

COUNTY CWA REPORT MADE BY BALDWIN

A survey of the whole Klamath county civil works program, which gave hundreds of unemployed jobs last winter and resulted in widespread public improvements, has been prepared by Manager Will Baldwin.

Under the CWA plan, the projects were carried on under various political divisions, such as the city and county school districts, city of Klamath Falls and county of Klamath. The major portion of the cost was provided by the federal government for labor and materials, with the political subdivisions providing a part of the expenses for the latter. The government spent around \$200,000 in Klamath county on CWA.

Baldwin's complete report, showing the scope of the whole program in detail, follows:

School District No. 1.
Project No. 1—Riverside school—Consisting of grading and filling the school grounds, building a rock retaining wall on the lower side of the hill and a protection fence to preclude the possibility of accidents to children by falling over the wall. Total cost \$5,842.03.

Project No. 22—Roosevelt school—A modern cafeteria was installed in the basement of Roosevelt school. This is a splendid piece of work, of which the community is justly proud. Total cost \$3,039.78.

Project No. 32—This project consisted of painting the exterior of six city schools, as follows: Fairview, Joseph Conner, Pelican, Mills, Riverside and Roosevelt. Total cost \$2,071.52.

Project No. 37—Fairview school—Waterproofing basement wall and installing drain pipe along west wall—a much needed improvement. Total cost \$108.10.

Project No. 38—Fairview school—Installing cafeteria in basement, a very necessary improvement. Total cost \$262.30.

Project No. 41—This project proposed the grading of playgrounds at Pelican and Mills schools, but was not entirely completed at the time the CWA work was discontinued. Total cost \$2,060.70.

Project No. 45—This project consisted of building an annex to Fremont school to be used as warehouse for supplies for the city schools. This was completed, with the exception of painting, at the time of discontinuance of CWA work. Total cost \$1,454.87.

County Projects.

Project No. 3—County roads in Townships 39 and 40—grading and surfacing. There has been much improvement in the roads under the CWA work, but there is still much work needed. This work was not completed at the time of discontinuance of CWA.

Project No. 10—Improving Market street throughout the county. This project was not completed because of discontinuance of CWA. However, the Market Roads of Klamath were materially improved under this project. Total cost \$6,892.06.

Klamath County.

Project No. 11—Midland fencing. On the road cut through from Homedale to Dixon Lane, two miles of woven wire fence was completely built. Several miles of new fences were constructed in the Midland and Lower Klamath lake districts. Total cost \$4,750.50.

Project No. 12—Chiloquin-Braymill road. This project consisted of widening and grading the road from Chiloquin to Braymill. Total cost \$3,420.17.

Project No. 34—County roads. This was a county-wide project, grading and surfacing old roads, and new roads were cleared, graded and surfaced. This project covered work at Crescent, Hildebrand, Bly, Langell Valley, Goodlow Mountain, Malin and Merrill districts. Total cost \$10,136.30.

Project No. 35—Klamath county fairgrounds. General improvement on grounds and Exhibit building. The interior of Exhibit building was completely celled, the interior and exterior painted; paddocks moved, race track enlarged. Work on building track had just begun when CWA terminated. Total cost \$11,537.13.

Project No. 44—Klamath county courthouse. Under this project a complete new roof was placed on the courthouse; the walls of the first and second floors, with the exception of the court room, were repainted. This project is being completed by the county court. Total cost \$2,238.46.

Project No. 53—Veterans Memorial. Interior of building remodeled, making larger quarters; interior painted and roof repaired. Work not completed at the time of discontinuance of CWA. Total cost \$2,000.57.

Project No. 8-3—Eradication of predatory animals. During the time this project was in operation from February 15th to March 31, 48 animals were destroyed, and out of 240 baits

placed, all were taken except 48.

Total cost \$163.75.

City of Klamath Falls Projects.

Project No. 2—Moore Park. A fire guard was cleared along the boundary of the park; several acres of brush and undergrowth grubbed and moved; the dam was repaired and paved with clay; an underground sprinkler system was installed in the area between the keeper's cottage and the tennis courts. Total cost \$9,357.09.

Project No. 4—City streets. This project consisted of cutting through First and Second streets, grading west High street, Cedar and Juniper streets, Lakeview and several other streets in Fairview and Lakeview districts graded and gravelled. Total cost \$13,598.26.

Project No. 6—Storm sewer—Eldorado and Oak streets. 1400 feet of 15-inch vitrified sewer pipe installed. Total cost \$3,860.24.

Project No. 8—Storm sewer—Mills addition. 700 feet of 24-inch concrete pipe placed and new sewer pump installed. Total cost \$4,799.72.

