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YOUNG HURLER HALTS BROWNS

Johnny Broaca Leads Yankee to One-Hit Victory.

In three games 23-year-old Johnny Broaca, who took his degree as master of the art of elbowing under Joe Wood at Yale, has become the reigning sensation of the American League.

Only two hours after he joined the Yankees, Broaca started a game and promptly was shelved off the hill. His confidence was unimpaired, however, and he came back to pitch and lose a three-hit game against the Athletics and then Thursday turned in a one-hit beat against the Browns that brought him his first major league victory by a 7 to 0 count.

Ruth Hits Tenth. Babe Ruth also had his say when he started things off by hitting his tenth homer of the year with two aboard in the first. With the Detroit Tigers kept idle by rain at Boston, the triumph sent the Yanks into first place by the margin of four percentage points. The Browns dropped into a fifth-place tie with the Red Sox.

The pitchers stood out in Thursday's big league records with few exceptions. Cleveland and the Athletics didn't get much in the hurling line as the Indians hammered out an 11 to 7 triumph with the aid of two important homers by Hal Truisky.

Many Hits Counted. In the National League St. Louis and Boston shelled each other's hurling for a total of 34 blows, including three Cardinal homers, a triple and two doubles. The Cards came out with a 13-9 decision although they were out of 18-16. The Cubs also took the home run route to victory in a free-swinging contest, beating the Phillies 6-4 as circuit swats by Chuck Klein, Don Hurst and Babe Herman produced all the Chicago runs. Klein's home was his 16th.

But Hal Schumacher turned in a four-hit game, beating the Reds 3 to 0 to keep the Giants on top of the National. Monte Weaver of Washington granted the same number of blows in defeating the White Sox 5 to 1 and Brooklyn's Van Mungo granted the Pirates only five hits in ten innings and won out 5 to 2.

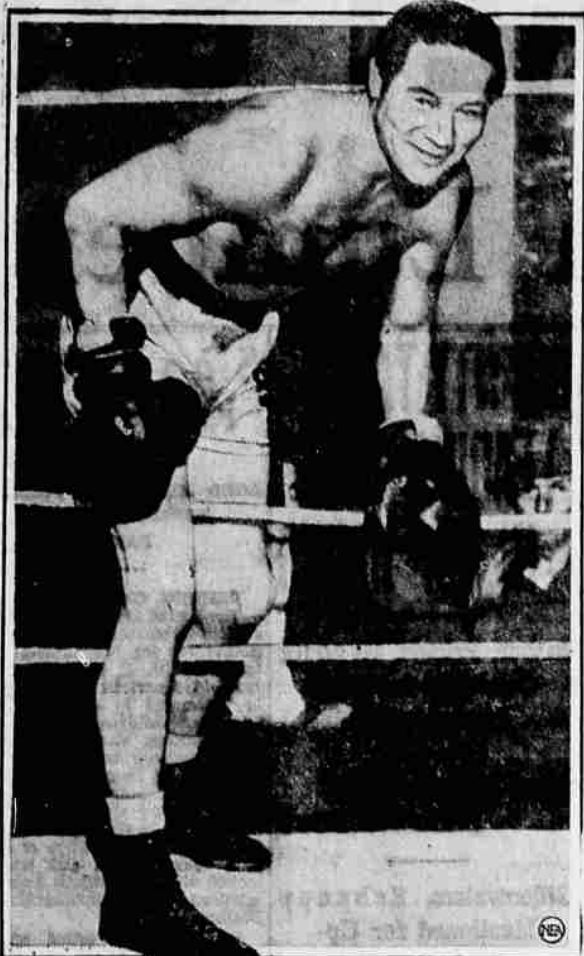

Round Two. Carnara came out fast and Baer slugged away with right to body. Baer repeatedly slammed Carnara with lefts to face. Baer floored Carnara and fell on top of him. Again Baer floored Carnara and again went down on top of him. Baer crashed over a terrific right to the head, Carnara going down and Baer tripping over his legs, falling in an ungraceful sprawl. Baer sneered at Carnara and beckoned him to come on and fight. Baer laughed aloud as the Italian missed with lefts and rights to the head. Baer missed with a left to the mid-section. Carnara tapped Baer lightly with lefts to the face and took a wild right to the head. They traded light lefts and rights in close. Carnara pummeled Baer about the midsection at the bell. Baer's round.

