

CRAWFORD SEEKS WORK ON HIGHWAY

The county court at its session Friday received a letter from Superintendent Wade Crawford of the Indian reservation calling attention to the condition of the Sprague River-Bay mill road through the reservation.

Crawford cited an agreement between the government and Klamath county in 1931 in which, it was said, the county agreed to maintain the road. He said that the surface put on the road by the county is of no value and suggested that a blade be put to work, clearing off the present surface.

The court instructed County Engineer Jensen to reply to Crawford, explaining that the county had spent more money on this than any other road in the county, considering the amount of taxes received from this district.

County Commissioner Williams stated that the city had realigned, graded and surfaced this entire road from the Lakeview highway junction to Chiloquin. The present surface is of cinders and gravel.

Three Executed for Death of Gotham's Durable Malloy

OSSENING, N. Y., June 8. (AP)—It is 10:09 o'clock Thursday night in the Sing Sing death house.

Here comes Frank Pasqua, youngest member of the Bronx murder syndicate that conceived and executed the bizarre murder of Durable Mike Malloy, February 22, 1933; Pasqua, married, father of a child; Pasqua, the undertaker who buried Durable Mike's body in a pauper's grave.

Four minutes to end. They'll be burying Pasqua soon now. Some other undertaker will be burying him. Right now, at 10:09 o'clock Thursday night, he stares bewildered at the silent witnesses come to see him die. He is frightened. Who wouldn't be? Wonder what a man thinks about when he sits down to die?

The black hood—the electrodes—somewhere, out of sight, the throwing of a switch.

Four minutes. It wasn't long. Now they are taking him out.

10:15 o'clock. They don't lose much time at these affairs. That is Anthony Marino coming. He's 28, and the father of a baby. Been married seven years. He walks steadily, and he's smiling. What is there to smile about? The witnesses don't smile. The guards don't smile. It isn't their funeral. Only Marino smiles. It's his funeral.

Here comes Daniel Kreisberg. It is 10:22 o'clock. They do these things with precision. Kreisberg, 29, is married, too; got three children; never been in any trouble with the law before; well, he's in plenty of trouble now. He's been lying on his bunk, looking at a small picture of his mother. He said he felt "all right" when they went to get him. On his hip as he spoke, a cigarette trembled. All right?

CALIFORNIA TOWNS FEEL EARTHQUAKE

LOS ANGELES, June 8. (AP)—No damage had been reported today following an earthquake which shook a large area of central and southern California at 8:48 p. m. last night, although observers at the Carnegie Institution's seismological laboratory in Pasadena described it as severe enough to wreck considerable havoc at its epicenter.

The quake was felt in only a small portion of this city, but Fresno, Hanford, Santa Maria, Bakersfield, San Luis Obispo, Buellton, Santa Barbara and Ventura all reported the shock was quite severe.

CHILD PERMANENTLY BLINDED BY ANTS

BELLS, Tenn., June 8. (AP)—Red ants, swarming into his crib, blinded a three-month-old Harold Watson Patrick probably for life. Physicians said today the baby, attacked by the ant horde May 25 while his parents worked in a nearby tomato field, is blind in both eyes and there is little possibility he ever will see again.
