

# Track Meet Point Disputed

Northern Coach May Offer Protest for Saturday's Event. Complaint Appears Without Justification. Pelicans Complete Outstanding Baseball Season.

The difficult job of judging the finish of track events came in for some unjustified criticism at the third annual Southern Oregon-Northern California Track and Field meet on Modoc field last Saturday.

Judges, even though it might be their intention, would find it almost impossible to be partial particularly in sprint events. And it was in the 100-yard dash an entirely one-man dispute arose Saturday.

A coach from a northern school insisted one of his young athletes placed in the dash, and later it developed the meet championship would have been considerably altered had this been true.

There is one judge for every position and an error is almost unheard of. The judge's eyes are focused across the finish line and he checks his man off as he completes the race.

There is absolutely no time nor opportunity for a judge to determine what school an athlete represents until after the event is over. By that time he has singled out his man and brought him to the recorder.

There was no dispute nor discussion among the judges Saturday as to the order of finish in the 100-yard dash. Had there been an error there undoubtedly would have been some open confusion in the selection of the first four finishers.

The alleged error was pointed out by the offended coach and rightfully overruled by Grant Swan, head coach at Oregon State and referee of the meet.

The incident passed and was apparently forgotten until the relay event when the championship of the day was at stake. When the score was announced describing a half-point victory for the Klamath Pelicans, the protest was renewed.

A formal complaint may yet be lodged with the meet officials. Undoubtedly, however, it will be denied, for if it is offered there can be no justification for it.

Such protests, when all persons with the exception of a single coach acted in good faith as well as with accurate judgment, go a long way to spoil the rise of the recently revived intercollegiate track and field activities.

By the grace of good weather and outstanding material, Klamath high school completed a successful baseball season. The year was a notable one for baseball inasmuch as it marked the resumption of the sport after several years of inactivity.

Legion baseball contributed largely to Klamath's winning record. Dwight French, coach, predicts another outstanding team from the Pelicans next year. Practically his entire list of regulars will return.

The only thing that might upset the plans is the weather—and that is uncontrollable.

### KLAMATH BOYS IN STATE MEET

Four Individual Stars, Relay Team Eligible At Corvallis.

Four Klamath high school track athletes and the relay combination will be eligible for entrance in the state championship meet at Corvallis, Saturday afternoon.

These youths, winners at the district meet at Grants Pass over a week ago and then again at the Southern Oregon-Northern California track and field meet last Saturday, will be definitely named some time this week by the high school officials.

Leslie Leads List  
Bob Leslie, sprinter, heads the list. Leslie has a brilliant opportunity to win both in the 100-yard dash and the 220. The swift Pelican runner already has unofficially bettered the state record in the 100.

The other candidates for state championships will be Homer Maxwell in the 880-yard run, Atkins in the quarter mile and Kinney in the high hurdles.

The relay team probably will be Bramwell, Stephenson, Atkins and Leslie. Under the state rules, a fifth man can be taken to the meet as an alternate.

The state event this season will be sponsored by Oregon State College on Bell field.

### Jack Hibbard Shows Power For Box Card

Jack Hibbard, the "madier" of Klamath Falls, was rapidly approaching the peak of his training Tuesday for his encounter Thursday night against Cliff Hottinger of Oakland at the Merrill Community club.

Hibbard, steadily improving, was a favorite to win the opening summer boxing card. Hottinger is little known here, but promoters of the Merrill card declare him an outstanding fighter who has not been knocked out in 160 clashes.

Two Klamath county boxers, Sunny Enders, Lee Murphy, will meet in the 6-round semi-windup. Enders, the favorite, has displayed promising power in his gym workouts.

Other fights will send Buzz Zimmerman of Klamath Falls against Bud Craft of Aberdeen; Roy Jones of Dairy against Paddy Ryan of Klamath Falls, or Tony Oris of Klamath Falls against Eddie Fielder of Dairy.

With the score tied, two out and a man on base, First Baseman Ed Creider of Oregon State hit a home run after the count was three and two on him in the tenth inning.

In the ninth Creider opened with a triple, Beatty homed and Pinch Hitter Callan singled, stole and was sacrificed to third and then home for the tying tally.

Washington rallied in the sixth inning to overcome a 4 to 3 lead. Three singles followed by Levin-decker's home run produced four runs and another came in on hits by Boulton and Lee. Rasmussen and Sheller shared mound duties for Oregon State while Daily and O'Brien batted for the Huskies.

### Gloria Swanson Sues Farmer For Divorce at L. A.

LOS ANGELES, May 15. (UP)—Gloria Swanson, 35, filed suit for divorce Monday against her fourth husband, Michael Farmer, alleging cruelty.

### LEFTY GROVE REVIVES SOX

Boston's Star Reveals Power on Mound After Layoff.

The stock of the Boston Red Sox, fading recently on the major league market, is rising again, and the reason is the same impetus that sent the Sox chances flying in the first place—Lefty Grove.

For Robert Moses apparently is back in the pitching condition that won him ranking among the best left handers in baseball's history, as well as a price of \$100,000 that Tom Yawkey paid when he bought the Maryland team pole from Connie Mack last winter.

Sore Arm Recovers  
Lefty didn't win a ball game Monday but he proved he has recovered from the sore arm that has been shrouding both him and Boston's populace in gloom since the first week of spring training.

