

KLAMATH MAN FATALLY HURT IN ACCIDENT

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found evidence to support Stinson's statement that after the accident he stopped and helped load Wonn in the bus. While they found no one who remembered seeing Stinson there, there was a great deal of excitement at the time. The bus driver said he remembered seeing a car parked beside the road with the door open. Stinson had told officers he stopped his car on the roadside, left the door open and went back.

Stinson came into the city, looked up Carl Cook, police officer, and reported the accident immediately. Harry Lytle and Robert Smith, who were about 25 feet distant from Wonn at the time he was struck, were questioned about details of the accident.

The officers said witnesses had told them Wonn was at the Oasis before starting home. Wonn was an employee of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company. Al Johnson, 42, wood cutter of this city was lodged in the city jail last night charged with driving an automobile while under the influence of intoxicating liquor following another accident at the corner of Martin street and Sixth street, about 8 o'clock. Johnson's truck collided with a car driven by A. Becker, of Klamath Falls. Neither was injured and only minor damage done to the vehicles, according to police reports. Clarence Enloe Jr., reported a minor accident between his car and one driven by Bill Tingley at the corner of Eldorado and Main streets at 9:30 o'clock. No injuries were reported and only minor damages.

Outbreaks Mar Dock Strikes

Pair Gets Rest
Rosal and Codas no sooner stopped their motor and its propeller than a crowd of officials and mechanics and others numbering about 1,000 surrounded the plane.

Immediately a motorcycle escort was rushed to the plane to pick the fliers up as soon as they alighted and escort them to a hangar for a little rest while the repairs were being made.

When they brought their plane to land, Rosal and Codas had been in the air 38 hours and 28 minutes since their takeoff from Le Bourget field, Paris, and had covered a distance of approximately 3,700 miles of their projected flight to the west coast.

Rosal, who was at the controls when the Joseph Le Brix landed on American soil, was the first to get out. He was in the full uniform of a French officer.

Codas followed him smiling broadly, and appearing comfortable in his shirt sleeves. Both men looked very tired, particularly Rosal.

The crowd, which screamed a

welcome to the French aces, burst through police lines and surrounded both men and the plane. With motorcycle officers pushing a way through the mob, the men were led to the administration building where another police detail was having its hands full handling that part of the crowd which had not gotten onto the field.

While taxiing their ship from the cross runway up the field to the hangars, the dump valve on the fuel tanks came open again and a flood of gasoline poured out in the wake of the plane and its fiery exhaust pipes.

Accident is Averted
As soon as officials reached the ship, they signaled to Rosal and Codas to shut off the motor. When the fliers saw what had happened they immediately closed their throttle and stopped where they were.

Field officials said the danger of fire had been imminent. Although their faces were wreathed in smiles as police escorted them through the crowds, both fliers appeared nearly exhausted from their flight.

Prize Money Lost
They asked for cigarettes and acknowledged the cheers of the crowd as they passed on to the administration building. Some of the crowd tried to push through and shake hands as they passed.

A countryman of Rosal rushed up to him and greeted him. "I'm not at all happy," Rosal said.

"We are not content—we are disappointed not to be able to complete the flight for the prize. The prize referred to by Rosal is \$66,000 offered by the French government for a non-stop flight from France to the Pacific coast—the goal of the fliers."

Spider Control Plans Studied

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walls, rock gardens, piles of debris, drains, garages and even basements. Adult spiders should be killed at once, and a thorough spraying be given the premises to kill the hatching young and the unhatched eggs in cases.

There are three or four sprays that may be used to advantage, according to the county agent, and more definite and absolute measures will be outlined later. The known sprays include fuel oil, kerosene, chloride of lime, and formaldehyde. All will do some good, whether or not their results will be absolute.

Houses should also be sprayed at once with any fly killing solution in order to kill any young spiders which may have moved into houses to seek new quarters. The younger the spider the more easily it is killed.

The Black Widow is the most poisonous spider in the United States, and is declared by authorities to be more venomous than a rattlesnake. Its bite will cause severe pain, critical illness and often death.

Identification Listed
The local infestation, while believed to include all of the city, seems particularly heavy in the Hot Springs district and on the hills back of the town. The warm earth of the hillside has cracked, and these cracks are teeming with the poisonous spiders, as are rock gardens and walls.

The Black Widow may be identified by the following description: body the size of a little finger-tip, shiny-black and marked with a bright red spot formed like an hour-glass, on the body.

Anyone receiving a bite from one of these spiders is urged to call a physician immediately. It is probable that recommendations from the U. S. public health bureau will include a first aid treatment for victims as well as control measures.

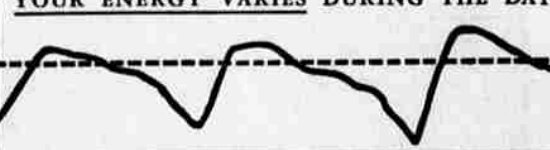
