WHY all this interest in tourist travel? Because tourist travel is one of the big industries. In California, one of the biggest states of the nation, it rates as probably the leading industry, bringing more money into the state than any other.

The same condition exists in Colorado. It is tourist travel that keeps Colorado going.

IN EUROPE—In France, especially—tourist travel is one of the big items, and they rely on it definitely for a considerable share of their prosperity.

The economists—those brainy men who have been telling us so many things in recent years—tell us that tourist travel is an important item in foreign exchange, because it results in shifting huge sums of money from one country to another.

In other words, the tourist brings NEW MONEY with him, and every country welcomes new money.

WE WELCOME new money here in Oregon, because we need it to offset the money we send away to pay for the things we do not ourselves produce.

So we welcome the tourist. It is especially pleasing to us here in the Klamath country, who in the past have been pretty much off to one side of the beaten track of tourist travel, to note that we are getting an increasing share of this valuable new business.

San Francisco's veteran right-hander stopped the Senators, 3-1, and seven was in better form. Sacramento's only run came in the fifth when Tony Borja tripled and scored on a long fly. Dutch Ruether's rejuvenated Indians upset the Missions, 5-3 in the series opener at San Francisco. Bill Radonits not only checked the Reds with four hits but in addition contributed a double and single to the tribe's 8 hits off of Charlie Lieber and Lloyd Osborne. Fred Berger, Indian outfielder, with a double and single, and Second Baseman Al Harrington with a brace of singles drove in all of the Seattle runs.
