

H. E. WIRTH'S MASS MEETING MAY BE HERE

H. E. Wirth, potential independent candidate for governor, was a visitor here Friday and indicated the mass meeting to be held in Klamath Falls.

Wirth, who is the father of W. Buck Wirth of this city, was accompanied by G. L. Bullen, who will be his campaign manager.

"After hearing the platforms of Joe Dunne, republican nominee, and Charles H. Martin, democrat, I am more firm than ever in the opinion that the only safe road to recovery is by putting labor back to work producing new wealth and getting back to the farm," said Wirth.

Wirth is against state ownership of hydro-electricity, but not against municipal ownership. He favors an investigation of the value of the holdings of all utilities, with the purpose of discovering watered stock which, he said, should not be allowed to stand against the rate charged to consumers.

The candidate is in favor of promoting the recognition of women's ability in public and state affairs.

He is in favor of sea locks at Bonnellville that will accommodate any boat that can dock at Portland.

He declares for continued advancement of public schools and higher education.

"My main fight," said Wirth, "will be for the farmer and laborer. I am in favor of local option in liquor control. I believe in the state police. When I am elected, I will fill my appointments with men fitted for the position, regardless of politics or religion. They will be accountable to the governor, and I will be accountable to the state."

Lava Bed Survey Being Conducted

Dr. C. R. Swartzlow, member of the faculty of the University of Missouri, is conducting geological research in the lava beds monument at the instance of the national park service.

The service recently took over administration of the monument and is interested particularly in determining what features deserve special attention and development, it is understood.

Don Fisher, Klamath Union high school teacher, is located at Indian Wells to handle park administration of the lava beds. Recently four antelope were seen by the park men at the wells.

Couple Found Guilty In Chiloquin Court

Tina Barclay was found guilty of a charge of possessing illegal liquor not purchased at the state liquor store by a jury in Justice of the Peace Jack Almeter's court at Chiloquin Thursday.

Deputy District Attorney D. E. Van Vactor represented the state.

The woman was previously tried and the jury excused after it could not reach a verdict. She will be sentenced this morning. C. W. Ohles, found guilty of the same charge in the Chiloquin court, will also be sentenced today, Van Vactor said.

SEWARD, Alaska, June 8. (U.P.) On his seventh annual research expedition to Alaska, Dr. Alex Hrdlicka, federal anthropologist from Washington, D. C., proceeded on the U. S. coast guard cutter Morris today for Kodiak Island.

Dr. Hrdlicka was accompanied by six students. He will continue excavations commenced two years ago, containing, he believes, the key to prehistoric North American cultural secrets.
