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Tough Job Ahead

WHILE our minds are still on elections, give a thought to the job that awaits the voters in the fall.

In Klamath Falls, a mayor, five councilmen, police judge and city treasurer must be elected. Those who planned things for Klamath Falls provided two-year terms for all offices, with all terms expiring at once.

County offices to be filled in November are assessor, one county commissioner, district attorney and circuit judge.

Second district voters must elect a congressman. Klamath county voters will contribute their part toward the election of a governor, secretary of state, superintendent of public instruction, two state representatives, labor commissioner.

On top of all this, the boys who like to fill the ballot with measures are already at work.

Seventeen proposals for November measures have been made already. Undoubtedly, many will fail for lack of sufficient names, but there will be plenty on the ballot.

Most of us heaved a sigh of relief when the responsibilities of the primary passed. We would do well to gird ourselves for the fall. It looks like a tough election for the fellow who takes his citizenship seriously.

What Now?

Elimination of the sales tax at the primary election did not eliminate the condition which led the legislature reluctantly to adopt the sales tax as the only apparent remedy. Friday's vote merely left the problem without any immediate solution.

The distressed condition of school finances in Oregon is no myth and no joke. Conditions are much better in Klamath county than in many other Oregon counties. This is unquestionably in part due to the efficient operation of the county unit system which Grange Master Ray Gill, chief opponent of the sales tax, also is reported to be against.

This newspaper supported the sales tax. It is gratified that the tax passed in Klamath Falls, even though it lost in the county and the state as a whole. Let those who led in the defeat of the sales tax assume the responsibility therefor.

Those who voted for the sales tax voted to keep the schools open to Oregon children and to lift the heavy burden on property. They voted to spread out the load of school finance over all who profit thereby. Their consciences will be clear as these problems continue to fret the public mind.

The Boat Regatta

JUNE 17 is the date set for the boat regatta here under sponsorship of the Klamath County Junior Chamber of Commerce. This promises to be one of the largest events of this kind on the Pacific coast this year.

This is no small undertaking for the young men of the junior chamber of commerce. It involves a vast amount of detailed work. They not only originated the idea of the regatta, but they are willingly doing the work necessary.

No donations are being asked by the junior chamber to finance the regatta, except through the sale of buttons at a small price anybody can afford. In view of the value of the regatta to the community, and the fine spirit of the junior chamber in assuming the responsibility of putting it on, it should receive generous support in the button sale.

Calling attention to the fact that Claude Ingalls, editor of the Corvallis Gazette-Times, is to be the speaker at the annual chamber of commerce banquet next Monday evening. Mr. Ingalls is a vigorous thinker, a vigorous writer and a vigorous speaker. Hearing him at the chamber banquet will be well worth while. The attendance should be 100 per cent.

The Inside Story From The Capital

WASHINGTON, May 22.—The way the administration cornered opposition to the NRA is one of the revealing inside yarns of new deal technique.

Again President Roosevelt used his decoy system. He has had unusual success trapping his critics with this technique, but never such sensational success as in the current case.

It all started months ago, when Senators Borah and Nye were leading the attack on the NRA. They contended that the Johnsonian codes were strangling little business. There can be no question but what there was considerable basis for their argument.

At any rate, their case drew such marked attention that Mr. Roosevelt called them in. He proposed that a committee be appointed to investigate their charges and that they serve on the committee.

Borah and Nye were too foxy to get tied up in a thing like that, but they did consent to the formation of a committee. Nye, at least, co-operated to the extent of suggesting names for the committee. He is supposed to have named four of the members of the committee.

That was the Darrow committee.

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SHUDDER

There were no two more disappointed men in the world last Monday morning than Senators Borah and Nye when they read the Darrow report.

They are good, sensible republican liberals, but not socialists or communists. Their liberalism shines occasionally by contrast with the doctrines of some of the conservatives of their party, but they are not radicals.

Yet, here was all their good material against the NRA in the Darrow report completely topped by the recommendation for socialization of all industry and an end of the profit system.

It was enough to make them shudder, and they did.

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WAR KINGS

Somewhere along the way of preparing the report, Mr. Darrow had been led into offering the socialistic remedy. Only the insiders know that portions of the report were written five or six times after he conferred with administration authorities.

It was upon one of these re-writing occasions that the socialization theory found a place in the report. It is supposed to have been put in by Mr. Darrow's chief writer, Charles Edward Russell, with assistance from a member of the committee, who played very close to General Johnson.

At any rate, it gave the administration a perfect response. The boys had been breathing hard and were worried before the report was made public. They thought it might prove very damaging to the new deal. After they saw it, their faces were wreathed in smiles. All they had to say was: "These NRA opponents are socialists and communists."

Some of the sincere opponents of the NRA, however, are political by-play. The best inside data indicates clearly that the administration is going to put the NRA through the wringer during the next few months. It will adopt the best features of the Darrow report.

Also, if there is sufficient basis to the Borah-Nye charges, as they contend, the matter can't end with the Darrow report. In fact, it appears the debate has only started.

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NO STORY

The real story behind republican preparations for the election of national chairman next month is that there is no story. No inside fighting is discernible. No one seems to have an active candidate. The eastern crowd appears to want to appease the west under all circumstances. The westerners as yet have no candidate of their own.

The boys may possibly agree on Walter Hallahan, well-to-do West Virginian, or some one like that, or they may cling to their original idea of letting Vice Chairman Ralph Williams serve until after the congressional elections.

There appears to be rather strong sentiment underneath in favor of choosing some one new, but no one knows who.

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UNIQUE

There is one, and only one, democrat in the house of representatives running for re-election on a program of full-fledged opposition to the new deal. He is James L. Claiborne of St. Louis. Claiborne voted against everything except the NRA and has lately turned against that.

The answer is he is running in a normally republican district, which, however, now is supposed to include considerable new deal sentiment.

There seems to be a better chance for off legislation before adjournment. The experts in that line agree legislation is necessary to save the code, now that the test valuation case has gone over until fall in the supreme court.

Ogden Mills is the only republican outside of congress who is attracting any national attention, but liberals within the party are dead set against him for any position.

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There is a group of democratic senators in the senate who call themselves "the common people." They organized spontaneously and fre-

quently consult each other on voting. Included in the group of 10 or 12 are Bone, Bulow, Erickson, Long, Pope and Wheeler.

Mr. Roosevelt thought it was great, but added: "I would have to get an angel to administer it and I am afraid none of them have had enough business experience."
