

SERVICE CREATED FOR INVENTORS

NEW YORK, May 16.—Creating for inventors and the layman who have a useful idea a reliable source of information and practical guidance in inventing procedure, the Inventors Foundation, Inc., inaugurated by Henry J. Galsman as a non-profit educational organization, is now established with headquarters in the Chanin building.

The opening of the new institution marks the first effort of its kind in a desire to awaken a fuller realization of the pleasure and status to be derived from inventive achievement.

The opening of the Foundation in its New York headquarters is the outgrowth of painstaking research laid over the past three years at Stevens Institute of Technology, of courses given after response at New York university in the metropolitan area, and in co-operation with International Correspondence Schools, Pennsylvania, in the home-study field.

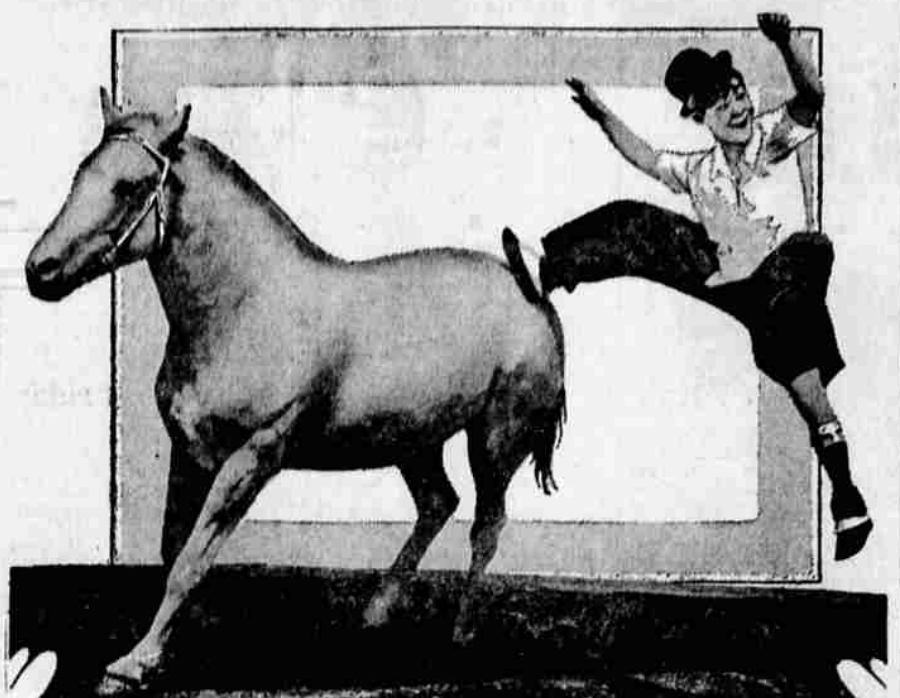

Klamath Indians Request Removal of John Collier

The general council of the Klamath Indians, in session on the reservation Tuesday, voted to join Oklahoma Indians in asking the removal of John Collier from the office of Indian commissioner. Collier's attitude on tribal affairs and on various matters affecting the Klamath Indians was scored.

Curtailment of children's funds in the hands of the reservation superintendent was discussed at length. Five members of the council were named on a committee to study the problem. They are Jim Johnson, Hoyd Jackson, Jesse Lee Kirk, Clayton Kirk and Ben Mitchell.

The council recessed until May 21, when its committee will report. The question of timber contracts also will be discussed at that meeting.