Round Three. Again Carnara came out fast and Maxie circled away from him. Carnara clubbed Baer with left to face. Baer drove lefts to body. Baer lashed out with rights to the head and laughed derisively. Carnara laughed in reply. Carnara clubbed Baer with lefts and rights to the head which did no apparent damage. Baer drove over a crashing right to the body. Carnara stung Baer with left to the head. It was his best blow of the bout so far. Carnara scored two light right uppercuts. Carnara again was doing the leading. He missed with short left jab. Carnara dropped two light lefts on Baer's head. They staged a neutral corner. Baer drove right to chin and Carnara slipped to one knee, but was up immediately. They were sparring for an opening at the bell. Baer's round.

Round Four. Baer waited in his corner for Carnara and grinned as Primo walked over to him. Carnara landed two lefts to face but missed with right to the body. They exchanged light lefts to the face. Carnara crossed left to the face

and followed with right to the stomach. He drove Baer back to the ropes and tapped Maxie with left to head. Carnara scored two lefts and rights to the body. Baer faked a lead, danced back and laughed at Primo. Carnara scored a right to the jaw. Carnara cut Maxie with lefts and rights to head. Baer drove in with a stinging right to the body. Carnara tapped Baer with light lefts to chin. Carnara drove Baer back with straight left to face. Carnara again scored left to the face. It was Carnara's round.

Round Five. Carnara scored right to body and left to head. Carnara crossed left to face. Baer was backing away continuously. Maxie stunned Primo with crashing right to the body. Baer drove left to body and followed with left to head. Maxie was grinning and laughing like a crazy man. He missed with left to face but landed right to body. Carnara crashed left to face and light left to body.

Carnara missed left to face. Baer was fighting in a half crouch. He took two lefts to the face. Baer drove over wildly with a sweeping left to the head which drew blood from Primo's nose. Carnara was bleeding profusely. Baer staggered Carnara with right to jaw. Baer drove over a right to the body at the bell.

Carnara was dazed. Baer tapped Carnara with a friendly pat of the head. It was Baer's round. (Carnara's seconds worked feverishly to stop the bleeding from Primo's nose.)

Round Six. Carnara was still bleeding from the nose but the offensive continued. Baer scored right to head. Baer missed right to head. Carnara scored a right uppercut to jaw and followed with left to head. They traded light lefts to head. Baer lashed out and staggered Carnara with left hook to jaw. They put on a two-fisted body attack with honors about even. They traded light lefts fighting in close. The crowd was now killing madly. Carnara planted two lefts in Maxie's face but missed with a third. Carnara was driven back by a left to stomach. Baer crashed over a right to the head. Carnara led with a left to the head, but missed with right to body. Baer scored hard right to the body as the round ended. Baer's round.

Round Seven. They danced around the ring and finally Carnara led with left to the body. Baer stung Primo with left to the face. Carnara countered with hard right to the face. Baer drove over two light lefts to the head. Carnara struck a glancing right to the face and back handed with a left to face. The referee warned Carnara for the backhand punch. They were fighting cautiously once again and finally Primo led with an ineffective left to head. He followed with light left to the head. Baer drove over a light right to the body. MAX CUTS DOWN ITALY'S GIANT

Californian Wins Heavyweight Championship From Carnara.

enth round, and awarded the verdict to the broad-shouldered, 25-year-old American on a technical knockout.

The giant, 263-pound Italian was still on his feet at the finish, after bravely trying to continue against odds that he knew were overwhelming against him, but he was a bloody, reeling wreck of a fighting man and he was muttering "Fini—Fini!" in utter helplessness when the referee decided finally to halt the slaughter.

Rights, Lefts Tell. Carnara was knocked down three times within the first minute of fighting as Baer loosed a succession of long, dynamite-laden right hands to the head, followed by bruising lefts to the body. The Italian was down three times again in the second round, with Baer rolling on top of him as they waged the wildest kind of melee. For the seventh time in three rounds, the giant was flopped to his haunches in the third, still too bewildered to take anything like a count and recover his wits. He rallied bravely for the next few rounds but in the eighth he sprawled full-length to the floor from the force of an ineffectual lunge.

Only the bell saved Primo from a knockout in the tenth round, at one stage of which Donovan stepped between them and changed his mind after giving every indication of his intention to stop the fight. Twice in this round and twice more, in the eleventh, the toppling tower of Italy went down under crushing blows.

Ring History Repeated. Absolutely dazed, his face a bloody red from the terrific pounding he had received and his features distorted in grotesque bewilderment, Carnara was led stumbling from the ring after the most severe beating any heavyweight champion has absorbed since Jack Dempsey pummeled Jess Willard into a bloody pulp in three rounds at Toledo in 1919. History repeated itself in this respect as the 210-pound Baer, spotting his giant foe more than 50 pounds, proved that a devastating punch can wipe out any and all physical barriers or handicaps, and Dempsey, the old "Man Mauler" was one of the first to rush into the ring to slay the broad back of his California protégé.

