## CHICAGO HOLDS TO LEADERSHIP

Cubs Drop Phillies, 9 to 5, in Friday's Contest

NEW YORK, May 19, (UP)—Charlie Grimm's Cubs maintained their National League lead Friday by downing the Phillies, 9 to 5.

Chuck Klein started the scoring in the first with his 12th homer of the season. Four baggers by Hartnett and Stainback featured a six-run rally in the third. Guy Bush allowed 11 hits.

Pittsburgh bounced Brooklyn 8 to 3, after getting off to a flying start with fire runs in the first. The Braves walloped St. Louis, 6 to 2, slugging Winford, Haines, Rhem and Mooney for 13 safeties. Bill U-hanski led the Boston attack with four singles in five tries.

Lowly Cincinnati shaded the champion Giants 2 to 1. The Reds made their two runs in the sixth.

There were no changes in league standing.

Mickey Cochrane's fast stepping Tigers replaced Cleveland at second position in the American league after scoring their second straight triumph over the leading New York Yankees in Detroit.

Jack Dempsey Looks for Son to Bring Back Heavy Crown

NEW YORK, May 19, (UP)—Jack Dempsey hopes the stork will bring him a boy—a boy who will develop into another world heavyweight champion.

The former Manassa Mauler told all about it in Gene Norville's room at Jim London's swanky St. Moritz hotel. Gene managed Jack in 1926 and 1927.

Despite their former affiliation the only thing that saved Norville from having the put on him was Gene's recent abdominal operation. Gene and some of the other west coast racing men had Jack on the pan regarding his approaching fatherhood.

Norville cracked, "If it's a boy, he'll probably develop into a crooner. Jack has a beautiful tenor voice."

Jack told me not to pay any attention to racing fellows. He said he and his wife (Hannah Williams) are expecting a baby late in July.

"Honestly, now Jack," I said, "if you do have a boy, will you let him get into the fight racket?"

Jack was surprised. "Will I let him? Why, I hope he does get in. I think it's the grandest game of all."

"What I mean is this: If the boy is healthy and strong and has ability I'd like to see him get in and become champion. Of course if he's not cut out to be a fighter I wouldn't let him start out at it. One thing is certain. Whether it's a boy or girl, the child will receive a good education. That's something I missed."

Jack and Hannah haven't decided upon names for the baby. The former champion will be in town for about a week. He

has "some business" to clean up, and he will watch Max Baer train at Asbury park. N. J. Dempsey has a financial interest in the California heavy, and hopes Max will take the title from Carnera June 14.

Jack is in good condition. Jack believes he will beat the Primo. It will be a hard fight, he said.

Jack emphasized that his "business" in New York did not concern reports that he had been offered the matchmaking job at Madison Square Garden. He would not be interested, he said, unless the salary was "plenty high."

Dempsey who created the million dollar boxing gate with his fists, now has become one of the big attractions in wrestling as referee. In October he will go to Honolulu. He expects to extend that refereeing tour to Australia and Japan.
