CITY COUNCIL PASSES PLANS FOR BUILDING

Final approval of the armory plans and specifications as submitted by Howard R. Perrin, local architect, was granted by the city council Monday evening. The police judge was instructed to notify PWA headquarters in Portland of this action.

Although the plans have been approved by the armory committee and various branches of PWA, technical approval by the building department of the city was required by the administration in order to proceed with the granting of funds for construction.

Publicity Plan Endorsed
The black widow spider menace now infesting the city came up for much discussion at council meeting, with no definite action to be taken until additional information relative to control is received by the county agent's office.

The council endorsed action of Dr. A. A. Soule, health officer, in spreading propaganda about the venomous spider, and a program of caution urged upon citizens of the city.

Property owners are urged to search their premises for signs of the spider which include the unusual tough web easily recognized by its irregular shape. Oil sprays and blow torches in loosely piled walls have proved fairly efficient methods of control.

Although no bites from the spider have been reported recently, all authorities agree that such bites are dangerous; that severe pain and death may result and that the menace should not be minimized.

Building to Be Wrecked
An ordinance declaring a half-burned building on Eberlein street to be a nuisance, and ordering the structure razed was passed to its third, and final reading. The owner, C. A. Parker, of Hildebrand, will be notified by the police judge, and after 10 days the building is to be torn down at the owner's expense. Prisoners who languish in the

city jail must work for their board and room from now on, according to an order passed by the council. An overseer is to be appointed by the police committee, and prisoners will be compelled to clear city properties of weeds and debris.

Although such work was done by prisoners last year, there has been no provision made for an overseer for some time.

The police committee of the council was authorized to confer with the county court relative to some remuneration for the poundmaster. At the present time he receives only a small salary from the county, but carries on the work for the city as well with no pay.

Purchase of a new motorcycle for the police department at a cost of \$250, plus \$100 for an old motorcycle to be turned in at time of purchase, was authorized. Dr. Soule reported that physical examination of food handlers and vendors in the city would be completed by July 1.

Reports of the police and fire departments, and the milk and meat inspector for the month of May were read and approved.

Mayor Willis E. Mahoney presided at the meeting.

JEFFERSON STREET RESIDENCE ROBBED

Theft of a baby's bank containing \$7 or \$8 in small change and pennies was reported to police bureau by G. W. Johnson, 409 Jefferson street, Monday.

Johnson reported that the robbery was perpetrated during the week end while he and his family were away from home. A synthetic diamond ring and

a flashlight were also taken. Entrance to the house was gained by opening the rear door with a wire. A window lock was also broken.

Included in the robbery reports on the police docket is the record of a cook stove stolen Monday evening from P. M. Baty, 1928 Wantland street. The stove had been moved out into the yard early in the evening and was still there when the family retired, Tuesday morning it had disappeared.
