Editorials On the Day's News

DOWN here in the Klamath country the other day we had a case of snake bite.

It was so UNUSUAL that it got onto the front pages of the newspapers—here and rather generally over the state.

YET snakes are quite common here. As a matter of fact, Klamath had something of a reputation as a snake center a few years ago—a reputation we have not lived down yet, and may never live down.

These snakes, of course, that gave us our reputation weren't of the poisonous variety. They got attention by reason of their number; not because of their menace to human life.

But we have plenty of rattlesnakes, as anyone can testify. Yet rattlesnake bites are so rare as to cause quite a commotion when they occur.

THE point is that these black widow spiders that are creating such a stir in our midst are probably nowhere near as bad as they seem at the moment to be. California has had them for years and years—millions of 'em. Yet California isn't depopulated as a result. The tourists haven't given California the run-around because of the black widow spiders.

Not so you could notice it, at least. California seems to have been doing very nicely by itself in the way of tourists.

OVER in the Willamette valley, they were all stirred up about earwigs a few years ago. The earwigs were just simply going to eat 'em out of house and home. Every city that really amounted to anything had its earwig inspector, and on top of that they called in earwig experts from the federal government.

But the Willamette valley still exists. The earwigs didn't take it. Things are going on over there just about as they were before earwigs were first heard of. The black widow spiders won't take Klamath.

THIS newspaper has had quite a little to say in its columns about these spiders.

They are new and strange. Their presence may involve some danger, just as rattlesnakes and fever ticks and the wrong kind of mushrooms involve some danger. If so, we ought to know as much about them as we can—and the business of the newspaper is to tell of things we ought to know about.

But let's not get all excited and lose our appetite because of them. We'll live through them, and if we take reasonable and sensible precautions we won't be hurt.

SPEAKING of snakes, Bob Sprout was reminded yesterday of a relative of his up in the high country of Montana. He was sleeping out one night, when a rattlesnake crawled chummily (Continued on Page Four)

Special Circumstances of Debtor Nations Will Be Observed.

ACT CONNECTED WITH BRITISH

President's Statement Believed Forerunner to Conference.

WASHINGTON, June 1 (P)

President Roosevelt, in a report to congress today on war debts, held out a promise for discussions of revision of present funding agreements to any European debtor nations who ask and present "special circumstances relating to means and methods of payment."

BRITISH Note Expected

In some official quarters, the president's statement concerning possible conferences was considered significant as a prelude to Great Britain's note on the debts question expected here any time.

Discussion Welcomed

The presidential message in the main was a factual recording of the debts status, as to defaults, token payments and the like.

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