Project No. 9—Sidewalks. Building 800 feet of walks on South Sixth street, California avenue and Nevada avenue. Total cost \$3,304.83.

Project No. 31—Storm sewer across Ewauna Box company property. Pump house constructed. Total cost \$4,521.68.

Project No. 36—City Hall. Renovating and painting. Under this project, the City Hall was thoroughly renovated. Approach to the old fire department equipment was lowered to level of sidewalk and the interior was kalsomined and painted throughout. Total cost \$2,972.70.

Project No. 42—City streets and bridges. Repairing bridges at Lincoln, Eleventh street, Esplanade and the east end of Main street across U. S. R. S. canal. Also laid concrete pavement adjacent to postoffice property on Oak street. Total cost \$5,482.92.

Project No. 54—Mapping of underground sewers and water lines for the city of Klamath Falls. This project was only fairly started at the time of discontinuance of CWA work. Total cost \$214.29.

Airports.
Project No. 7—This project consisted of preliminary work on Klamath Falls airport, clearing, grubbing and leveling 150 acres. Total cost \$2,717.11.

Project No. 47—Municipal airport, Klamath Falls. Under this project the runway was increased in width to 100 feet, and in length to 3000 feet, graded and surfaced with crushed rock. Total cost \$15,541.52.

Project No. 48—Chiloquin airport. Consisted of clearing, grubbing and leveling site for emergency landing field. This site embraced 140 acres of timber land. Timber and stumps were removed. The clearing on this project was approximately 75 per cent completed. Total cost \$5,251.61.

Outside City Projects in Klamath County.
Project No. 5—Chiloquin city streets. The principal streets of Chiloquin were graded, drains installed, and streets surfaced with gravel and cinders. Total cost \$3,327.44.

Project No. 16—Malin city streets. One and one-third miles small irrigation ditches constructed. 3 1/2 miles of streets graded to 80 feet wide. One street 80 feet wide was gravelled 600 feet in length. 1000 feet of gravelled streets were repaired. One street 80 feet wide by 300 feet long was constructed through solid rock. A park covering one city block was leveled, irrigation system installed, paths constructed. 45 trees planted and a rock terrace constructed. Total cost \$5,673.81.

Project No. 17—Merrill city streets. Complete system of gravelled walks installed, primary streets graded and surfaced with gravel. Storm drains installed. Total cost \$1,578.30.

Project No. 18—Bonanza city streets. Streets were graded and surfaced with gravel. Gravelled walks constructed. Total cost \$4,792.85.

Project No. 19—Bonanza city library. Lot was graded and a frame building 24x36 feet constructed on a stone foundation. 370 lineal feet of picket fence was erected and whitewashed. Building is equipped with modern plumbing, built-in kitchen and large stone fireplace, and painted interior and exterior. Total cost \$2,805.79.

Project No. 39—Chiloquin city park. Clearing, grubbing and grading a park site in West Chiloquin. Underbrush cleared, drain pipe installed and toboggan erected. Total cost \$1,916.77.

Irrigation Districts.
Project No. 13—Langell Valley. Seven miles of distributing canals were enlarged and check gates installed. Total cost \$2,201.72.

Project No. 14—Maline Three miles of canals enlarged, laterals cleaned and enlarged; 230 yards of rock excavated, 11,500 feet of lumber used in constructing flumes and check gates. Total cost \$1,970.40.

Project No. 15—Horsefly. Distributing canals enlarged, new

laterals excavated, old laterals enlarged and check gates installed. Total cost \$3,929.21.

Project No. 20—Enterprise. Culvert installed under main canal of Klamath Reclamation project and excavated 2 1/2 miles of drain. New check gates installed. Total cost \$4,596.10.

Project No. 21—Pine Grove. General improvement, enlarging canals, constructing two siphons under main canal of U. S. R. S. and excavated drain canal. Total cost \$2,844.82.

County School District.
Project No. 23—This was a county-wide project affecting all rural schools of Klamath County School District, as follows:

Olene—Lawn, playground clearing and drain.
Dairy—Playground work, leveling, etc.
Keno—Playground work and moving of garage.
Bly—Retaining walls and lawn and playground work.
Pine Grove—Ground clearing and tree trimming.
Hildebrand—Grounds cleared and walks built.
Lower Poe—Gravel and clearing.
Crystal—Grounds cleared and building repair.
Warden—Building salvaged.
Malin—Grounds prepared, painting, shower rooms, toilets in gymnasiums installed, library tiled.
Swan—Building salvaged.
Spring Lake—Playground work.
Klamath Agency—Building salvaged.