Grove picked up the gauntlet against the White Sox, relieving Henry Johnson in the third inning with one out, the bases full, and the score 5 to 0 against Boston. The White Sox won, 5 to 2, behind 4-hit pitching by "Big Jags" Earnshaw, but Grove, pitching with much of his old skill, accomplished the following:

Three Hits Allowed  
He allowed three hits in 6 2-3 innings, walked one and fanned two. He was scored on twice before he got the side out in the sixth, through a walk and a fore-runner, though the runs aren't charged against him because he took over with the bases full. He allowed one run of his own making in the seventh when he dropped Eddie Morgan's toss to first base on a ground ball that would have retired the side.

Earnshaw's victory was the first complete game he has pitched this season.

Warneke Wins Again  
Lon Warneke gathered in his fifth victory of the season as the Cubs beat down the world champion Giants for the second straight day in a 3 to 2 ten-inning thriller that alone survived the rain in the National League. With two on base, Chuck Klein got to young Hal Schumacher for a double in the tenth after Dolph Camilli had tied the score in the ninth.

Vic Sorrell, Detroit southpaw, snuffed out the Senators, 5 to 0, with only two hits in the only other game of the day, called because of rain after six innings. Al Crowder lasted less than two innings as the American League champions slid down into the second division.

All other games were washed out by the rain.

PACIFIC TEAM WINS  
SALEM, Ore., May 15 (UP)—Pacific University took advantage of its only two hits, combined with two Beasler errors, to defeat Willamette here, 3 to 0. Burch fanned seven for the losers.

### Belcastro Gets First Chance At Main Event

Although Pete Belcastro, athlete from Dorris, has been wrestling in Klamath Falls for nearly a year, Friday night will mark his first main event appearance at the Legion hall.

Belcastro, steadily increasing his power and skill, defeated Bunky Martin, Cherokee Indian, last week to win the feature match on Mack Lillard's next program. He will move into action against another Indian, Chief Little Wolfe of Denver, in a one-hour encounter.

Rivalling the main event in action will be the semi-windup clash between Bunky Martin and Walter Strols of Paris, Martin is one of the most popular of Lillard's athletes, and Strols won recognition here for two interesting struggles against Paul Murdoch.

Big Bull VonVisson of Klamath Falls will have his first opportunity to wrestle at the Legion hall Friday against Rough Billy Newman. This will be a half-hour curtain raiser.

### Two Golfers Of Northwest Seeking Title

PORTLAND, Ore., May 15 (AP)—The northwest district will be represented in the national open tournament by par punishing Albert (Scotty) Campbell of Seattle and Ted Longworth of Portland.

Campbell, Pacific northwest amateur champion, stroked his way to the number one position by a large margin, over the Waverley Country club course here yesterday.

His opponent, Emory Zimmerman, finished fourth with a 37-40-77 in the morning and a 33-37-73 in the afternoon.

Longworth and Emory's brother Al Zimmerman, also of Portland, were all even at 145 after 15 holes they halved the next with partners. Longworth repeated with another par four or 1's second extra hole while Zimmerman three-putted for a five.

Longworth carded 37-37-75 in the morning and 39-34 in the afternoon. E. Zimmerman shot 38-38 in the morning and in the afternoon play turned in 39-33-72.

A. R. Roberts was fifth with 155 and Fred Andrews sixth with 174.

### Cougars Defeat Vandal Players

EUGENE, Ore., May 15 (AP)—The state high school record for the high jump lay unofficially shattered after Dufranes, Roseburg high track ace, leaped six feet, one and three-fourth inches, in the district meet held here on Hayward field Monday.

Roseburg won the meet when it annexed 50 1/2 points, Springfield with 28 was second and Eugene and Cottage Grove tied for third with 15. University high of Eugene tallied 20 1/2.

The high jump mark was made by Dufranes and Carey of Washington high of Portland in 1933 with a tie-jump of six feet, one-quarter inch.

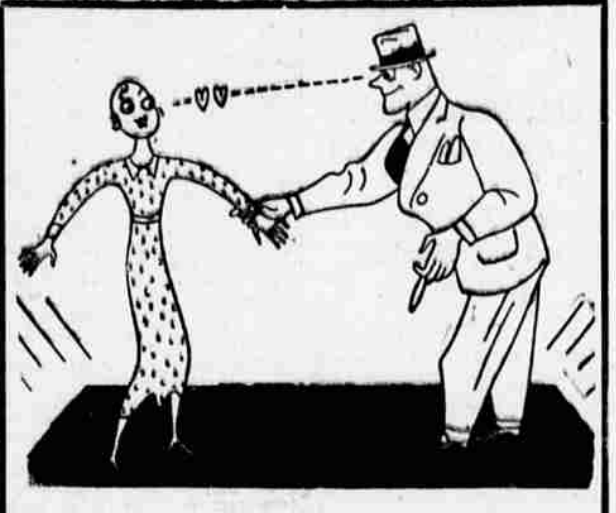
### Three Veterans To Carry Burden Of Davis Squad

NEW YORK, May 15 (UP)—America's first venture in 1934 Davis cup play will be entrusted to three veterans and one newcomer, the cup committee announced Monday. The new man is long and lanky Lester Stofen of Los Angeles, and the three vets are George Lott, Chicago; Frank Shields, New York; and John Van Ryn, Philadelphia.

They will meet the Canadians in the first round of the North American one play at Wilmington, Del., May 24, 25, 26. The Canadian team has not been announced, and probably not determined since the players practice has been handicapped by adverse weather.

Three important American tennis names are missing from the list named to face the Canadians. They are Wilmer Allison, Austin, Tex.; Sidney Wood, New York; and Bryan (Bilby) Grant, Atlanta.

While the precise lineup of the United States squad will not be determined until a few days before the match with Canada, Stofen and Shields probably will be the No. 1 and No. 2 singles players, with Lott and Van Ryn teaming in the doubles.



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
