

CITY PLANNING BOARD VOTED BY COUNCILMEN

An ordinance providing for the appointment of a city planning commission was passed to its third and final reading with an amending clause by the city council Monday evening.

A city planning commission is already in existence, and the ordinance gives this body legal standing in order that its recommendations may be referred back to the council and presented to the State Emergency Relief Administration for the allotment of funds.

Spider Infestation Checked
The ordinance provides that one council member, the city engineer and the mayor sit as ex-officio members on the commission, and that plans for general improvement and beautification of the city over a period of time. Recommendations of the body must be referred back to the council for action. Members of the board will serve without remuneration.

Councilman J. J. Keller was elected by ballot to represent the council on the commission.
Councilman Charles W. Thomas presented a report on the recent black spider infestation in the city, declaring that control measures in Hot Springs and Mills additions had proved successful and that the spread of the insects had been adequately checked.

Full cooperation of residents was reported, and Thomas stated that few, if any of the insects could be found at the present time.

Permission to hang a sign on Main street advertising the boat regatta sponsored by the Junior Chamber of Commerce was granted, as was permission to close Front street during the hours from 11 until 3:30 o'clock on Sunday, June 17, the day of the races. These applications were presented by L. Orth Sismore representing the Junior Chamber.

The matter of furnishing materials for a culvert on Third and McKinley streets was referred to the street committee. A request for this improvement was presented by L. L. Gehagen, who offered to install the culvert free of charge, if the council furnished materials.

City Attorney A. L. Leavitt was instructed by the council to meet with Henry Graham, beer revenue stamp inspector, and advise him of his rights under the city liquor ordinance.

The council ordered a safety light on the Sixth street viaduct which was demolished in a recent accident, to be repaired.

Washington Cuts Liquor Prices

OLYMPIA, Wash., June 12. (UP)—A new price list including reductions of from 5 to 40 cents on many brands was instituted by the state liquor board today. In a few instances prices were upped 5 to 10 cents.

Chinese whiskey and beer, Peruvian brandy and Greek wine were added to the lists.

British Plan to Double Air Force Within 5 Years

LONDON, June 12. (UP)—Rumors were current today that the British government is considering a five-year plan for doubling its military and naval air force. Other versions, on which officials decline to comment, place the expansion period at seven or ten years.

That plans for the substantial enlargement of Britain's military aviation have matured has been authoritatively stated. The government and an influential section of the press, led by the Daily Mail, Daily Express and Evening Standard, have convinced the public that the nation's purse strings must be united to allow for new expenditures for air preparedness.

GEN. M'ALEXANDER MOVES OBSERVED

STATEHOUSE, Salem, June 12. (UP)—Considerable speculation was passed the rounds on the port Major General U. S. McAlexander, retired, will play in the November 6 general election campaign.

McAlexander is one of the four republican gubernatorial candidates defeated by Jos. E. Dunne in the primary election. He is a West Point classmate of Congressman Charles H. Martin, democratic gubernatorial nominee.

McAlexander, known as "The Rock of the Marne," polled 29,793 votes, many of them from veterans. Incidentally, McAlexander's age is 69, according to Claude E. Ingalls, Corvallis publisher, and not 72, as listed in most reference books.

Some folks believe McAlexander will take no part in the campaign. Others insist he will support Martin, while still others expect him to back Dunne. McAlexander has made no statement. Until he does, most comment will be entirely speculative.

Chief of Police Lawson said the men would be assigned to regular service pending outcome of a hearing ordered by Mayor Joseph K. Carson, Jr.

Carson ordered the men suspended for asserted negligence of duty in permitting striking seamen to herd 24 Kekoa-kee crew members onto a Los Angeles-bound bus.

Government Control Urged by Mrs. F. R.

DURHAM, N. C., June 12. (UP)—Government control of the munitions industry, elimination of armed forces used for attack, and the will to peace backed by active public opinion were offered by Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt Monday as among the first steps toward the realization of world peace.

"Public opinion of sufficient

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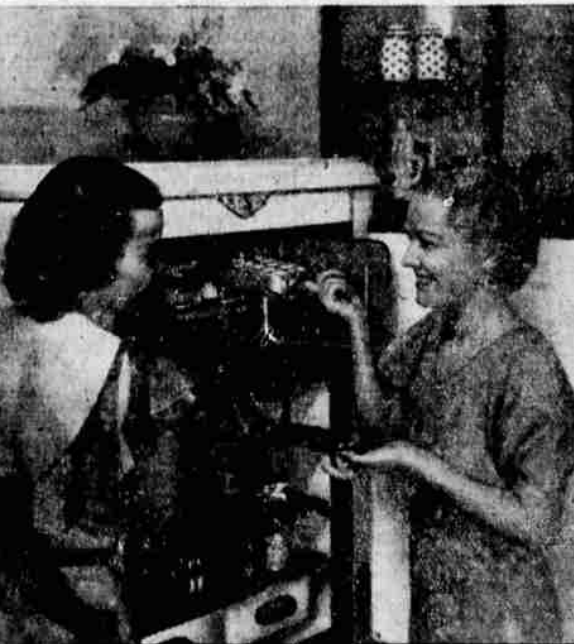
