CHAMPIONSHIP BOATS ENTERED

Ward Angiller of Marysville Will Compete on Upper Lake

A Pacific coast champion, Ward Angiller of Marysville, Calif., Friday became the first outboard racing driver to send in his entry blanks for the Klamath Lake Regatta on June 17.

The Californian, well known for his fast craft, will enter three boats in three different events. It is possible he will enter a fourth boat before the entry lists close.

Holds Hydro Title. Angiller will enter the C and F hydro races and the runabout event. If he brings a fourth boat, it will be placed in the competitive class of the B motors.

The names of his boats are the Lollypop, Sweetheart and the Lollypop Evinrude.

Angiller holds the Pacific coast championship in the C hydro and C racing runabout divisions. His boats set records in both events. The Marysville sportsman won the southern Oregon C championship at Medford last season along with the D and F hydro titles.

Coast Racing High. He holds the Lorimer trophy and the highest amateur rating on the coast. Besides this already outstanding record, Angiller has taken first in six races out of nine starts this season.

More entry blanks are expected here within the next few days. The total list of outboard drivers is expected to make the regatta one of the most important in the northwest.

Sailboats Prepared. At least 13 craft will be entered in the sailboat contest, the most beautiful race on the program. Owners of boats in Klamath Falls were busy this week in preparation for a defense against invading sailboats. Three sailboats will be brought here from Bend.

A number of Klamath sailboats were expected to be placed in the water Sunday for the first time this season.

Meanwhile, workers for the Junior Chamber of Commerce, the organization sponsoring the event, continued their booster activities. Officials reported excellent progress in the sale of sponsor buttons.

Posters now decorate windows in leading Oregon, California and Washington cities advertising an event which will bring scores of visitors to Klamath Falls on June 17.

BOXERS MEET HERE TONIGHT

Brown and Ray Headline Opening Boxing Card of Season.

The fight game, gone from the Legion hall for many months, makes its reappearance tonight, when Elmer "Buz" Brown, the boxing master of the Northwest featherweights, directs his puncher toward Johnny Ray of Spokane in a six-round main event.

Boxers in all five bouts were on hand in Klamath Falls Friday morning ready for their first Legion hall contests since wrestling ascended to the throne of popularity long ago.

Brown Gains Favor Despite the general opinion favoring Brown to win the main event, Ray managed to hold the respect of ring followers. The Spokane fighter, reputedly a stronger hitter than Brown, will hold a slight weight advantage over his opponent.

Brown has never lost a match in Klamath Falls. Several months ago the young man from St. Paul waded through a series of matches here without even taking a draw. Some were won by knockouts and the rest by decisions.

Frankie Monroe, Klamath Falls and Lakewood lightweight, will be looking for revenge when he goes against Johnny Shaw, a negro, in the six-round semi-wind-up. Monroe and Shaw met at Medford last Tuesday with the negro taking the decision.

Shaw Heavier Shaw is a newcomer to Klamath Falls, but Monroe is well known for brilliant fights in the past. The Klamath fighter will be outweighed by about five pounds.

Jack Hibbard, 150, Klamath Falls, and Cliff Hottenger of Oakland renew a feud started at Merrill two weeks ago, when they blasted their way through a ten round main event to a draw. It was such an outstanding struggle Mack Lillard, Klamath promoter, immediately signed them for the six round feature at the Legion hall.

Two preliminaries—both four-rounders—will send off the card at 8:30 o'clock.

Northwest Division Schools Compete on Track at Eugene

EUGENE, Ore., June 1. (AP)—The Pacific northwest's major track and field pageant was awaited by athletes of the six northern division coast conference colleges who gathered here today for the annual conference meet.

The preliminaries today almost assumed proportions of a separate meet with qualifying heats to be held in 11 events preparatory to the finals in the 15 events tomorrow.

A close meet is expected, with Washington State, defending champion and 1934 dual titlist, favored to win.

While some of the conference records appeared safe from the assault of the group of talented performers, Colonel Bill Hayward, University of Oregon track coach, looked for new records in four or five events.

Big George Theodoratus of Washington State college has been putting the shot in excess of the conference record consistently. Bobby Parke of Oregon has bettered the record in the javelin.

Edmiston of Washington and Wagner of Oregon both have covered the two-mile within a few seconds of the record time of 9:30.4. Feden of Montana, Shoemaker of Oregon and Plumb of Washington have been timed in 2:13 this year, three-tenths of a second better than the record.

The 440 is another event in which close competition might produce another record if track conditions are favorable. Bronson of Oregon State and Nicholas of Washington State are two of the standouts, although they have not equaled the record of 1:48.

BUCK NEWSOM BEATS STARS

Record Believed Set Up by Angels Leading Pitcher.

Kept in the background most of last year by the more brilliant performances of his three great Los Angeles teammates, Buck Newsom, Dick Ward and Leroy Herrmann, big Fay Thomas finished strong to win his last season's 1933 starts and this season is undisputed head man of the Angel pitching show.

The husky right hander had little trouble beating Hollywood, 12-4 Thursday for his 10th win of the year and 15th consecutive victory, one more than the former Coast league record. Thomas allowed the Stars nine hits but had little to worry about as the Angels bombed Vance Page and George Saltzberger for 13, including Gilly Campbell's 11th homer of the season. Gene Lillard's 19th and Jim Oglesby's 9th.

While the champions marked up their fourth straight win over Hollywood to clinch the series, the second-place Missions suffered their second defeat of the week at the hands of the San Francisco Seals, 3-2, and dropped 12 games behind Los Angeles.

Outfielder Etas Funk's double followed by Lenny Baker's single brought in the winning goal tally and gave Leroy Herrmann, San Francisco mound ace, his 10th 1934 victory. Hollis Thurston's pass to Baker in the second inning resulted in a Seal run

and proved to be the winning margin. The Seals moved past Hollywood into a third place tie with Sacramento.

At Seattle Howard Craghead blanked Sacramento with four blows as the Indians evaded the series, 3-0. A hotly fought war-torn by Mike Hunt, Seattle outfielder, drove in all three of the Indian runs in the sixth.

Oakland and Portland were rained out.
