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National and Local Markets

HALF-CENT CUT MADE TUESDAY AT PORTLAND

PORTLAND, June 12, (AP)—Cut a half cent a pound in the price on standard and prime first cubes during the late season of the produce exchange, indicating a further spread of speculative bullishness. With shipments of butter to eastern and California speculators on a rather extensive scale, no efforts whatever were being lost to purchase supplies as cheaply as possible here while a rather firm undertone was suggested in the general domestic trade.

There was no change in the price on butterfat for the reason that the former named cut was not carried out generally.

Market for eggs showed a firmly held price list generally but was without general changes in either buying or selling figures.

Trade and prices for live chickens here was being adversely affected by the extreme hot weather of the last few days with killery overland and not inclined to take on additional supplies.

Good trading tone was continued in the market for country killed meats and especially for pigs and lamb although there was at least steady for quality supplies. Beef also in good call.

More or less neglect was showing for live ducks in the trade here with a further price recession due to recent liberal supply and the lack of desire to take hold.

California potatoes have been chased out of the local market and arrivals from local points and from Pasco are taking care of current needs.

The harvest of which will soon start in the Boardman sector.
