RED CROSS CLOSES CLOTHING ROOMS

With the approach of summer calls for relief clothing and materials have decreased, according to a statement from members of the executive board of the local Red Cross, and the distribution and production rooms in the city hall have been closed for the season.

Mrs. R. E. Wattenburg has been in charge of the room and has donated her time for the past two years and nine months that the distribution center has been in operation.

Mrs. Wattenburg has been assisted by Mrs. Charles Potts, who served during the entire period. Others who have spent a major portion of their time working in the Red Cross rooms included Mrs. Lulu Hill, Mrs. Jennie Hurn, Mrs. L. M. Cowperthwaite and Mrs. Z. J. Powell.

Members of the Altar society of the Sacred Heart church, under the direction of Mrs. George Dougherty, made shirts to be distributed from the Red Cross rooms, and layettes were made by members of the domestic art classes of Klamath Union high school under the supervision of

the instructor, Miss Pitts. Materials were furnished by the Red Cross.

Mrs. E. C. Dale and Mrs. Ed Knapp also assisted in making much needed articles of clothing.

Over \$15,000 worth of clothing and materials have been distributed to the needy from the Red Cross rooms since their opening. This year's clothing and materials distribution amounted to a total of \$5,000.

"This has been a great work most faithfully done," declared one of the members of the executive board, "and has helped to alleviate much suffering and discomfort. The board is grateful to the mayor and to the city council for donating the use of the pleasant, roomy quarters in the city hall for the Red Cross distribution center."

Strawberry Gelatin Whip
1 package strawberry flavored gelatin 1 cup boiling water
1 cup pineapple juice and cold water
1 cup crushed pineapple, drained
1 cup crushed strawberries

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water, add pineapple juice and cold water. Chill until cold and syrupy. Place in bowl of cracked ice or ice water and whip until fluffy and thick as whipped cream. Fold in pineapple and strawberries. Chill until firm. Serves 8.