Max Not "Unfit." For the thrills of savage conflict and the howling roar of the crowd for the "kill," Baer's stunning victory surpasses anything that has happened among heavyweights since Dempsey knocked out Luis Angel Firpo of the Argentine in two spectacular rounds at the Polo Grounds in 1923. For two rounds last night there was more blistering action than a whole carload of heavyweight bouts have produced in the last half dozen years and the crowd accorded an ovation to the handsome, carelessly confident youth who has given pugilism another home-crushing puncher to get excited about.

The Californian's lopsided mastery of the giant who has stalked through the heavyweight ranks, his powers still something of a mystery until they were left scattered all over the premises last night, furnished the climax to one of the most extraordinary of all heavyweight title matches. Declared unfit to fight by one of New York's boxing commissioners, Bill Brown, only a week ago, Baer not only enjoyed the last big laugh but convincingly demonstrated that the "wise money" knew where it was going when a be-

lated flood of wagering sent the challenger into the ring a 5 to 5 shot to capture the championship. Champion is Game. Only Carnara's sameness under the heaviest fire of his career, together with Baer's tactics in merely stalking his big opponent until such time as he chose to turn loose his belting fury, kept the fight from ending in short order. Whether because he was somewhat arm-weary from his opening three-round assault or because he decided to take his time and give the crowd a run for its money as he strutted his fanciest stuff, Baer relaxed his attack for the better part of the next four rounds.

There was never much question about the outcome after the first few slashing right handers bowled Carnara off his feet. Although the big man continually did nearly all the leading, while Baer backed slowly away or side-stepped with the ease of a dancer, there was no time when Primo's left jab or faltering right hand uppeared caused Baer to do anything but make a derisive face.

No Counts Taken. Max alternately grinned and glared, stuck out his tongue in boyish contempt and twitted his giant rival. He flopped off Carnara's jabs like a man awaiting harmless fire. He did everything but the tango as he circled or slipped away from the Italian. Once, when his footing seemed slippery, Max deliberately went over to Carnara's corner and busily scraped his shoes in the resin before resuming the fight.

Carnara at none of the stages when he was being most severely battered took the advantage of a long count. Only four times out of the eleven occasions did the time-keeper even have time to swing his mallet. There was a count of two for the first knock-down, another for only one second in the third and two short counts, lasting two and four seconds, in the tenth round. The bell at the end of the tenth interrupted the four second knock-down, which might have been the last if there had been enough time to count the giant out. He was clearly at the end of his rope in this session, which found even the referee confused as to just what he intended to do while Primo stood helpless, blood pouring from his nose and lips, in Baer's corner.

Carnara's two trips to the floor in the eleventh and final round were more from his own weakness and unsteadiness than from any greater force in Baer's lunges or punches. He sprawled once along the ropes after being slugged with a right-hander and he went down in the middle of the ring soon afterwards from a half push and half-punch.

Baer Real Actor. Altogether, it was one of the most amazing performances ever witnessed in a championship bout, alternately comic with Baer's clowning and tragic for the reeling giant who was trying to ward off the inevitable with the last vestiges of his physical equipment. All that Carnara had left was his bulk and it was slowly being beaten into insensibility at the finish.

FOUR HUSKIES MEET TONIGHT

Thye Tackles Wolf and Kruse Meets Miller at Legion Hall.

Nine hundred pounds of beef will pass through the Legion hall ring tonight as Mack Lillard, promoter, presents a maximum of two hours of wrestling.

Two well-known northwest mat athletes—Ted Thye of Portland and Bob Kruse of Oswego—will defend their claims to regional supremacy over men from Colorado and Nevada.

Thye, the "Terrible Ted" of the northwest, will meet young Chief Little Wolfe, Denver Navajo. These big fellows clash in the top one-hour match.

Kruse, blonde farmer from the northern section of the state, will oppose Louie Miller, former training partner of Jack Dempsey. Miller hails from Reno.

This double main event brings together four huge athletes. Each is well over 200 pounds and their combined weight probably will run around 900 pounds.

No athlete in either match was conceded an outstanding chance to defeat his opponent.

There were many Klamath Falls wrestling followers who considered Thye's shoulder butts and wristlocks sufficiently effective to bring him a victory. There were

just as many others, however, who believed Wolf would win with his Sonnenbergs and Indian deadlocks.

Miller is a professional strong-man and in sheer strength should hold an advantage over Kruse. The farmer, however, is noted for his ring experience and should be able to counter scientifically the power of the Nevada.
