PORTLAND, June 13, (AP)—John J. Beckman, Portland attorney, state representative, and sponsor of the "Beckman beer bill" at the last session of the legislature, was elected chairman of the democratic county central committee at a meeting of the committee here last night.

National and Local Markets

OPEN MARKET DEMAND FOR BUTTER NOTED
PORTLAND, June 13, (AP)—With the churn decrease at practically all local points and with decreased output suggested along the Pacific coast, demand for butter upon the open market remained quite active but efforts were still being successfully made by speculative interests to keep the price down.
There remained steady tone and price in the butterfat market, but country stations in general were reported as paying a fractional increase. Many of them did not go down when officially notified of the recent Portland cut.
Market situation for eggs continued good within the local sector and in fact along the coast generally. Portland prices remained the lowest of the leading markets of the country.
Small demand was showing in the market for live chickens. Hot weather together with filled up batteries of leading killers were chief factors not only against the demand, but the price.
Trading in the cheese market remained firm and with well sustained prices in practically all sections of the country. Speculative interests continued rather keen and especially in the east.
Higher prices were being named for strawberries here with a shortage of total offerings and an exceptional scarcity of large quality fruit. Other berries were about steady.
Small catch of salmon was reported by coast fishermen and local receipts are decreasing. Market on halibut is about steady around 15c for medium and 13c for chicken.
Leading growers confirm severe damage to the current crop as a result of aphid and Hessian fly, which are said to have destroyed much of the bloom. Crop is estimated about half of normal.
There was a firm tone for veal and hogs, steadiness for lambs while canner cows and bulls were in good call with cutter cows and beef a trifle slower.

BOSTON WOOL MARKET
BOSTON, June 13, (AP)—U.S. D. A.—An extremely small amount of wool is selling in the Boston market. A little new delaine fine Ohio wool is selling at 30c to 31c in the grease, while old wool of similar description is being held at 32c. Small quantities of combing 56s, 8-bloom, bright fleeces are selling occasionally at 32c to 33c in the grease. Western grown wools are quoted unchanged, although the sale is extremely limited.

SHARP REACTIONS FOLLOW UPTURNS

CHICAGO, June 13, (AP)—Expectations of wheat harvest operations in the southwest, together with big profit taking sharp in the corn market led to sharp reactions late today from early upturns of prices.
With steep loss selling precipitated in wheat, that grain fell to far below yesterday's close, and new advances in corn were more than wiped out at times. Three-hour returns from Kansas showed wheat yields ranging from one bushel to three bushels an acre up to as high as 35 bushels, with new wheat received at Wichita grading mainly No. 1.
Wheat closed heavy at the day's low point, 2 1/4-3/4 under yesterday's finish, July 96-98 1/4, corn 3-3/4 down, oats 1/4-1/2 off, and provisions varying from 2 cents decline to a rise of 10 cents.
