-Pole vault by Walter Ferguson of Fort Klamath with a vault of 11 feet, 8 inches.
- 10-Half-mile relay by Klamath Falls team in 1:35.4.

To Leslie went the high point honors. This young man, who set an unofficial state record at Grants Pass just a week ago, took five points each in the 100 and 200 and 1 1/4 points for his part in the relay. His total was 11 1/4.

Pelicans Los Lead
The Pelicans took the lead in the first event and held it narrowly all through the meet until the result of the pole vault. This gave Bend the half-point advantage lost in the relay.

Norman Knauss of Modoc Point, former Chiloquin high school athlete, was a real sensation of the day when he tossed the javelin 215 feet, 10 inches in exhibition. This youth, who plans to work under Bill Hayward at the University of Oregon, started out with a throw of 193 feet and broke the existing state high school record on his last throw.

Beaver Men Star
Skeet O'Connell in the broad jump, Charles Prahl and Neil Rice in the high hurdles, and Bob Bronson in the quarter mile, gave outstanding exhibitions as representatives of the Oregon State College track and field team.

Surprising in the ranks of winning teams was Yreka, a newcomer to the meet, which placed third. Chiloquin's athletes took a fourth and Butte Valley and Grants Pass tied for fifth.

Fort Klamath, entering only one man, was the only other team to score.

Visiting officials and coaches were in high praise for the 20-30 club of Klamath Falls for the efficient manner of handling the meet.

MACKMEN RISE TO 3RD PLACE

Joe Cascarella Becomes Leading A Hurler; Buca Advance.

When Connie Mack said early this spring that he thought his club might go somewhere in the American League this season if only a few of his young pitchers came through in good form, few if any of the Athletics' fans thought of Joe Cascarella as one of those who might help out.

Joe Leading Hurler
As things have turned out, Joe, a former Philadelphia sandlotter who spent several seasons in the International league, earning a reputation as a good seven inning pitcher, seems to have become one of the A's mound mainstays. After beating the Yankees twice in relief roles, he was promoted to a post as starting pitcher and has won two more contests without a loss.

He took the play from another Philadelphia sandlot graduate Sunday, when the fans celebrated Alan Strange day at Shibe Park and Cascarella made it the occasion for a 9 to 3 Philadelphia victory over the St. Louis Browns.

A's in Third
The triumph gave the A's third place in the tight race as Washington bumped Detroit out of a higher berth by shelling Tommy Bridges from the hill when he became wild in the seventh and scoring six runs to win 7 to 4. Philadelphia's position also was improved when the Yankees slammed the second place Cleveland club into submission 8 to 0 as Lefty Gomez allowed four hits for his fifth straight victory. Lou Gehrig hit his eighth homer with the bases filled.

The Red Sox slaughtered Chicago 14 to 2. Bucky Walters' two homers, one with the bases full, and one by Eddie Morgan, also with the corners crammed, produced the bulk of the runs.

Pirates in Lead
The National league standings produced an odd situation when the Pittsburgh Pirates, a half game behind Chicago, according to one method of reckoning, took the lead by two percentage points. Each won yesterday, The Pirates assaulted Lefty Ed Brandt and the Boston Braves for a 9 to 2 decision while the Cubs defeated the Giants 7 to 3 on a four run rally started by Chuck Klein's ninth circuit blow of the year. Pittsburgh, however, has played only 22 games to Chicago's 32 to gain the higher percentage.

The St. Louis Cardinals blasted out a 12 to 7 victory over Brooklyn. The seventh-place Phillies had to go ten innings to defeat the eighth-place Reds 5 to 4 after Ethan Allen's homer tied the score in the ninth.

Bend Defeats Pelican Club
The Pelicans, independent baseball team of Klamath Falls, lost its opening game of the season to the Bend Elks Sunday afternoon, 11 to 0. The game was played on the Bend field.

Max Schmeling, Uzcudun Draw At Barcelona

BARCELONA, Spain, May 14. (AP)—Max Schmeling's second encounter with Paulino Uzcudun had gone into the record books as a draw today but the impression was general he easily had earned a decision he didn't get.

Through 12 rounds, the former heavyweight champion pounded away at Paulino's face, had the veteran basque bleeding badly from the sixth round on, and outboxed him by a wide margin in the feature match of Montjuik stadium's 160-round boxing carnival yesterday. But at the finish the judges called it a draw.

