HORNSBY WINS  
FOR ST. LOUIS

Homer Brings Victory  
Over Red Sox In  
Eighth Inning.

Stimulated by the influence and example of Manager Rogers Hornsby, the St. Louis Browns have begun to assume a threatening attitude toward their American league rivals.

After a bad start which followed them to remain out of the cellar only because of the Chicago White Sox were even less successful, the Browns wound up their recent eastern tour with a flourish of four victories in their last five games. Returning home Thursday they averaged two defeats in Boston by trimming the Red Sox 4 to 3, moved ahead of the losers into sixth place in the standing, virtually tied with Washington for the next higher notch.

Hornsby Hits Homer  
For seven innings the Browns couldn't do a thing with Frits Ostermuller, rookie left hander. Then Hornsby inserted himself as a pinch hitter in the eighth after another pinch batsman, Al Pezma had doubled, and smashed a homer that tied the score at 2-2. Ray Pepper and Earl Clark followed with doubles and Oscar Melillo singled for the other two St. Louis runs.

The Detroit Tigers made the only other American league gain as the western clubs, starting their home stands, swept the program. The Tigers beat out the league-leading Yankees 5 to 4 to give Tommy Bridges his first triumph over New York and moved into third place. The White Sox showed Philadelphia down to fourth by defeating the A's 7 to 3 in their first home game under Jimmy Dyke's management.

Indiana Downs Solons  
Cleveland's Indians spotted Washington four runs in the first two innings, then out lost with a 17 hit attack on four Senators pitchers that produced seven runs in the seventh and a final score of 14 to 4.

The Cubs regained the National league lead in their first game in the east as Chuck Klein socked his tenth and eleventh homers and led the way to a 10-3 triumph over the Phillies. Pittsburgh dropped to second when Earl Grace made a wild throw past first trying for a double play in the tenth inning of a hurling duel between Van Mungo and Bill Swift and the error gave Brooklyn a 3 to 1 decision.

The St. Louis-New York struggle for third place remained unchanged as both clubs won. The Cards defeated Boston 5 to 3 as Virgil Davis and Manager Frits Hornsby hit homers to back Paul Dean in his third pitching triumph. Big Fred Fitzsimmons pitched and battled the Giants to a 5 to 3 victory over Cincinnati, giving only four hits in the first seven innings and helping out with a homer.

G. P. Catcher  
Leads Hitters;  
Hurlers Tied

Al Droulette, Grants Pass catcher and former Pacific Coast league player, hammered out five hits in six trips to the plate against Shaw-Bertram Sunday, and took over the Southern Oregon league batting leadership with a mark of .552. Droulette's average shows a gain of 163 points over the preceding week.

Paul Hoffman, Medford outfielder and last week's leader, went hitless Sunday and dropped 113 points to a mark of .316.

Dean Joy, Medford catcher, went into second place as a result of a perfect day at bat against Ewauna. His average is .452.

Williams Nominal Leader  
Ken Williams, Grants Pass manager, inserted himself as a pinch hitter against Shaw-Bertram Sunday, and cracked out a single to take over the nominal leadership with an average of 1.000.

Wheeler, first baseman, leads the Ewauna hitters, batting .444. Wakeman heads the Shaw-Bertram players with a mark of .384.

Although at the top of the circuit, the Medford Rogues are next to last in team batting averages, hitting .223. Grants Pass leads with a mark of .352, followed by Ewauna with .250. Shaw-Bertram is batting .168.

Jack Hughes, big Medford right hander, and Earhart, sizzling Grants Pass southpaw, are ties for the top Southern Oregon league pitching spot with one victory apiece and no losses.
