

U. S. CHAMBER HEAD PRAISES HOUSING PLAN

WASHINGTON, May 18 (AP)—The administration housing program was praised today by Henry J. Harriman, president of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce, as one that would have a double social value in putting men to work and improving living conditions.

"I very heartily commend the bill," Harriman said, referring to its general outlines.

There is at present less than one room per capita for the nation as a whole, he said, adding that one and one-half rooms would not be excessive.

Harriman told the senate banking committee the nation is suffering primarily from lack of employment in the durable goods and construction industries.

Consumable goods industries have come back pretty well, he said, and are now running at about 90 per cent of capacity.

"This measure," he testified, "is one of the most important presented for your consideration. It attempts to give the necessary encouragement to private capital to go into the construction of houses."

Senator Coudens (R., Mich.) suggested that the bill was "putting the cart before the horse" and that, instead of trying to guarantee mortgages, workers' salaries should be assured.

"What's the use of putting the people further in debt when there is no assurance of income?" he asked.

Harriman suggested that was a difficult problem, but Coudens, obviously referring to employment insurance, said:

"Senator Wagner and I can do it."

"I thoroughly agree that unemployment insurance is coming," Harriman said.

Identity of Girl's Body Conclusive

The identity of one of the bodies found in Sand Creek canyon as that of Doris Sparks Blenkiron is absolutely definite, Sheriff Lloyd Low said Thursday night in connection with reports that the victim's mother still believed her daughter might be alive.

"There were too many checks," said Low. "The automobile was registered to Miss Sparks. The registration certificate with the name 'Doris Sparks Blenkiron' was in the car. The clothes on the body checked completely with the description of Miss Sparks' clothes as given us months before when she first disappeared. Her hair was the same color. These are only a few of the checks."

"In addition, the other body was definitely identified as that of Andrea Mardelle. Miss Mardelle was Miss Sparks' companion. There was no reason to believe the girl with Miss Mardelle was not Miss Sparks."

"The identification was conclusive."

An x-ray will be taken in about two weeks to see how the bone is knitting, it was said. The break in the large bone healed nicely after it was set at St. Petersburg, Fla., early in April. The leg was broken when Maranville slid to home plate during a training camp game with the Yankees.
