The local I. O. O. F. lodge was represented by Mr. Wattenburg, Vernon Keese, J. C. French and Mr. Steinmetz.

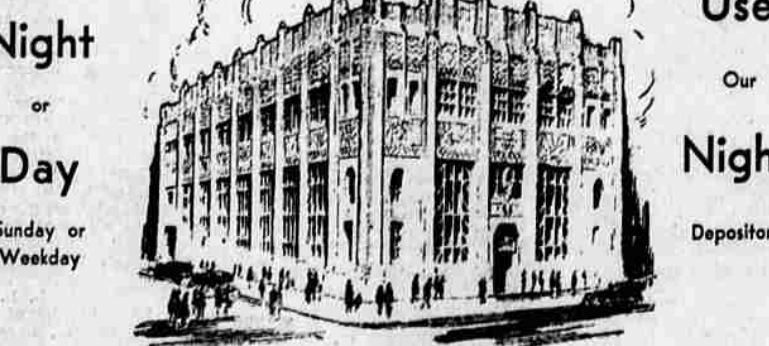
