

3,000 SAFEWAY MARKETS WILL LAUNCH DRIVE

Three thousand meat markets operated by Safeway Stores, will launch their third annual meat sales drive on Monday morning, June 18, and ending Saturday evening, June 23, according to an announcement just received from J. L. Edmunds, district market manager.

This effort will cover 18 entire states west of the Mississippi. It is the outcome of five months of intensive planning.

Although the need for over-supply relief has been reduced to a minimum by the effective selling momentum created by such nationally operating concerns, this lamb campaign will be brought more forcefully to the attention of the public than any held heretofore.

Starting mainly with the west's leading newspapers, all known advertising media will be employed. All cattle growing territories, meat institutes and farm bureaus are interested in this effort to again benefit the worthy industry of the lamb producers. Public officials have issued favorable and encouraging statements on past campaigns of a similar nature.

Last year Safeway Stores bought more than 1,023,000 lambs, according to their local executives, and this year they expect to increase their purchases so as to give further support to the grower.

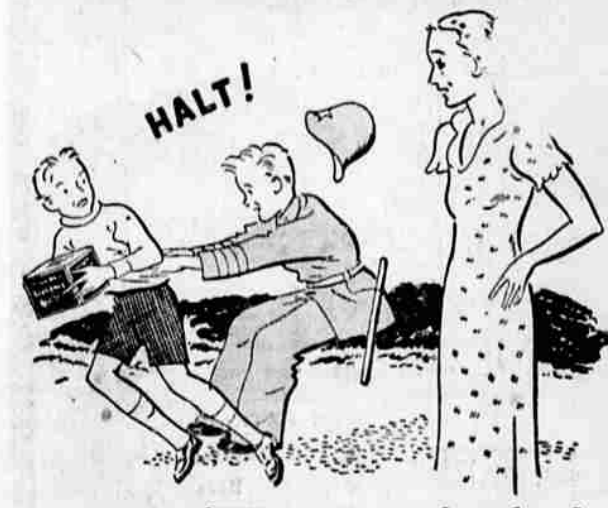

Alfalfa Weevil Not Present in Klamath County

Dr. L. P. Rockwood, United States entomologist, and C. A. Henderson, county agricultural agent, spent several days last week "sweeping" alfalfa fields from Klamath Falls to Tule lake in order to determine the kinds and types of insects present, and

whether or not the alfalfa weevil could be found in the Klamath basin.

There were no signs of this weevil on any of the ranches upon which fields were swept. However, alfalfa caterpillar larvae were found to be present in all fields in varying quantities, indicating that quite a sizeable epidemic might be present later in the season, according to Henderson.

The larvae of the alfalfa caterpillar is of a deep green color with indistinct white markings, and later hatches into small white butterfly, but bearing sulphury or orange spots on the wings.

This insect frequently affects alfalfa yields, but heretofore has never been serious in the Klamath basin, where it is now found to be more prevalent than normal. It is feared that the presence of this pest may result in small damage to alfalfa crops.

Aphis were found present in considerable numbers in all fields, but inasmuch as ladybugs, the natural enemy of aphids, were also found in great quantities, any major infestation of aphids will probably be held in check, according to the scientists.

Red-legged grasshoppers were found in all alfalfa fields in limited numbers, and no great damage is expected from their depredations except on foothill lands on the margins of the irrigated districts, Henderson said.

Sweeping for alfalfa weevil is carried on each year in order to establish the fact that this district is free from the pest, as this insect is quarantined against in virtually all states and districts handling the major portion of Klamath county's alfalfa produce.

Certificates showing the produce to be free from weevils before the alfalfa may be shipped in necessary.
