National and Local Markets

BUTTER MART
HOLDS STEADY
AT PORTLAND

PORTLAND, May 16, (AP)—Trading in the butter market continued of full steady character with no price change for either prints or cubes for the day. Output continued its recent gain.
Steady tone was confirmed in the market for eggs with practically no change suggested in the price list. Receipts were showing a fractional loss and quality was getting mixed.
All through the market for live poultry late prices were being held with a demand for more stock than was available with the exception of immature quality. Turkeys were holding up for showing stock.
After showing extreme weakness the market for strawberries snapped out of its depression as a result of the rains which were expected to curtail immediate offerings, as well as the good shipping call.
There was a record run of striped bass now along the Oregon coast. The biggest haul known to date is being moved to Portland. Prices were sharply lower.
Recent heavy surplus of country killed calves was beginning to show favorable cleanup signs and prices were again steady. Other meat lines were unchanged.
Overload of green peas here has caused the price to recede generally, although shipping demand for canners continues favorable. Much of the stock appeared a trifle immature and not well filled.
New red onions were arriving from California, selling 60c lug. Old onions were still finding local call.
New potatoes were firmer with old stock dragging.
Orange prices continued to advance for both the novel and valencia with the former very scarce.
Lemons are also higher.
Apricot crop around Orland, Calif., is very small but the quality is favorable.
Calf skins and kips are down 1c lb.

UNCERTAINTY PUTS
WHEAT PRICE DOWN

CHICAGO, May 16, (AP)—Uncertainties resulting from proposed congressional measures toward drastic further regulations of commodity exchanges did much to drag grain values down much of the time today. Sharp late advances, however, were promoted by the fact unfavorable crop reports from the American and Canadian northwest.
A leading crop expert, telegraphing from Aberdeen, S. D., after a 240-mile trip from Yankton, said drought conditions were deplorable, and that in the region named no 1934 crop of wheat could be produced. The market advanced rapidly in the last few minutes of the day.
Wheat closed strong, 2 1/2-2 3/4 cents above yesterday's finish, July 83 1/2-84c, corn 3 1/2-3 3/4c advanced, oats 3 1/2-3 3/4c and provisions at a rise of 2 cents to 12 cents.
