UTILITIES FIRMS -AWAIT NEW ORDER

SALEM, Ore., June 1, U.P.—A new order by Public Utility Commissioner Charles M. Thomas in the general investigation of the Hyllsby Engineering and Management corporation, Chicago, and its connection with the California Oregon and Mountain States power companies, was awaited today.

The eastern company has served in an advisory capacity for the two utility concerns and has carried out construction work.

Thomas recently instructed the two western companies to eliminate payments listed in budgets for the Hyllsby company as "imprudent, unjust and unnecessary."

Testimony during the investigation by Hyllsby company officials showed that fees ranging up to \$399,752.80 were taken out of Oregon by the Chicago concern.

CLEARING SKIES PREDICTED HERE

Clearing skies, with continued low temperatures and brisk winds are in prospect for Klamath Falls during the next 24 hours, according to the local weatherman.

The mercury dropped to 34 degrees early Friday morning, and scattered frosts were reported from over the Klamath Basin. Some damage to truck gardens was believed to have been occasioned by the drop in temperature.

The mean temperature for the month of May was recorded at 56.9, according to official reports from the U. S. weather bureau, 3.8 degrees above the average mean for the month. The mean maximum was 71.3 degrees, and the mean minimum

42.5. The maximum temperature inches below normal, with a total rainfall of .41 inches recorded by the weather bureau.

There were 13 clear days, 13 partly cloudy, and six upon which the sun failed to shine.
