Giving Darrow and His Report Support



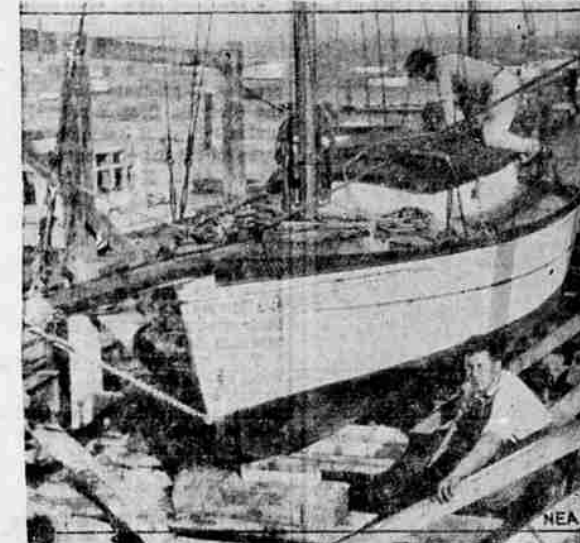

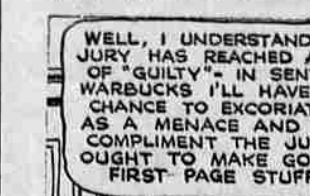
