

Team Track Title Eliminated

Schools Will Compete for District Honors at State Meet Saturday in Corvallis. Klamath Citizens Turn to Water Sports. Beavers Face Almost Impossible Rebuilding Task.

The new rules of the Oregon state high school track and field championships prevent the selection of any one school as the individual winner of the eighth meet at Corvallis Saturday.

Unofficially, of course, every school entering a team will be determined upon taking sufficient points to place it ahead of the field, but no special honor will be attached to the winning team.

The championship, if any championship is awarded, will go jointly to the representative of the district amassing the most impressive number of places.

Thus, if Klamath Falls and Grants Pass, along with other entrants from this region, outdistance seven other districts, the title will be given to southern Oregon.

The ruling was not made to discourage a school from seeking high honors. It was made in the spirit of fairness to the great many small schools which probably will send only one or two athletes to the finals.

Track, almost more than any other organized sport, is a matter of individual excellence rather than team play. The emphasis, then, has been placed on individual championships rather than school championships.

Each of the first seven districts is permitted but two entrants in one event. So it becomes almost impossible for one school to enter a large team. The eighth district—the Portland high schools—may send four men to the finals in each event.

Directors of the Junior chamber of commerce Upper Klamath lake regatta for next month have discovered an increasing interest in water sports among the citizens of Klamath Falls.

In basements, garages and backlots all over the county, construction is under way to complete boats in time for the outboard and sailboat races. It is estimated that there are at least 50 new craft being built.

Should they be completed by June 17, the Upper lake will be alive with boats of all kinds.

Tom Turner, president of the Portland baseball club, has announced his intention of shaking-up the Beaver roster from the managerial ranks as far down as the bat boy.

The Ducks, no one needs reminding, have wallowed in the cellar all season except for brief interchanges with Seattle for the seventh and eighth place positions.

It is a little late for the Beaver officials to change their policy. The season is a long way on, and Portland would have to win an almost unprecedented number of games to get into the first division. Let alone overhaul the leading Los Angeles club.

Turner sold the players who led the Beavers to a championship two years ago and to a second place finish in 1933. Even Spencer Abbott, the most successful manager Portland has possessed in many years, was turned out.

A team most certainly can't be rebuilt almost at mid-season.

Linfield College Defeats Badgers
