Like Carr, he has ridden in every major roundup in North America. Every name known to thousands of people, the array of roundup talent is impressive.

Kermit Maynard, brother of Ken Maynard of film fame, is expected to do some fancy roping and steer throwing. Buff Jones, Burbank, Calif., trick rider has agreed to compete in quite a number of events. Frank McCarroll is in the line-up for bulldogging, which he is capable of doing in 10 seconds and less.

The colored cowboy, Pete Jeannette, Sacramento, Calif., will be on hand with his trained mule to add comedy to a show. TWO SENTENCED TO FIVE YEARS

Sentences of five years each were given Silas Barclay and Kenneth Moore when they pleaded guilty before Judge W. M. Duncan Monday to charges of assault with intent to commit robbery. They were accused in connection with an assault upon Herman and Cecil Seaman, in a cabin in the northern part of the county on December 26.

Some confusion was caused in court by Barclay's delay in making up his mind about the plea. Moore pleaded guilty Monday morning, and Barclay entered a not guilty plea, apparently surprising the authorities. The circuit court juryman were called in order to start the trial, and impaneling of the jury begun.

Then Barclay changed his mind, rather than stand trial on the more serious charge, which carries a minimum sentence of 10 years, decided to plead guilty to the lesser count. The sentencing followed and the two men will probably be taken to Salem Tuesday.

LAKEVIEW

LAKEVIEW, Ore.—The sales tax gained strength this year in Lake county, but still the measure lost by a 325 vote margin. The only precincts where the tax carried were the two in Lakeview where the business and professional men and their employees reside.

Many voters were of the opinion that the only type of school relief need in Lake county is a reduction in school costs through the adoption of the county school plan of school administration. The plan should save \$20,000 annually. Lake county has about 2000 more taxpayers than inhabitants. More than 50 per cent of the tax revenue is paid by persons living outside of the county.

Bids were received here this week by the state land board from numerous persons desiring to lease several thousand acres of Warner valley swamp land for grazing purposes. A large portion of this area was deeded by the government to the state within the past six months.

Miss Louise Cottrell, executive secretary of the state child welfare committee, has been spending this week in Lake county cooperating with the Lake County Health association. She spoke before the Lake county chamber of commerce on the subject.
