Maple Freeze New Dessert

A new frozen dessert developed in the Safeway Stores Home-makers' bureau is maple freeze. It is easily made in the freezing tray of a mechanical refrigerator. The recipe follows:

Maple Freeze
2 cups milk
2 tsp. gelatin
2 egg yolks
1 cup canned maple syrup
1 tsp. vanilla
Few grains salt
1 cup pastry cream
Softened gelatin in ¼ cup of cold milk. Scald 1 cup milk and pour over beaten egg yolks. Cook and stir until coats the spoon. Remove from fire, add gelatin and stir until dissolved. Chill. Add remaining milk, maple syrup, vanilla, salt and pour into freezing tray. When mixture begins to set, stir in the cream, beaten until thick, but not stiff. Freeze. Stir several times during the freezing process.

Breakfast Eggs Can Be Different

Tired of having fried eggs stare you in the face with their expressionless eyes? Then try this—Breakfast Eggs in Cases, a combination of eggs and toast that is not only attractive but delicious.

Cut small loaves of day-old white bread into slices about 1½ to 2 inches thick. Trim off the crusts, and with a sharp knife, hollow out each slice, leaving a wall and a bottom one-quarter-inch or more thick. Dot the inside of this with butter and break one or more eggs in each case, and season with salt and pepper.

Place on a shallow pan and bake in a moderate oven (325 to 350 degrees F.)—no warmer, and allow the bread to toast slowly and the egg to set, fully 20 minutes.

Serve hot with crisp bacon or sausages and sprinkling of parsley. Allow one case for each person.

WHEAT PRICES STAGE ADVANCE

CHICAGO, June 8, (AP)—Stimulated by strength of securities and by evening-up in anticipation of a bullish government crop report, wheat prices advanced most of the time today.

It was intimated a big export business in wheat had been done at Winnipeg. Drought was reported to have cut the Czechoslovakia wheat crop products almost in half, and to have stopped all exports of agricultural products from Bulgaria. Late advice told also of urgent need of rain in Australia. French crop estimates were also reduced.

Heavy profit taking sales just at the last in wheat wiped out most of the gain. Wheat closed nervous, unchanged to ½¢ up compared with 24 hours previous, July 97½¢ to 97½¢; corn unchanged to ½¢ higher; oats, ½¢ to ½¢ advanced, and provisions showing a rise of 10¢ to 15¢.
