"Egg Beater" Craft To Compete in Upper Lake Event

One of the features of the Upper Klamath Lake Boat Regatta will be an "egg beater" race. An "egg beater" in this instance means any motor under seven horsepower.

The rules call for any type of craft as long as it is not powered by a motor over seven horsepower. Many novel craft are being constructed to enter in this race. One is an old metal bath tub with a mast in the center, upon which will be stretched a suit of old red flannels in addition to the "egg beater." Cash prizes are offered for the winners in this event.

LEADERS FIGHT FOR ADVANTAGE

National League Teams Bunched Closely in Stirring Race

The current trend of the National league race, instead of heading toward a decision, appears to be toward keeping the four contenders as closely bunched as possible.

Today's standing found Pittsburgh's Pirates with a clear lead of a half game after their 7-3 triumph over the Boston Braves, coupled with New York's 7 to 1 victory over the Cubs. Chicago had dropped to third a few percentage points behind the Cards, who trounced Brooklyn 7-3 while the four-place Giants were only one game out of the lead.

Rookie Aids Pirates

A home run by Harry (Cookie) Lavagetto, rookie infielder, set off the Pittsburgh fireworks. It came in the seventh to give the Bucs a 3-2 lead in a duel between Bill Swift and Ed Brandt; then Pittsburgh went on to get four more tallies in the eighth. Carl Hubbell, trounced by the Cards his last time out, held Chicago to four singles while the Giants belted Bud Tinning and Jim Weaver to score in six innings.

The Cardinals advance resulted from steady and timely hitting with Dutch Leonard as the principal victim, plus a couple of Brooklyn misplays and some effective hurling by Tex Carleton. Curt Davis won the other National league contest for the Phillies, 5 to 0, as he limited the Cincinnatians to three hits.

Browns Move Ahead

The St. Louis Browns continued their sparkling American league advance into third place by a 6 to 5 victory over Washington as Ray Pepper hit a home-run with Harland Cliff on base in the seventh to win the game. Detroit stepped one percentage point behind the Browns despite a 6 to 3 triumph over the Athletics, gained when the Tigers smashed Johnny Marcum for four doubles and six singles, most of them in the early innings.

The Yanks stopped their downward slide by taking a 2 to 1 victory over the Chicago White Sox behind Lefty Gomez while Cleveland and Boston were rained out. Gomez, who won the only other Yankee victory in the west, held the Sox to three hits.

Shaw-Bertram Hurler Leads League Ratings

Al Droulette, Grants Pass catcher, went hitless against Ewauna Sunday, but retained his Southern Oregon league batting leadership.

The fighting hurler has walked 9 hits in 18 trips to the plate for an average of .500.

Wheeler, Ewauna, went into second place as a result of two bingles against Grants Pass. He is batting .482 from 6 hits out of 13 times at bat.

Dean Joy, Medford reliever, leads his team with an average of 4.38. With Hoffard close behind, hitting .375.

Wakeman heads the Shaw-Bertram regulars with a mark of .444.

Stanisha, Shaw-Bertram hurler, went into a tie with McLean for the actual pitching leadership of the league. Each have won 2 games and lost 1 for a percentage of .667. Earhart, Grants Pass, is the nominal leader, winning one and losing none.

Dane, Indian Compete in Main Event Match at Legion Hall

The crunching headlocks of Charley Hansen, the powerful Dane from Seattle, will compete tonight against the upstart Indian holds of Chief Little Wolf, the Navajo from Denver.

Wolf and Hansen, meeting in the one hour main event, will strive to protect equally admirable records in the Legion hall arena. Both have attained similar popularity for victory.

Windup Gains Attention

The Indian has been a recent and consistent main event here. His only defeat came against rough Billy Edwards of Kansas City, but to offset this he is credited with wins over Paul Murdoch and Pete Belcastro.

Hansen stepped the long and victorious record set up over a period of over a year by Al Karasick, Russian Lion from Portland. He gave two of the outstanding wrestling exhibitions of the season when he met Ted Thye, Portland, and Leslie Wolfe, Dallas, Texas.
