

REPUBLICANS LEADING AT 37 PRECINCTS

Leo Gallagher, famous labor attorney, on tour of the northwest, will speak on "The Menace of Fascism" in Klamath Falls, Wednesday at the Moose hall. The meeting will start at 7 p. m. Gallagher is known for his expulsion from Germany recently when he went to Leipzig to defend the four defendants on trial for the burning of the Reichstag. The four defendants were acquitted, but not until Gallagher and other prominent attorneys from America, France and England, had been barred from Hitler's courts as "enemies of the state."

Formerly Gallagher was a professor of law at the University of Southern California and is a member of the Tom Mooney legal staff.

Tom Cunning, formerly of this city, has been made executive secretary of the B grade independent milk producers' association at Portland.

Cunning some time ago became affiliated with the state milk commission. His new position is with an association of approximately 200 dairymen.

MILK BOARD WILL OFFER PRICE PLAN

A permanent schedule of milk prices for Klamath county will be determined by the state milk commission to become effective June 1, it was announced Saturday by E. G. Harlan, head of the commission, following a hearing here conducted by Burge Mason, commission member from Klamath Falls, and Harlan.

Harlan stated that the board hopes to work out a plan that will increase prices to farmers in this area. He said the distributors here indicate a desire to pay farmers the fairest price possible, and on the basis of information gathered at the Saturday meeting some improvement in the price to farmers may be effected.

Depot Price Viewed

Most of the prices in effect here were found to be satisfactory, Harlan said. One question that arose at the hearing had to do with the price out of milk depots, and the board intends to look more thoroughly into that problem not encountered elsewhere in the state.

The milk commissioners said they were highly pleased with the attitude of distributors in this area toward the farmers. Farmers here, they said, are paid on a fairer basis than anywhere else in the state.

About 30 were present at the hearing and a Klamath County Dairymen's association was organized. The board will work through this group, which is made up of producers, distributors, and producer-distributors.

C. L. Holladay was named head of the association, and ? ?

Brook, assistant county agent, was chosen secretary.

The board encountered difficulty Saturday in obtaining definite figures on production and distribution costs. Harlan said a uniform cost accounting plan is being prepared by the milk commissioners which, if followed by producers and distributors, will facilitate the gathering of information of this sort.

Clerk Receives Notice to Drop Dodd Candidacy

Notice of the withdrawal of E. P. Dodd from the republican race for governor was received by County Clerk Mae K. Short Saturday, too late to block Dodd's name out of the Klamath county ballots. Most of the ballots already had been sent out to the precincts.

In accordance with instructions from Secretary of State P. J. Stadelman, Mrs. Short will notify precinct election officials of Dodd's withdrawal and inform them to cancel his candidacy.

Dodd, according to press reports, withdrew from the race in favor of Joe Dunne.

G. N. POINTS TO LOWERED RATES

The Great Northern railway hauled freight last year at an average cost to shippers of slightly less than one cent per ton for each mile of transportation, while the average rate per mile paid by passengers was the lowest in the history of the railroad.

This information is contained in the annual report of the company which W. P. Kenney, president, submitted to stockholders at their meeting in St. Paul yesterday. Copies of the report were released here yesterday by C. W. Christopherson, Great Northern general agent.

Freight revenue per ton per mile in 1923 was 37 cents, as compared with 1.084 cents in 1924. Passenger revenue per passenger per mile was 1.991 cents, as compared with 3.24 cents in 1924.

"The reduction in passenger rates has stimulated travel," Mr. Kenney said, "and there is every reason to believe that the revenue for 1934 will show an increase for the first time in years."