Crescent—Grounds cleared, fence removed, toilets repaired.
Sprague River—Stage and kitchen built.
Chemult—Ground cleared. Total cost \$4,285.78.

Project No. 24—Morrill. The work on this project included building an addition to the present gymnasium for the housing of a bleacher section, and also ceiling the gymnasium. In addition to this an additional shower room was built and equipped and certain stage improvements made. Total cost \$1,973.64.

Project No. 25—Altamont. The work on this project included the addition of a bleacher section to the present gymnasium, and ceiling the gymnasium. This park and athletic field contains approximately nine acres, and this was seeded to grass and trees and shrubs were planted. Total cost \$1,579.57.

Project No. 27—Henley. The work on this project included the addition of a stage measuring 42x18 feet, including two dressing rooms. There was also built a bleacher section on one side of the gymnasium. This park and athletic field contains approximately nine acres, and this was seeded to grass and trees and shrubs were planted. Total cost \$1,579.57.

Project No. 28—Chiloquin. The work here was confined largely to grading down and leveling a playground. Certain other improvements such as clearing, etc., was carried on. The building at Klamath Agency was partly salvaged on this project. Total cost \$871.59.

Project No. 29—Summers. The work here included the erection of a vocational training building. This was built, painted, and a large part of the cabinet work done on the project. The building is 24x78 feet in size. Total cost \$3,133.94.

Project No. 46—This was a general county project and included largely painting and decorating gymnasiums, schools and cottages of the county district. Work was carried on as follows:

Bonanza—Painting the gymnasium.
Bly—A community kitchen was built in connection with the gymnasium. It was also painted and decorated.
Merrill—The gymnasium was painted inside and outside.
Crescent—The teacher's cottage was painted on the inside.
Henley—Both teacher's cottage and the janitor's quarters as well as cafeteria and garage were painted.
Algoma—The gymnasium was celled completely and painted inside and outside.
Sprague River—The gymnasium was celled and painted and kitchen added on this project. Lamm's Mill—The school building was painted on outside.
Altamont—Gymnasium was painted outside and all school building trim was also painted. This project was discontinued because of the easing of CWA work. Total cost \$3,427.28.

Educational Projects.
Project No. 32—This project consisted of two vocational and illiterate classes held under the supervision of Mr. Paul T. Jackson at Klamath Union high school and a nursery school at Mills school under the supervision of Mr. J. P. Wells. The vocational and illiterate classes were maintained over a period of seven weeks and the nursery school was maintained over a period of five weeks under CWA. The nursery school is being continued under SEHA. The classes at the high school were attended by about 200 persons. There are classes in hygiene and lectures on health. Total cost \$372.03.

State Projects.
Project No. 40—Crooked creek fish hatchery. This project was sponsored by the State Fish and Game Commission and consisted of providing adequate facilities for storing the young trout until they are sufficiently developed to be planted in the fishing streams. The project was not completed at time of discontinuance of C. W. A. work, but will be continued under S. E. R. A. Total cost, \$3679.98.

Women's Projects
Project No. 49—Welfare Center. An office sponsored by the League of Women Voters, under the direction of Mrs. C. E. Dennis, to find employment for women. There was also considerable Red Cross sewing. Total cost \$255.80.

Project No. 50—County Library. Repairing and indexing work at County Library—2 women employed. This project was carried on over a period of 13 weeks. Total cost \$193.55.

Project No. 51—City Library. Repairing and indexing—employed 2 women. Project carried over period of 8 weeks. Total cost, \$121.80.

Other County Projects
Project No. 33—Modoc Athletic Field. The field was leveled and surfaced with sandy loam. This project was not completed, but will be continued under S. E. R. A. Total cost, \$1847.55.

Project No. 52—Dismantling Old Klamath County High school. The old high school building was

dismantled and the material salvaged. This building belonged to the Klamath County School Unit. The material will all be used in the construction of new buildings and additions throughout the county. This project is being continued under SEHA. After the materials are removed from the grounds, the property will be taken over by the City of Klamath Falls and improved for park purposes. Total cost \$3,382.80.

Project No. 30—Remodeling top floor of courthouse. Under this project, the old jail on the third floor of the courthouse was renovated and converted into offices. It housed the staffs of the County Relief and CWA. It is now the quarters of the SEHA. Total cost \$469.20.

There was a total expended on these projects of \$220,052.57.

The peak number of employees on CWA work was 857 men and women.

There were a few accident cases, varying from non-compensable to compensable cases, with no major injuries. Under CWA the accident compensation was handled direct by the federal government. In Klamath district, this work was under the direction of Arthur W. Lawrence, safety director.
