By capturing Saturday's game 5-4 and the second half of Sunday's double-header 2-1, San Francisco became the second team to take three games in a week from the champion Seals. Sacramento turned the trick earlier in the season.

Dick Ward proved his pitching arm is as good now as last year when he was the league's ace hurler by blanking the Seals' 12-0 in the Sunday opener to give Los Angeles the series 4-3.

San Francisco's 4-3 victory checked the San Franciscoians with 8 hits. Dick hit for the circuit. Art Garibaldi scored both Seals runs in the nightcap going home in the ninth on Rookie Monzo's pinch single. 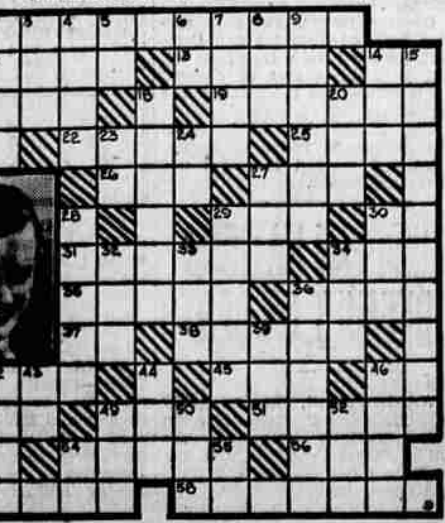

The Indians, one of the best outfits to play here this year, got off to a swift start, and scored three runs in the first.

The Pelicans scored two in the first and one in the second to tie the score.

Klamath went into the front in the sixth with three runs. Three more Indians scores in the seventh, however, tied the count once more.

Peterson's hit in the tenth was the turning point.

Molatore struck out four Indians, and Peterson, who took the mound for Klamath, and won the game both as a pitcher and hitter, struck out four.

Advance Ticket
Sale Increased
for Title Fight

NEW YORK, June 11. (AP)— For a fight in which one principal allegedly hasn't worked hard enough to get up a sweat and the other now is reported to be overtrained, Primo Carnera's heavyweight title defense against Max Baer is doing right well from a box office standpoint.

The advance sale today was understood to be a shade under \$200,000 with indications of a "gate" of \$400,000 or more by the time the boxers enter the ring of Madison Square Garden's Long Island bowl Thursday night.

Designed perhaps as a counter-irritant for the adverse criticism attending Baer's training camp clowning at Asbury Park, advice from Pompton Lakes began to stress the fact that Carnera might be overtrained. Veteran boxers were quoted to the effect that the giant champion seemed to have reached the peak too soon. There was much headshaking. It was all not very subtle. The more cynically minded readers of news from the rival camps decided that both would enter the ring in prime condition.

Although Baer has made a much more impressive showing the last two days, punctuating his usual line of light banter with some sturdy left hooks and straight rights that his sparring partners absorbed without perceptible amusement, the betting odds remained in the champion's favor at 2 to 1. Baer money was becoming more plentiful and the odds were expected to shorten. They may not close to even money by fight time.

Baer planned to wind up his boxing today and Carnera Tuesday.

Officer Counts
Many Deer Along
State Highway

In an early morning run Saturday from Fall River Mills to Burney mountain, Traffic Officer H. T. Hendricks counted eleven deer on and along the state highway, starting with a fine buck that leaped across the road just ahead of his car. In a fenced stretch he came upon a band of seven, including fawns. Hendricks along the right of way. Hendricks got out of his car and began shooting the deer toward the end of the fence. A doe dashed headfirst into the wires, turned back and dropped in the middle of the road. Hendricks found her dead, her neck broken. He loaded the carcass on his car and turned it over to a deputy game warden.

LAKE ELSINORE, Calif., June 11. (AP)— Catapulted by sudden lurches from roaring speedboats, two Los Angeles men drowned in Lake Elsinore on what was to have been a gala race day.

John Swanson, 45, mechanical engineer, was hurled into the lake yesterday as he spun around the course in his step-daughter's boat, the Cat's Meow, in preparation for the races.

Five hours later, after the races had been called off by Referee Lee C. Leming of Anaheim, Walter P. Seager, 22, was catapulted into the water as his outboard capsized.

The accident to Seager occurred while the lake still was being dragged for Swanson's body. Both drowned before aid could reach them.

MADRID, June 11. (AP)— The Austrian express train struck an auto bus near Pola De Gordon, 21 miles from Leon, today, killing 18 persons and injuring six critically.

The train crew did not notice the impact, and the express went on its way without stopping.

The Junior Chamber of Commerce, the Klamath Falls organization sponsoring the huge event, had completed major arrangements this week. The sale of sponsor buttons has been encouragingly heavy, and the financial success of the regatta is almost assured.

Thousands of Klamath Falls citizens and visitors will see the races. The high bill behind the Oregon Boat company will be used to handle the crowds. This location has one of the best views of the lake.
