

GRANGE MAY CALL STATE CONVENTION

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ing setup to aid property owners, involving the issuance of "guaranteed currency," was one of the major proposals of the Oregon state grange, which concluded its annual convention here at 4 a. m. today. Vigorously attacking the great accumulation of resolutions which had been left until the final hours of the state meeting, the grangers waged heated though lighted debate throughout the night. The tired-eyed delegates did not leave the convention hall with the satisfying knowledge of a completed task until the morning sun was beginning to peep over the eastern hills.

Federal guarantee of bank deposits regardless of amount, approval of the proposed state banking bill, adoption of the recommendation of the state grange master regarding the abolishment of the lower house of the state legislature, of an amendment to replace the property tax to raise revenue for old-age pensions, approval of a workmen's employment tax to provide old-age insurance and endorsement of the state milk control law, were among the issues passed by the convention during the night-long session.

The plan, to refinance home loans, as provided in the Frazier bill, which the grange approved, would require revaluation of all bonds affecting homes, create a board to appraise all applications for loans and maintain a search of records to ascertain all indebtedness against property upon which loans are sought. The resolution further proposed that loans be granted up to 75 per cent of appraised value, for a term of 40 years at not to exceed three per cent interest and principal payment. The resolution further proposes that the government retire existing bonds as rapidly as possible, and issue "guaranteed currency," with a provision that no investor shall be entitled to accumulate more than \$100,000 of such currency, which is to be destroyed as fast as retired by payments on loans.

In another resolution directed to the federal government, the grange urges that the federal guarantee of bank deposits be made permanent instead of temporary, as at present, and that the guarantee be extended to amounts above \$2,500, now only partially protected.

ACTION COMPLETED ON INDIAN MEASURE

WASHINGTON, June 16. (AP)—Congressional action was completed today on legislation requested by President Roosevelt to give Indians a greater degree of self government.

The house adopted the conference report and sent it to the White House.

The bill abolishes the Indian land allotment system and permits Indians on reservations to set up cooperative organizations for the conduct of farming and industrial operations financed out of a \$10,000,000 revolving fund.

CRIPPLED CARRIER AWARDED PAROLE

PORTLAND, June 16. (AP)—Edwin F. Muncey, permanently crippled because of having had his feet frozen while a mail carrier, was given a parole here Friday after having been sentenced to ten months in jail for misappropriation of about \$30 in federal funds while postmaster at Halfway, Baker county.

Muncey pleaded guilty to the charge, but Federal Judge John H. McNary suspended the sentence when the accused man's attorney pleaded that a prison sentence might jeopardize the government pension which Muncey receives and needs.

John K. O'Brien, about 45, was held in the county jail Friday night for federal authorities on a charge of counterfeiting fifty-cent pieces, quarters and dimes.

O'Brien was arrested by Sheriff Lloyd Low Thursday evening and turned over to federal officers after 34 counterfeit fifty-cent pieces, several smaller coins and paraphernalia for manufacturing the bogus money was found in his possession in a house on South Sixth street.

He was taken before U. S. Commissioner Ber C. Thomas Friday afternoon and waived preliminary examination. Bond was set at \$3,000. He will be taken to Portland for a federal grand jury investigation.

U. S. Secret Service Agent W. S. MacSwain, who arrived here from Portland Friday morning to investigate the counterfeit coins, stated numerous coins with the same numbers as found in O'Brien's possession have been found in Portland and Klamath Falls.

The secret service agent believed O'Brien's arrest broke up a part of a gang working over the state.

BOY KNOCKED DOWN BY AUTO FRIDAY

A small boy was struck down by an automobile driven by Y. W. Stanford at the intersection of East Main street and Radcliffe streets, shortly after noon Friday, according to a report filed at police bureau.

The boy was apparently uninjured, according to the report, and got up and ran away refusing to give his name.

He was running across the street towards the fire which destroyed the Turner Moulding plant, and ran into Stanford's car which knocked him down.

Mrs. Hazelle Naray reported an accident which also occurred Friday. Her car which was parked at Sixth and Pine streets was struck by a machine driven by Art Searey. Small damage was reported.

WASHINGTON, June 16. (AP)—The house today completed congressional action on the Taylor grazing bill, to give the interior department control over the public domain, and sent it to the White House.

Johnson Assails Criticism of NRA As Communistic

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lateral assault can ever take that satisfaction away from us."

Investigation Assailed
Of the Darrow board, Johnson said:

"It has investigated not one single code. It has refused to consider any data on any code. It has suppressed testimony from any side but one. It is guilty of deliberately false and unsupported statements. Its findings and recommendations are not worth the paper on which they are written."

Johnson said that a year ago the law insisted "on what Mr. Darrow calls savage, wolfish, competition which has blighted this country for our whole population for more than four years," he said, "and there is only one method of escape from it now or in the future."

That method is to substitute for it the basic principles of NRA—codes of fair competition under Blue Eagle agreements throughout all industry—to maintain wages and working hours so evenly that none has reason or occasion to impair them—industrial self-government under federal supervision.

"This miracle has actually happened under Franklin Roosevelt in the 12 months ended today."

CARNERA'S ANKLE BROKEN IN FIGHT

NEW YORK, June 16. (AP)—An X-ray examination today disclosed that Primo Carnera fractured the bone in his right ankle Thursday night when he lost the heavyweight boxing title to Max Baer.

Following the examination, Dr. Vincent Fanoni, the giant Italian physician, said it was doubtful if Carnera would be able to carry his full weight of 260 pounds on the injured ankle for at least three weeks.

"Carnera suffered a chip fracture of the tibia (ankle) bone and torn ligaments," apparently when he went down in the first round," said Dr. Fanoni. "I plan to put the injured ankle in a cast this afternoon. Primo probably will remain in the hospital several days and it will be at least three weeks before he will be able to carry his full weight on the ankle."

NEW MEXICO MAN ELECTED GAME LEADER

PORTLAND, Ore., June 16. (AP)—Elliott S. Barber, state game warden of New Mexico, was today elected president of the western association of state game and fishing commissioners who for three days met here to discuss the preservation of wild life.

R. G. Parvin, game and fish commissioner of Colorado, was elected vice president of the organization as the 14th annual conference ended.

The recommendation that wild life resources of Indian reservations be improved was made in a formal resolution by the association. This would be done by making the season and bag limits conform with those of the state in which each reservation is located, and establishment by state and federal agencies of a budget system for fish planting.

The 1935 conference probably will be held at Santa Fe, New Mexico, following the custom of taking the meeting to the residence of the president.

GRASS FIRES KEEP DEPARTMENT BUSY

Grass fires called the fire department out four times in the past 24 hours, with no damage resulting from any of the blazes.

At 2:40 o'clock Friday afternoon the truck was called to 630 North Fifth street, at 7:54 o'clock to 1040 California avenue, at 9:05 to South Sixth street where a blaze had spread into the grass near the Turner Moulding plant which was destroyed by fire earlier in the day, and at 8:35 o'clock Saturday morning to Third and Roosevelt streets.

Grass is drying out rapidly at present, and the fire hazard increasing daily, and the police department announces that it will strictly enforce the ordinance prohibiting the shooting of firecrackers inside the city limits.

3. Germany will be invited to join the Italo-Austro-Hungarian economic accord, a move expected to promote peace in central Europe.

4. Conversations, an Italian spokesman said, opposed regional blocs in favor of general cooperation.

France, observers claimed, did not figure in the discussions, although previous reports said Italy and Germany would seek an alliance protecting them against France's numerous affiliations in Europe.