Ringside critics, giving Schmeling at least eight rounds, thought the judges had been unduly influenced by the courageous fight Paulino put up against a younger, more skillful rival.

The crowd of 40,000 frankly partisan to Paulino, cheered the verdict vociferously. In their first meeting in New York five years ago, Schmeling won by decision.

The heavyweight bout came as the climax of a boxing carnival that began before noon and continued simultaneously in three rings throughout a hot afternoon until nearly 7 p. m.

BEAVERS LOSE SEVEN IN ROW

Mission Reds Administer Bad Beating to Portland Ducks.

Continuing its swift pace, Los Angeles stood out today as the only Pacific Coast league team which has not lost a series this season. Its string of series victories was threatened last week when the Sacramento Senators took three of the first four games. But the Angels came back to win three in a row over the week-end.

Ducks Lose Seven
The San Francisco Missions were only four games behind the league leaders by reason of seven straight victories over Portland, while Hollywood, with seven straight wins over Seattle, was only half a game behind the third place San Francisco Seals.

The Angels experienced little difficulty in taking Sunday morning's game at Stockton, 6 to 1, when Roy Henshaw allowed the Senators only 5 scattered hits in the afternoon encounter at Sacramento, however, the Senators came within a run of tying the score in the eighth inning after the Angels had collected nine runs in the first three innings.

The Angels scored 4 runs in the first inning on 4 many singles and 6 more in the third on five hits. Sacramento answered with five runs in the fourth inning. What proved the Angels' winning run came in their half of the eighth on shortstop Glavster's bad throw. Outfielder Frank Demaree of the Angels added another home run to his string.

Oaks Drop Seals
The Missions trounced Portland 9 to 1 in the first game when John Babel let the Beavers down with only two hits. Hal Turpin, who gave Babel a battle Tuesday, was knocked out of the box in the third inning which the Missions scored 5 runs on 6 hits. After spotting Portland to a two-run lead in the seven-inning contest, the Missions came from behind to win, 7 to 2. Hollis Thurston allowed the Beavers 6 hits.

Oakland handed the San Francisco Seals a double defeat, winning the opener, 6 to 4, and the second contest, 6 to 0. A ninth inning rally by the Seals in the first contest was cut short after they had collected two runs. Mike Salomon, pitching the seven-inning shutout, held the Seals to four hits.

It took Hollywood 11 innings to turn back Seattle, 6 to 5, in the first game, but they were not so hard pressed to win in the nightcap, 6 to 4. After the Indians had knotted the score at 5—all in the ninth inning, Le Fitterer, fourth man on the mound for the Indians, walked four men in the 11th inning to give the Stars the winning run. Catcher Bradbury of Seattle and first baseman Ray Jacobs of Hollywood each knocked out a home run in the first game, and first baseman Shesley of the Indians and second baseman Joe Berkowitz each added another homer in the second contest.

Trojans Win Annual Races In California

FRESNO, Cal., May 14. (UP)—University of Southern California Saturday won its sixth consecutive victory in the intercollegiate division of the west coast relay races, when it rolled up 94 points to lead the field.

Stanford University was second with 44 1/2 points, and Fresno State college third with 34.

U. S. C.'s and Stanford's places were forecast several days ago, but the strong showing of the Fresno team, competing against the state's best, was a surprise to the 10,000 spectators who filled the brightly-lighted stadium.

Kansas Miler Will Compete In Coast Races

LAWRENCE, Kan., May 14. (UP)—In quest of a world mile record, which he and his coach believe within his reach, Glenn Cunningham, the equine's top miler, will travel from the Atlantic to the Pacific coast this summer.

After that Cunningham, a senior at Kansas, will step out of inter-collegiate competition but he hopes to retain his amateur status and continue to run for a few more years.

"I don't want to turn to coaching for then I'd have to stop running," Cunningham told friends. "I hope for a job that will permit me to run on the side."

In his two efforts this summer Cunningham will have Bill Bonthron of Princeton as his chief rival, and his coach, W. H. (Bill) Hargis, believes such opposition is just the tough contest he needs to put Cunningham over the line a record breaker.

Oregon Trackmen Defeat Huskies

EUGENE, Ore., May 14. (AP)—The margin of three points, which would have been switched the other way by changing two of the scoring column, was enough to give the University of Oregon track team a win here Saturday over the University of Washington. The score was 87 to 84.

A negro flash, Hopson, who captured both the 100 and 200-yard sprints, gave the webfoot unexpected strength in the sprints to win the meet.
