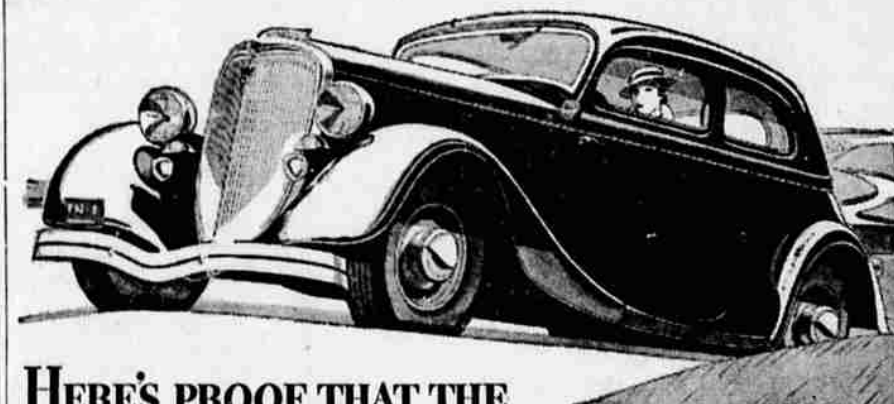

INTEREST SHOWN IN NEGRO SINGERS

On Thursday evening of this week at 8 o'clock, the California Echo Quartet, which appeared recently in this city before various clubs, in the Presbyterian church, and Klamath Union high school, is again to sing at the First Presbyterian church. This quartet of negroes will present a full concert program consisting of old-time southern melodies and negro spirituals.

A noted musical authority claims that the only original American music is found among the negroes of the south in their simple, rhythmic spirituals that pre-date the days of slavery and that strengthened and comforted their race during the long period of oppression. These songs that have a humorous touch to the white race are genuine expressions of the longings and aspirations of the colored people.

A southern woman, who heard the Echo Quartet on its visit a short time ago, said on that occasion, "If these singers return, I'll have the church filled. They are the genuine old-time spiritual singers." Others who missed hearing them will be glad to avail themselves of this rare opportunity.

No admission is to be charged, but an offering will be received, which is to be used for local work among the colored people and also for the establishment of an aged peoples home for the same race.

All of the singers are Christian men. The manager, the Rev. John H. Leonard, is an ordained minister. They have been appearing in Portland recently and are coming from there direct to Klamath Falls.

OREGON MAY FILE ACTION OVER LIQUOR

PORTLAND, May 23, (AP).—On the contention that Oregon is not just in the "liquor" business, but rather, in the liquor "control" business, this state may file a petition for a rehearing of the United States supreme court ruling that states which monopolize the sale of intoxicating liquor must pay federal taxes.

The supreme court ruling was handed down Monday in the case of Ohio.

The court held that "whenever

a state engages in a business of a private nature it exercises non-governmental functions, and the business, though conducted by the state, is not immune from the exercise of the power of taxation which the constitution vests in the congress." The supreme court agreed that the principle has been established that "the instrumentalities, means and operations whereby the states exert the governmental powers belonging to them are exempt from taxation by the United States," but it held that "the immunity of the states from federal taxation is limited to those agencies which are of a governmental character."

If such action would not be in contempt of court, the Oregon control commission probably will petition for a rehearing, it was said by Alex G. Barry, Oregon liquor commissioner.

The Oregon commission now pays the federal government a fee of \$25 on each of its state-controlled stores and agencies, and a tax of \$10 for the right

to wholesale liquor, in addition to the gallonage tax.

George L. Sammis, administrator for the commission, declared government taxes already were so high as to make it difficult to compete with the bootlegger.
