

Athletic Program Shaped

Effort Will Be Made to Coordinate Elementary Schools With High School. Citizens' Committee Will Assist. More Successful Teams and More General Athletic Participation Set As Goal.

The difficult but important task of coordinating the athletic activities of the elementary schools of the city with Klamath Union high school has taken definite shape. Certainly no harm or perhaps much good will develop in this earnest effort to give the Pelicans athletic teams comparable to those in any section of Oregon.

The interest in this problem is by no means localized to school officials. In fact, it gained momentum through individual enthusiasm among prominent citizens and then later all these separated efforts were combined into one group, the Citizens' Athletic committee.

This new athletic program will be given a trial for the coming school year. It has not yet been definitely selected or rejected by school officials, and undoubtedly the support and success of the plan for 1934-35 will determine its permanency.

The proposals have been compiled by Paul T. Jackson, high school principal, and submitted to the school directors in his annual report.

It follows:

1. There shall be four squads of approximately 22 in each squad in the following places:

- (1) Mills school on Mills athletic ground.
- (2) Fremont and Roosevelt schools on Roosevelt field.
- (3) Fairview, Pelican and Riverside schools on Joseph Conger field.
- (4) Freshman class of Klamath Union High School on Modoc field.

(No member of the freshman squad is to be a member of the Wildcat squad).

Members of these squads shall come from the seventh and eighth grades and any boy of unusual size and development from the sixth grade.

2. Supervision: It is suggested that Mr. Arvit have a portion of the afternoon each day until 4:00 o'clock for general supervision. Mr. Arvit, in cooperation with Mr. Peak and assisted by the grade school teachers and volunteer coaches approved by the schools, shall constitute the coaching staff.

3. Organization of League: It is proposed that we have a four-cornered league for the purpose of determining among the four squads. It is not the desire of the schools for these groups to participate outside of this league.

4. Time of Program: Program shall begin at the opening of school, September 10, and shall continue until November 11th, Armistice Day.

5. Cost: We do not anticipate any revenues from gate receipts. The respective school districts will furnish field equipment. Responsibility for furnishing football clothes and paraphernalia is left with the Citizens' Athletic Committee.

ADDITIONS. 1. Physical examination of all contestants. The Athletic Committee will secure volunteer services from local doctors.

2. Supervision: There are four male instructors, including Joe Peak, who now have charge of physical education classes in the city schools. These men are: C. Robinette at Mills, Vernon Speira at Roosevelt, and Lowell Kaup at Pelican. The physical education classes will be scheduled for the last period in the day and the physical education instructors will work under Mr. Arvit in carrying out football coaching.

3. Mr. Arvit's schedule of instruction at the high school will be changed so that each afternoon from 1:30 on will be open for athletic instruction. This schedule will allow Mr. Arvit to work with the elementary school squads from 3:00 until 4:00 o'clock p. m. each school day of the week.

The services of volunteer coaches will also be desirable. Any such coaches would be sanctioned by the school boards.

4. Organization of League: Preparation of a schedule of games will be left with the coaching staff in charge of this work. Practice periods are to be held three days a week for each squad and enrollment in football instruction will be considered equivalent to a physical education class.

The high school will furnish transportation on the occasion of special games. Otherwise, the transportation of boys to their practice fields will not be provided.

CARNERA RISKS WORLD'S TITLE

Unusual Figures of Ring, Max and Primo, Meet Tonight.

NEW YORK, June 14. (UP)—Two of the most amazing figures in ring history, gigantic champion Primo Carnera of Italy and the madcap challenger, Max Baer of California, will clash tonight in an international 15-rounder for pugilism's richest and most coveted prize—the world heavyweight title.

More than 70,000 persons are expected to pay nearly \$550,000—largest gate in four years—to witness their primitive brawl in Madison Square Garden's sunken Long 1—4 bowl.

Hall: 'A Natural'
This unusual melee will decide whether 250-pound Primo, largest man ever to wear the crown, will continue to hold the championship for Italy, or whether 210-pound Baer will wrap up the crown in the start and stripes and become the 11th American champion—also the second Jewish holder of the heavy laurels. Carnera was the first Italian to take the crown.

Tonight's bout still is hailed throughout the boxing world as one of the ring's great "natural" desite storms of unfavorable publicity that swirled about it. Rumors, reports and outright charges that both men were in poor physical condition, "bum" fighters, in-aids and clowns have not been able to dim the public's desire to see them thrown into the ring together.

This is because of the men involved, and their personal hatred. Carnera, the ragged, shuffling giant of six years ago—the stupid oaf who was a side-show freak, weight-lifter and wrestler—has been transformed into one of the smoothest and most formidable fighting machines ever unleashed in any ring. Fans tonight will see an ugly, towering goliath trying to smash his way to a knockout victory over a man who has goaded him to fury by repeated insults.

Both Men Confident
Baer, the former pig-killer and slughter house hand of Livermore—the girl-shy, fight-shy youngster, has transformed himself into a handsome, dashing Lochinvar who regards himself as "the man of destiny" and the world as his oyster. When he swings his explosive right hand, just like the short meat axe of his slaughter house days, he expects to pry that oyster wide open and be hailed as the "most colorful" champ ever to

THYE EXPECTS TO BEAT WOLF

Portlander Strengthens Prestige With Win Over Cox.

Ted Thye, known to Portland as the most thoroughly "high hat" athlete in the Northwest, will arrive in Klamath Falls Friday, cocky and confident, for his main event wrestling match with Chief Little Wolf of Denver.

Thye gained the lead in his wrestling feud with Ted "King Kong" Cox in a main event at Portland Wednesday night, and thereby established himself as the kingpin of the northern wrestling center. He was awarded the match while Cox was counted out during an argument with a spectator.

Klamath wrestling followers, however, were not ready to predict such a simple victory for the Portlander against the Navajo. Wolf, young, fast and clean, has sailed through to a majority of victories in his Legion hall appearances, and many believed his clever Indian holds will effectively offset Thye's shoulder butts and waistlocks.

PRIMO FAVORITE TO DEFEND TITLE FROM CHALLENGER

NEW YORK, June 14. (UP)—Here are the salient facts on tonight's heavyweight championship bout:

Principals—Champion Primo Carnera of Italy and Challenger Maxie Baer of California.

Title at stake—World heavyweight championship.

Distance—15 rounds.

Site—Madison Square Garden's Long Island bowl.

Expected attendance—70,000.

Expected gate—\$550,000.

Weather forecast—Fair and warmer.

Betting—Carnera favorite. Odds, 11 to 10 against Baer winning; 2 to 1 against Baer scoring knockout; 2 to 1 against Carnera scoring knockout. Also 2 to 1 that Carnera wins if fight goes 15 rounds.

Distribution of gate—State and federal taxes off top. New York milk fund receives 10 per cent of remainder. Carnera gets 37 1/2 per cent of gross; Baer 20 per cent, of which 7 1/2 per cent goes to Jack Dempsey.

Starting times—Preliminaries, 8 p. m. (E.D.T.), main bout 10 p. m. (E.D.T.).

Officials—One referee and two judges will be selected for bout at ringside by New York commission.

Two other husky heavyweights will clash in the first match of a double main event. This second one-hour event will send Bob Kruse of Oswego against Louis Miller, Reno's strong man.
